What's Happening in Mapleridge?

You may have noticed an influx of contractors digging up blocks at a time in certain areas. Or perhaps you may have received a Britta filter water system on your front porch and wondered where did it come from? I can assure you tiny homes are not being built. (At this current moment.) So, what's happening you say? Well, in July of 2023, Gary Brown Proposed for areas in Detroit to receive a water main and water service replacement. All existing lead pipes are to be replaced with copper from the water main to residence meters. Every year we experience numerous of water main breaks due to outdated pipes. The Water Main Replacement and Rehabilitation Project that is expected to take 70 years to complete the entire infrastructure, has made its way to Mapleridge community. Troester, Cedargrove, Hazelridge and Linnhurst are the streets being worked on. Cedargrove and linnhurst has already been started. DWSD prioritized its water main replacement program by making frequency of breaks and leaks in systems and communities that had a dense residence occupancy as high priority. It is expected to see a 0.78% increase on water bills for residents, due to the impact of construction cost. Murphy Pipeline Contractors LLC was awarded the bid to see this 2-year project out. The project started on 10/1/2023 and is expected to be completed by 9/30/25.

Community Outreach

The city was to conduct extensive community outreach and education to ensure the residents were aware of the program and know the process from start to finish. Not certain at what point, a nine-page information packet was supposed to be created specific to the Detroit program that would have had a project notice, frequently asked questions, flushing information and homeowner/occupant agreement to authorize replacement of the private portion of the lead service line. Community meetings were to be held at a nearby park, which would have been Stoudamire Park, (formerly known as Troester Park) vacant lot, a school, place of worship or virtual. They also planned to give out Bitta filter water systems to each house. Please share your thoughts, through email, on if you feel you were properly informed or not. How Are Things Going?

I took a ride through the project areas and snapped some pictures of the work sites. Here's what was found. All photos were taken 2/28/2024. Photos on the right are from Linnhurst street. Everything is well maintained and secure from residence or animals being harmed.

The photos below are from Cedargrove Street. A complaint has already been made for improper maintenance of the work sites. excavated holes were left accessible and water was leaking from the temporarily makeshifts where the fire hydrated were being replaced. (No pictures). They came out the next day and this is what it looks like now. (Photos below) Ultimately, the proposed project will significantly improve DWSD capability to provide reliable, high-quality water (at required service volume and pressure) to the residence for the next 50 years.

National Women's Month

In observance of National Women's Month, let's remember a few pioneer women who have made HERstory to be a blueprint for all women today.





Erma L. Henderson



Joann Watson



Ethelene Crockett



Esther Shapiro

Erma Henderson was acclaimed as Detroit's most powerful woman of her time. In 1972, She became the first black woman to serve on Detroit's City Council. 12 of those years was as President. In 1975 Erma Henderson organized the Michigan Statewide Coalition Against Redlining. In addition to having a school named after her on the westside of Detroit, she also has a park named after her on east Jefferson.

Joann Watson dedicated her life to public Service. Nicked name the "Supreme Mother of Our Beloved Community" while being awarded a Spirit of Detroit award. She was known for holding any and everyone accountable. Joann was the first woman to serve as the executive director of the Detroit NAACP.

Ethelene Jones Crockett was the first African American woman to become president of the American Lung Association. She was an advocate for public service daycare for working women as well as family planning. In 1972 Ethelene led the fight to liberalize Michigan's abortion laws.

Born to Jewish immigrants, Esther Shapiro became the first consumer education specialist at the Michigan consumer Credit Union League. In 1974, she was selected by former mayor Coleman Young, to serve as the director of the City of Detroit Department of Consumers Affairs.

FEMA Funding

Are you one of the 1,632 households that qualify for federal assistance? August 24-26, 2023, we experienced storms and tornados, causing major flooding and damage to many homes and vehicles. If you were affected by this disaster, here's how you can apply for federal home repair grants. Call the FEMA helpline at 800-621-3362 between 7am and 11pm. Or apply online at www.disasterassistance.gov. You can also use the FEMA mobile app. If you live in Mapleridge and need in-person help, contact your Neighborhood association Strength in Unity at strength.in.unityd4@gmail.com. If you do not live in Mapleridge and need in-person help, go to: bit.ly/FEMAapplicationprocess. To go somewhere in person, use FEMA.gov/DRC to locate the nearest disaster recovery center. Even if you have already made repairs, you should still call and apply. Here's what to expect... Once you apply, you will be contacted by a FEMA inspector to schedule a visit to your home. The phone call can be an out-of-state number or "unavailable". So be sure to answer all calls after you have completed your application. Next, the inspector will show up with an official photo ID and WILL NEVER ASK FOR BANK INFORMATION or MONEY in any form. They will inspect the damaged areas. The inspector will go over and verify your information with you. Finally, a decision will be made. You will receive a letter explaining FEMA's eligibility decision within 10 days. If awarded, you will receive a treasury check or direct deposit, based on what you selected during your application process. Applications will be closing on April 8, 2024. 

