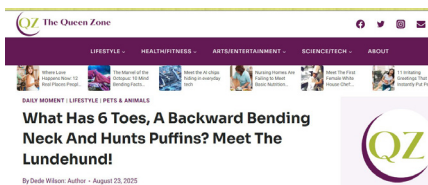
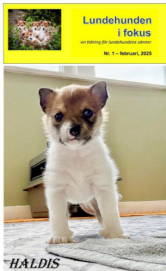
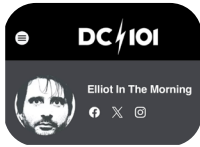
A Banner Year

NLAA Public Education Committee Chair: Kristina Maze

Thanks to the efforts of NLAA members and the club's Board, Norwegian Lundehunds received an unprecedented amount of publicity in 2025. Radio interviews, network television segments, local news channel coverage, printed publications, online magazine articles, and blogs spotlighting the rare breed reached thousands of viewers, readers, and listeners.

The public education efforts weren't limited to screens, paper, and airwaves. An increased number of in-person events throughout the year attracted large crowds curious to learn more about the bendy puffin dogs. To enhance visibility at events on the East Coast, NLAA's Board approved printing three eye-catching, 5-foot by 6-foot banners. One banner features a photo of two Lundehunds in a rocky snowscape while the other two banners detail the dog's physical anomalies and brush with extinction.

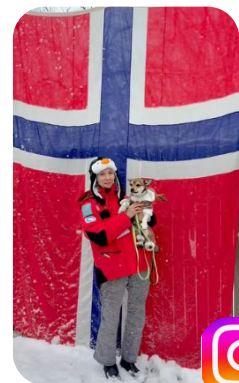
As more NLAA members volunteer their expertise at Nordic festivals and dog events in other parts of the United States, additional banners will be printed.

Committee Updates

Judges Education

NLAA Judge's Education Committee Chair: Cindy Stansell

It was a full house December 10 at Orlando, Florida's Orange County Convention Center, with 35 American Kennel Club judges—the maximum allowable—attending the Norwegian Lundehund Judge's Education seminar.

AKC Judge and NLAA Secretary Cindy Stansell led the seminar, with a morning lecture (top left photo) about the rare breed and an afternoon hands-on training session. The latter emphasized the nuances of the table examination, including counting all the toes, checking the dog's foot pads, and how to evaluate the rare breed's unique rotary gait.

The judges divided into small groups to examine six Norwegian Lundehunds (2 dogs and 4 bitches) on separate tables (center photos). The groups then stood at each corner of the large training room and watched every dog perform two down-and-backs and a walk around.

Cindy received special permission from AKC to demonstrate the Lundehund's extreme flexibility. Kim Dingman Bond volunteered her dog, Muggles, to show the 90 degree extension of the front legs (bottom left photo) and the head bent back to touch the spine. Cindy repeatedly told judges in attendance they are neither permitted to do this when examining a dog nor are they allowed to instruct a handler to bend the dog's neck or extend the front legs.

Cindy continued to teach more judges about Norwegian Lundehunds with in-person tutor sessions and ringside mentoring. After watching the Lundehunds compete in the Best of Breed ring December 13, Cindy used an impromptu table (photo, bottom right) to give several judges the opportunity to see close-up the dogs' various toes, bites, and amber eye hues.

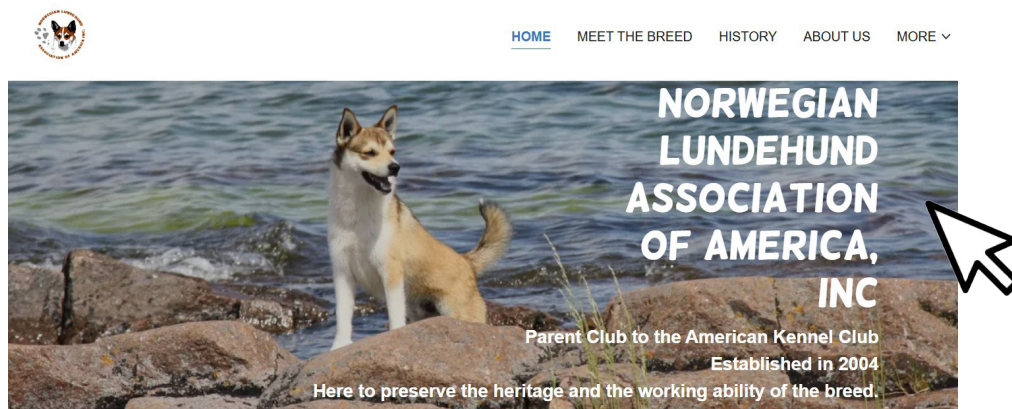

NLAA is hosting a Zoom Q&A webinar with Ingvild Svorkmo Espelien Saturday, January 24, 2026, starting at 12 noon Eastern Time.



Ingvild is a biologist and geneticist in Norway and the owner of Kennel Vinterskogen. She leads the Norwegian Lundehund Club's Breeding Council and has served on the Norwegian Kennel Klubb's Board and also its Health and Breeding Committee. Ingvild's work experience includes the clubs' officially sanctioned cross-breeding project—called the “genetic rescue”—of Norwegian Lundehunds, which began in 2014.

Feature

Morris & Essex

Four Norwegian Lundehunds were among the 4,455 dogs entered in the Morris & Essex Kennel Club dog show October 1, 2025, in Somerset, NJ. Held at Colonial Park, the outdoor show's prestigious pedigrees and exhibitor pageantry pay homage to the first dog show Ethel Geraldine Rockefeller Dodge helped organize in 1927.

Mrs. Dodge loved dogs but disliked how dog shows were managed, so she used her wits and wealth to develop a more practical, less time-consuming approach to the sport. Working with local clubs Morris and Essex, Mrs. Dodge's vision became a reality: Her New Jersey estate's 4,000-acre polo field was transformed into multiple rings, with enough judges for nearly every breed. Boxed lunches were served during a scheduled midday break and Best in Show concluded as the sun set. The show's format was a hit and continued in this fashion for decades.

Now held every five years, the much-anticipated event attracts dogs, handlers, and spectators by the thousands.

Wearing costumes from the 1920s through the 1940s for the Morris & Essex show was encouraged—and exhibitors, judges, vendors, and spectators didn't disappoint. The glad rags, vintage cars, and perfect weather put people in a festive mood. The tensest moment wasn't ringside but rather waiting in a long line to park.

AKC Judge and NLAA Secretary Cindy Stansell presided over the Best of Breed ring. Kim Dingman Bond showed Muggles, Kristina Maze showed Anja, Barb Cohl showed Haldis, and Andrew Giangreco showed Dagny. Dagny was selected Best of Breed, Muggles Best of Opposite Sex, and Anja Select Bitch.

After lunch and a bit of shopping, the Lundie owners arranged their chairs directly in front of the Group ring's fencing. By the time Non-Sporting showed (it was the second group), the rows of spectators were five deep.

Andrew handled Dagny, who showed alongside many of AKC's top-ranked Non-Sporting dogs. Andrew is experienced with handling Lundehunds and has also assisted with Norwegian Lundehund Judge's Education seminars. Dagny appears at minute 17:24 on [AKC.TV's Non-Sporting Group](#) coverage. (NLAA is working with AKC to correct the Lundie weight range!)
