Senate tally in favor of the Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring Our PACT Act, passed June 16, which would historically expand services and disability benefits for millions of former military personnel who were exposed to toxic burn pits, a contaminated air base in Uzbekistan, Agent Orange in previously denied locations and atomic radiation cleanup sites around the world. The House passed a similar measure, and the legislation was expected to reach President Biden's desk in mid-July.
