I had occasion to talk with Mr. Sears, of the Forest Practice Act, yesterday. You will remember he spoke to us last year. He informs that the Conservation Dept. has taken an aerial picture of our property and he is now working on a report for us which should be finished this month sometime. I spoke to him again about the timber at the head of the lake and he stated that it should come ~~down~~ leaving everything under 12 inches.

For your information, I asked Mr. Sears to give me the low down on the fly situation. He stated that the Conservation Dept. had absolutely nothing to do about releasing the flies. He informed that these large black flies are a parasite that follows the tent caterpillar. These flies lay their eggs on the tent caterpillar which form small maggots, which in turn destroy caterpillar and eggs. This may get rid of some caterpillars but I don't know what's going to get rid of the flies, unless it is the fly traps that some of you have.

Our territory was sprayed this year but too late to affect the caterpillars much, they had already done their work. The wet spring was the cause for the delay as the spray is not effective on wet foliage.

The State have purchased all land touching on our property. Eventually, all boundaries will be surveyed - by the State- The lines have already been established on the west side of the lake. If you property owners in the area back of Bud Drakes camp - the old Boardway camp- will notice, you will find you~~x~~back lines very well marked.

During extremely dry times, the fire hazard is very serious here at the lake. When everyone is in camp, there are something like 75 camps open and each camp have several young people. Most of them do not realize what a fire will do, it is therefore up to us oldsters to try to instill in them the preventative measures and the value of our forests. I have asked Bill Hardy to speak to you ~~about it~~ on this subject later.

Your association own several very desireable camp ~~lot~~ sights. We have gone over these very carefully and have set a price of \$500.00 each on these lots, with possible exceptions where more than one lot is in question.

We have maps of the lake available at the usual price of \$2.50 each. You can buy one here to-night from Warren Grouner. There are also these books of Lake Titus, which were published last year at quite an expense and a lot of effort on the part of Elizabeth Donovan and her committee. Any of you wishing one, can have it to-night for the asking. You will find it very handy for reference around your camp. These books will be on sale at Smallman's store at .50¢ each and the maps at \$2.50 each.

We were very fortunate last year having no fatalities on the lake, however, we must be on the alert at all times. There are many more small motor boats than in previous years, which is all the more reason we should try to comply with the navigation rules set forth by your Association. Most important, I think, is the matter of lights on all craft of any discription after dark also that all rafts display lights after dark. These rafts are a great hazard, espically on dark nights. PLEASE, everyone try to observe these rules so we can avoid every possibility of an accident this summer. Mike will go into more detail later.

July 7, 1953

An executive meeting of the L.T.F.A. was held at Morton House's camp. Marshall Kissane, George Hanna, Morton House, and Elizabeth Donovan were present. Negotiations were underway concerning the nature timber at the head of the lake. A nominating committee was set up - composed of Margaret Fisk, chairman, Elmer Drake, and Evelyn Badger. Dr. Warren Crowner was put in charge of Sports and entertainment; George Hanna, in charge of Fishing and real estate; and lumber; Dr. Kissane, in charge of the beach and navigation.

July 8, 1953 Annual meeting of the L.T.F.A. - camp Lynnbrook - 8 p.m.

Pres. House called the meeting at 8 p.m. and requested the secretary to read the call of the meeting and the minutes of the 1952 annual meeting. A motion was made by Mrs. Robert Hale and seconded by Mary Kissane that the minutes be accepted as read.

Dr. Crowner gave the treasurer's report and stated that there was a balance of \$45.50. Kleft in the beach fund. Robert Hale moved that the treasurer's report be accepted and Milton Valois seconded.

Pres. House then gave his report, stating that the beach committee was to be congratulated. He announced that the state has purchased all land adjacent to the L.T.F.A. property. In navigation, he warned that all craft should have lights and all rafts should be lighted.

Under unfinished business, the nomination committee under the chairmanship of Margaret Fisk recommended that the same officers be retained. Claude Clark so moved, seconded by Dr. Kissane. The following officers were reelected.

Under new business, William Hardy gave a talk on fire hazards, mentioning again the fire at Blueberry Point. He suggested that we promote our own protection and buy a portable pump - costing between \$500 and \$600. It was moved by Milton Valois that Evelyn Badger, Claude Clark, William be formed as an investigating committee to look into this and report to the Board. Seconded by Dr. Crowner.