Occupy Yourself Garden Agricultural Academy location starts at Chalmers and Mayfield and covers 40 plus lots in the Mapleridge Community. What makes this garden unique is that it also offers gardening space to community members, who has the option to sale or keep their harvest, free of charge. Founder Donald Jones and his late wife Roxanne Jones has aligned themselves to be an educational incubator site within the Black Farmer Land Farm Fund, for the purpose of educating and helping new growers prepare to operate their own spaces. They also mentor in establishing outlets to sale their harvest at different farmers markets. Donny stated that he feels obligated to make growing and selling easier for community members. His vision for Occupy Yourself Garden, is to supply a significant portion of produce to the new Co-op market on Woodward and Euclid that is expected to open in May 2024, according to their website.

Animal Keeping Ordinance Update

February 27, 2024, The City Planning Commission held a public hearing meeting on a proposed ordinance that would allow animal-keeping in Detroit. The proposal has been under consideration for more than a decade. Community leaders in District 4 have been full advocates for this ordinance since the beginning.

Commissioners focus was on how the law will be enforced. It will take recommendation from the City Council for the ordinance to take place, by a vote. If this goes through, Detroiters will be allowed to keep chickens, ducks and honeybees. At a limit of course. Detroiters understand the need to grow our own food.



CITY OF DETROIT REDISTRICTING

Detroit city Council has voted on the new district boundaries for Detroit. Map 6 was chosen by all but one member. Map 5 was close to follow. Council member Angela Whitfield-Calloway voted for option 2. with the new map district 7 will lose Russel woods, Nardin Park and Desoto. the new districts will **go into effect in January 2026.** Districts will remain as they are now until then.

2024 Michigan Republican and Democratic Primary Elections Results

Republican Primary:

- · Projected Winner: Donald Trump
- · Votes for Donald Trump: 757,104 (68.1%)
- · Votes for Nikki Haley: 294,935 (26.5%)
- · Uncommitted: 33,405 (3.0%)
- Delegates: 16 delegates were allocated based on the primary results, while the remaining 39 delegates will be decided at a state party convention on Saturday.

Democratic Primary:

- · Projected Winner: Joe Biden
- · Votes for Joe Biden: 618,474 (81.0%)
- · Uncommitted: 101,113 (13.2%)
- · Votes for Marianne Williamson: 22,713 (3.0%)
- Delegates: A total of 117 delegates were up for grabs in the Democratic primary

STATE OF MICHIGAN REDISTRICTING

In 2018, voters approved of a proposal to establish an independent redistricting commission for congressional and state legislative districts for Michigan. Prior to this change, Republicans held control of the redistricting process.

Following the 2020 census, Michigan lost the 14th district, republicans no longer controlled the districting process. The Michigan Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission was called on to redraw legislative and congressional maps. Both maps were challenged in court for violating the Voting rights act by reducing the number of black-majority districts in Detroit.

February 3, 2022, the lawsuit against the state legislative and congressional districts was dismissed. The new district lines resulted in Detroit failing to elect a black member of Congress for the first time in nearly 70 years.

March 23, 2022, Detroiters organized and sued the MICRC for violating the Equal Protection Clause of the United States Constitution and the Voting Rights Act.

December 21, 2023, a three-judge panel of the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Michigan determined that the MICRC drew the boundaries of the plaintiffs' districts predominantly on the basis of race. The three-judge panel ordered the maps to be redrawn.

February 2024, MICRC voted to adopt a newly redrawn state house map that will be submitted to federal judges' potential adoption by the court. The selected maps make adjustments in House Districts 1-14 and minor change to District 16.

March 1, 2024: is the Commission deadline for submitting final House map to court.

Expected Timeline:

March 8, 2024: Plaintiffs file any objections to plan with court

March 15: Court-appointed expert submits review of the commission's work

March 29, 2024: Court date set for using implementing new House maps. Judges left open the option of using a plan drawn by a court-appointed expert if they deem the commission's work insufficient

April 12, 2024: Filing deadline for candidates in new state House Districts

August 6, 2024: Michigan primary election

November 5, 2024: Michigan general election
