

Dear Jeremy,

I hope that this letter finds you well. As we brace ourselves for the winter months, I am thankful for the farmers and their hard work bringing the harvest to feed Canadian families and the world. As we continue to face global food insecurities, it is more important than ever that the government get out of the way and allow farmers to do their jobs unhindered. October has been a busy month in Ottawa as Conservatives continue to hold the government accountable for their failures.

Something that we've been fighting hard against is this government's unfair treatment of Western provinces. Recently, reacting to his dwindling polls in Atlantic Canada, the Prime Minister announced a three-year temporary pause on the Carbon Tax for heating oil, which is used for home heating by 30-40% of Atlantic households. Unfortunately, it accounts for 0% of home heating in Saskatchewan. What is even more egregious is that the most common form of heating in Saskatchewan, natural gas, is cleaner than heating oil, yet not exempt from the carbon tax. When asked about this unfair treatment, Liberal Minister of Rural Development Gudie Hutchings said that if the Western Prairie provinces want to secure carve-outs in the federal government's carbon pricing policy, "they need to elect more Liberals in the Prairies." This government needs to stop playing favourites and axe the tax for all Canadians.

No one wants to freeze in the dark:

This month, on the Natural Resources committee, we've debated this government's plan to make our electricity grid entirely dependent on renewable energy by 2035. This will cost billions of dollars and will likely result in energy insecurity. Renewable energy isn't reliable; in Saskatchewan, we've seen wind and solar flatline over and over again. When it's -30 outside, Canadians need reliable energy to heat their homes. Instead of bans and regulations, which could result in blackouts, Conservatives support incentivizing tech companies to develop affordable and reliable clean energy. Euthanizing the Mentally Ill?

On the 18th of October, the Liberal government rejected my colleague Ed Fast's Bill C-314 to prevent the mentally ill from accessing medical assistance in dying (MAiD). This Liberal government believes that those suffering with mental health problems should be able to access euthanasia – not support. It was close – 17 votes close. Regardless, the vast majority of the Liberal caucus believes that those who need help, and who are suffering the most, should be able to end their lives. Shame on this government for driving the vulnerable to euthanasia. Two years ago, my colleague Garnett Genuis, the Member of Parliament for Sherwood Park-Fort Saskatchewan, released **this** video about the story of Lia Milousis, whose life now would not be possible had she had access to MAiD when she was struggling with mental health problems – and she couldn't be happier euthanasia wasn't an option.

Harbouring Hamas:

It was recently discovered that the Gulf state Qatar has been harbouring the leaders of Hamas. This is the same Hamas that has slaughtered thousands of Israelis and Palestinians. Qatar is projected to produce 40% of the world's liquid natural gas (LNG) by 2029. By the end of the decade, nearly half of the world's LNG will be produced by a country protecting the leaders of a group that indiscriminately slaughters women and children. Yet, according to our Prime Minister, there is no "business case" for Canadian LNG. Justin Trudeau and his Liberal government would rather have our allies like France, Germany, and the

Netherlands, buy their oil and gas from state funders of terrorism instead the country with the highest environmental and ethical standards in the world – Canada. As the conflict in Gaza continues, the Prime Minister, must, at some point, accept that there is not just a business case for Canadian oil and gas, but a moral one as well.



Remembrance:

This Remembrance Day, the sacrifice of the members of our Armed Forces remains as important now as ever. Especially at a time when the Liberal government tells our military chaplains that they can no longer pray – taking a way a source of inspiration and courage for thousands of our troops. Telling our Armed Forces that their faith is no longer welcome, and that they may no longer pray for the dead strips them of a centuries old tradition, and is something that must be undone.
