

State/Standardized Testing–Create Student Buy-In Inspirational Quotes

Looking for something to help give your students a little extra push during testing? Look no further! I have compiled some inspirational quotes to help students focus and give their test everything that they have. Sometimes, no matter how much you say it, your students don't "hear," your encouragement; letting someone else do the talking can make all the difference.

There are three different pages filled with inspirational quotes for your upper elementary and middle school students. Randomly hand out quotes before testing and allow students to look at the quote during the test for inspiration.

In addition to the quotes, I have included a little bit of information about the person that said the quote. Copy this information on the back side of your quote page prior to cutting. Giving students some context about the author of the quote can help them to relate to the words; it allows them to see that successful people have challenges and hardships that they must overcome.

Edson Arantes do Nascimento, better known by his nickname Pelé, was a Brazilian professional footballer who played as a forward. Widely regarded as one of the greatest players of all time, he was among the most successful and popular sports figures of the 20th century

Edison was also a skilled manufacturer and marketer, and established the world's first industrial research laboratory. He received 1,093 U.S. patents for his inventions, including improvements to the telegraph, stock ticker, and telephone.

Edward Kennedy "Duke" Ellington (1899-1974) was an American jazz composer, pianist, and bandleader who left a lasting impact on music and American culture. His recordings remain popular examples of big-band jazz. Ellington was an instrumental composer, and many of his songs were originally written as instrumentals. He was known for pushing the boundaries of jazz and classical music. His piece "Creole Rhapsody" was inspired by the struggles of African-Americans.

Wayne Douglas Gretzky CC is a Canadian American former professional ice hockey player and former head coach. He played 20 seasons in the National Hockey League for four teams from 1979 to 1999

Jean-Baptiste Poquelin, known by his stage name Molière, was a French playwright, actor, and poet, widely regarded as one of the great writers in the French language and world literature. His extant works include comedies, farces, tragicomedies, comédie-ballets, and more

John Robert Wooden was an American basketball coach and player. Nicknamed "the Wizard of Westwood", he won ten National Collegiate Athletic Association national championships in a 12-year period as head coach for the UCLA Bruins, including a record seven in a row

Esther Pauline "Eppie" Lederer, better known by the pen name Ann Landers, was an American advice columnist and eventually a nationwide media celebrity. She began writing the "Ask Ann Landers" column in 1955 and continued for 47 years, by which time its readership was 90 million people.

Gary James Player DMS OIG is a South African retired professional golfer who is widely considered to be one of the greatest golfers of all time. During his career, Player won nine major championships on the regular tour and nine major championships on the Champions Tour

William Clement Stone was an American businessman, philanthropist and New Thought self-help book author

Michelle LaVaughn Robinson Obama is an American attorney and author who served as the first lady of the United States from 2009 to 2017, being married to Barack Obama, the 44th president of the United States. Raised on the South Side of Chicago, Obama is a graduate of Princeton University and Harvard Law School.

Sir James Matthew Barrie, 1st Baronet, OM was a Scottish novelist and playwright, best remembered as the creator of Peter Pan. He was born and educated in Scotland and then moved to London, where he wrote several successful novels and plays

Theodore Roosevelt Jr., also known as Teddy or T. R., was the 26th president of the United States, serving from 1901 to 1909. Roosevelt previously was involved in New York politics, including serving as the state's 33rd governor for two years.

Michelangelo di Lodovico Buonarroti Simoni was an Italian sculptor, painter, architect, and poet during the High Renaissance. His work, inspired by classical antiquity, is considered to have profoundly influenced Western art. Michelangelo is best known for his ceiling frescoes in the Sistine Chapel, including *Scenes from Genesis* and *The Last Judgment*. His work is praised for its artistic realism and anatomical detail.

Winfrey is also the founder, CEO, and chair of Harpo Productions, a multimedia production company. She founded *O, The Oprah Magazine* and is a spokesperson and partial owner of several brands, including WW.

George Herman "Babe" Ruth was an American professional baseball player whose career in Major League Baseball spanned 22 seasons, from 1914 through 1935

Helmut Heinrich Waldemar Schmidt was a German politician and member of the Social Democratic Party of Germany, who served as the chancellor of West Germany from 1974 to 1982. Before becoming chancellor, he served as the minister of defence and the minister of finance in the government of Willy Brandt

Steven Paul Jobs was an American businessman, investor, and inventor who co-founded Apple Inc. with Steve Wozniak in the 1970s. Jobs and Wozniak launched the Apple II computer from his parents' garage, and Jobs is considered a pioneer of the microcomputer revolution. He also introduced the Apple Macintosh at a 1984 news conference at De Anza College, where he attended in the 1970s.

Sir Winston Leonard Spencer Churchill was a British statesman, military officer, and writer who was Prime Minister of the United Kingdom from 1940 to 1945 and again from 1951 to 1955

Audrey Hepburn was a Belgian-born British actress and humanitarian who starred in 31 films, including *Roman Holiday* (1953), *Breakfast at Tiffany's* (1961), and *My Fair Lady* (1964). The American Film Institute ranked her the third-greatest female screen legend of Classical Hollywood. Hepburn was also a fashion icon and muse for Givenchy, and was inducted into the International Best Dressed Hall of Fame.

Venus Ebony Starr Williams is an American inactive professional tennis player. She has been ranked as the world No. 1 in women's singles by the Women's Tennis Association for 11 weeks, and as the world No. 1 in women's doubles for 8 weeks

Émile Coué de la Châtaigneraie was a French psychologist, pharmacist, and hypnotist who introduced a popular method of psychotherapy and self-improvement based on optimistic autosuggestion

Theodor Seuss Geisel, who wrote and illustrated over 60 books under the pen name Dr. Seuss, was an American cartoonist and children's author. He added the "doctor" title in college to make his characters and writing more credible, and to respond to his father's wish for him to earn a doctorate. Though not a doctor, Dartmouth awarded him an honorary doctorate in 1955.

Anna Eleanor Roosevelt was an American political figure, diplomat, and activist. She was the longest-serving first lady of the United States, during her husband Franklin D. Roosevelt's four terms as president from 1933 to 1945. Through her travels, public engagement, and advocacy, she largely redefined the role

Nancy Tillman is an American author and illustrator of children's books. Tillman's picture books focus on the love parents have for their children with animals