Dr. Kissane made a report on navigation, and on the beach dev. He consulted the troopers on the problem of boats without lights. They constituted a public hazard. A buoy was placed opposite Badgers' again. - 100 ft. out. Boats should stay outside this buoy. The channel in the outlet was marked by 2 x 4s. He suggested that Father and Sons teams take care of navigation. As far as the beach was concerned, there was the possibility of developing it as a picnic area and also an overnight camping area.

A discussion then arose as to the value of the trees at the end of the lake. There was pro and con discussion as to the advisability of cutting the only virgin timber left on the lake. Committee of teenagers suggested the money from the trees be used to build a club house. In the discussion that followed was brought out the problem of entertainment as far as the teenagers were concerned. Finally, Robert Coughlin was appointed as chairman of the teenagers with Mrs. Badger as advisor. He was to report to the Bd. of Directors.

The fishing problem was then brought up by Milton Valois. George Hanna had talked with the Conservation Dep't- a long range fishing program was being studied.

Some of the committees were announced. Robert Coughlin agreed to take charge of the Swimming meet; John Lynn, the softball game in July; William Lytle, softball in August. Mary Coughlin and Orde Valois were to take charge of the annual picnic. Trails were to be charge of Laura Allen, Margaret Fisk, and Caroline Massey. In charge of fire protection were William Hardy, William Lytle, William Smallman, and Marshall Kissane.

After a rising vote of thanks to Mrs. Lynn, the meeting was adjourned. Refreshments then were served under the chairmanship of Janette Clark and Gladys Crowner.

July 26

An executive meeting was held at Coughlin's camp. A small portable pump weighing 60 lb costing around ~~\$150~~ <sup>\$125</sup> dollars was recommended. There was no surplus available. It was suggested that the L.T.P.A. buy pump and the Callfiremen furnish hose and maintain equipment. From June 15 to Sept. 15, the pump would be available to campers. A place would be reserved for it on Dr. Kissane's dock at Smallman's. George Hanna moved that \$150 be set aside for fire fighting equipment and Dr. Crowner seconded the motion.

Robert Coughlin and Mrs. Badger made a report on the teenagers' committee. A Junior L.T.P.A. was being formed and officers were elected. They hoped to work in conjunction with the Senior group. They had many plans for raising money, including a food sale and fashion show. The possibility of sites for a club house were discussed. It was recommended that advisory groups from both organizations work together. The Bd. of Directors went on record approving the formation of the Junior L.T.P.A. and the fund raising projects and building to be erected.

I welcome all you members, friends, and guests, and kids, to this 1952 annual meeting. Every shore ~~free~~ owner of property is eligible to election to membership by the Board of Trustees and I hope that you will induce your neighbors who have not joined to get on the band wagon in a hurry. We need them in the Association.

#### FOREST PRACTICE ACT

We are now members of the Forest Practice Act under the supervision of the Conservation Commission. (This will be explained to you later by our guests)

We had an opportunity to sell some hard wood on the 400 acre lot on the west side of the lake taking in Maple Hill. On March 14'th I called a special meeting of your trustees and they appointed Milt Valois and me a committee to investigate. I got hold of Harry Holcomb, who is of the Conservation Commission, and we went over the property. He advised that it would help the forest to cut the large trees so that the smaller trees would have a chance to grow.

We let the contract to George Faubert. This wood is being sold to the Jamestown Sterling Corp., Jamestown, N.Y., who have a mill at Moira. We are paid direct from the Jamestown Sterling Corp. and have received to 7/5 \$195.30. He has built a ~~gravel~~ road through this property and the Call Firemen could run a truck in there should the occasion arise.

It is estimated that there is between 700 and 1000 cords of this wood available for which we get \$5.00 per cord on the stump. You can see that this cutting is not disturbing the beauty of the forest as some of this wood has been cut on the lake side of Maple Hill.

There is also a lot of timber to be sold, (which will be explained by our guests) At the present time it is a matter of getting this timber out of the woods and if so, the best way. I want you to know that your Board of Trustees do not make a move in regard to cutting timber without the advice and supervision of the Forest Practice Act.

