My Visit to Fire Hall #5 in Burnaby!

One day, our Beaver Scout group went on a super cool adventure to Fire Hall #5 in Burnaby, BC! We were so excited because we were going to meet real firefighters and see where they work.

When we got there, the firefighters told us something important: this is an active fire hall, which means if there's an emergency, they have to leave right away. And guess what? While we were there, the alarm actually went off! It wasn't a big emergency, but one of the fire trucks had to go. We all watched it drive out with its lights on—it was awesome!

We were like real firefighters

The firefighters were super nice and showed us all their equipment. We even got to climb inside a fire truck! It was huge and had so many buttons and tools. Then, they showed us how they put on their full firefighter suit—it looked heavy but really cool.

And the best part? I got to use a real fire hose! A firefighter helped me aim at a cone, and we all got a little splash of water. It was so much fun!





Fire Safety Tips We Learned:

The firefighters also taught us how to stay safe. Here are some of the tips they shared:

- Know your address so you can tell it to 9-1-1 in an emergency.
- Don't hide during a fire—go outside and stay outside!
- Stop, drop, and roll if your clothes ever catch fire.
- Check smoke alarms at home with your parents to make sure they work.
- Have a family escape plan and practice it together.

What I Learned and Why It Matters

Visiting the fire hall was one of the best days ever! I learned that firefighters are real-life heroes. They are always ready to help people, even if it means leaving in the middle of talking to us. They are brave, strong, and super kind.

I also learned that emergency services like firefighters, police, and paramedics are very important. They keep us safe when there are fires, accidents, or other scary things. That's why we should always listen to them, say thank you, and remember what they teach us.

At the end, we all said a big thank you to the firefighters for showing us around and keeping everyone safe. Then we went back home with big smiles and lots of stories to tell.


Emergency services like firefighters, police, and paramedics are very important, I want to be brave like them one day!




GEMMA LENARDUZZI VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT 1ST BEAR ROVER CREW

STEAL THE "SCENES" LIKE CAMP SAMAC

In May, Camp Samac became our 6th property to earn SCENES (Scout Centres of Excellence for Nature and Environment) accreditation. Its success is more about people, partnerships and persistence than paperwork. Would you like to be our next environmental flagship?





SCENES IS A NETWORK OF LOCATIONS THROUGHOUT THE WORLD WHERE SCOUTS CAN EXPERIENCE THE THREE FUNDAMENTAL ROLES OF NATURE AND THE ENVIRONMENT IN SCOUTING Lewis shared that Brian Wick, Whitby Area Commissioner, suggested that this certification matched what volunteers were doing already: "We could see that the camp had heat pumps, and we got Wi-Fi, and connections were made with an arborist school, and they started to clean up our forests that have been wrecked with ice storms and windstorms (...) Debby Corneal was tasked with starting a program committee, and we now have a program cabin dedicated to activities connected to Scouting so that when people come in to rent our facilities, they have really interesting activities for the youth to do."

How could you start?

- Recruit a multi-disciplinary team. Carpenters rebuilt an off-grid Nature and Tree Centre complete with microscope and Wi-Fi. Train new generations to prevent burnout.
- 2. Review what you're currently offering at the camp.
- 3. Seasonal weather sessions and 16 badge-ready activities linked to the Canadian Path and Earth Tribes goals became environmental education.
- 4. Establish partnerships that add expertise at no cost: Durham College produced a curriculum manual. Friends of Second Marsh will plant indigenous trees this November.
- 5. Invasive-species removal days build morale and fill social media with inspiration for potential donors. Marketing based upon SCENES signage and online stories reassure sponsors who back excellence.
- 6. Ask for support: Grants from Retired Teachers of Ontario and Canada's "The 2 Billion Trees" program (2BT) funded equipment and saplings.
- 7. Generate revenue: Scouts, Guides, and community rentals increased, providing income and sustainability.

What's next?

·They're currently building "Samac Nature Encyclopedia" as a resource book.

·Over the summer, they'll work with the five categories in the Canadian Path (earth, air, space, water, science) of Personal Achievement Badges to link them with the SCENES' four themes, and the Nature Centre to produce a Scouter reference book.

They discovered the city of Funchal in Madeira Island - that is closer to Africa than Portugal's mainland.


And they helped a local community and learned more about the forest and how to take care of it.