#### BEACH

At a special meeting of the Board of Trustees held at the lake July 11'th, it was decided to develop the beach at the head of the lake so that it can be used conveniently for paid up members of the Assoc. Possibly it cannot all be done this year but we are making a dock that will accomodate power boats docking and tying. We plan to remove debris from the edge of the shore allowing the sand to wash up and form a beach, also to cut lily pads etc. This is a wonderful sand beach and inasmuch as the lower beach is closed to all of us. there is no reason in our estimation why this beach should not be developed and used by the Assoc. This development is going to cost something but with volunteers from you campers we will be able to do this very reasonably.

We all realize that times have changed at Lake Titus since we were kids. Nearly all of us so-called old timers were kids at the lake. We needed no entertainment in those days. Maybe there were not so many of us, I don't know, but at the present time there are well over 125 kids on the lake, and in order to keep their interest and their wish to come back in years to come, we have got to make it attractive to them. We have some of the best trained teachers in wood craft, water sports, boating etc, right here in our Assoc.

## BOOK

At long last we have a new Lake Titus book. I think the committee headed by Elizabeth Donovan have done an excellent job. The others on this committee are Laura Allen, Margaret Pisk, Marjorie Lynn Griffith, Bob Hale and Lois House.

Through a mutual friend I got 300 of these books printed for \$170.00. The trustees figured that the merchants in Malone had been hit hard enough, with the Sesqui-Centennial book, the Malone Directory, telephone book and the High School year book, so we sent this book to press with no advertising.

We have decided to give each paid up member one of these books and charge \$1.00 for each additional copy. These copies will be available for sale at Smallman's store or from the treasurer. The treasurer will give you one tonight as you pay your dues.

## PRICE OF LOTS

On Feb. 18'th the trustees had a meeting at Dr. Marshall Kissane's home to discuss the sale of lots and several other matters. We decided to put a price of \$500.00 on each lot. If anyone wished to purchase a block of lots the price would be somewhat reduced. This, we figure, will keep out undesirables who might put up a cheap lean-to or other building that would not become Lake Titus. I think you can see that we are trying to keep the lake as near as possible to the way the founders of this Assoc. meant it to be.

I will read the first paragraph of the by-laws which is self explanatory.

## BY-LAWS

This is the aim of the Assoc. at the present time, although times have changed and the Assoc. has grown greater since 1923.

## TAXES

We have spent quite some time getting the taxes straightened out. I believe this problem is practically solved now. The taxes last year were ~~same~~.

We owe several of the members on certificate of indebtedness \$20.00.

If this wood contract turns out okay we will have in the neighborhood of \$2500.00. However, we can't count our chickens before they are hatched. In other words, we are operating very close to the cushion.

I might remind you that there are still available at Smallman's the map we had printed last year.

We also put in about 10,000 legal size rainbow trout last year. Your guess is as good as mine where they are.

I want to thank the various committees for their cooperation in making the ~~various~~ activities so successful during the past year; and to especially thank the officers and trustees for their helpfulness and advice. Thank you very much.

To date we have received approximately \$625.00 from the sale of hardwood, on the area known as Maple Hill. There are still several hundred cords available in this section. We had some trouble with the contractor originally cutting this wood and had to get rid of him. At the present time there is no lumber operation going on on any of our property. We have a very good operator in view who will continue this operation as soon as he finishes lumbering on State Land on Little Humbug.

While we are on the subject of lumbering your officers have under consideration, the cutting of Spruce and Hemlock at the head of the lake, back of the sand beach. We have been told by members of the Forest Practice Act, that the large Spruce and Hemlock should be cut. I have personally gone over this area with a lumber operator and he would take down nothing under 12 or 14 inches at the butte. These large trees blow down every year and your directors feel they should derive the financial benefit while they are merchantable. There is roughly 100,000 ft. of lumber in this area which will net us 700 or 800 hundred dollars possibly more. There are thousands of young spruce now growing and getting rid of these large trees will give them a chance to develop. We do not feel that this will affect the beauty of the lake in any respect. I wish you would give us your views on this later.

The beach committee, headed by Mike Kissane should be commended for the work they have done and it has been hard work too, all volunteer labor by the members. There is a slide for the younger kids and several rafts for the older ones. This committee is also clearing a space for a picnic area adjacent to the beach. The more volunteers they can get, the sooner you will all benefit. Mike will speak to you later on this subject.

President Howe called the meeting at 8:00 and requested me to read the call of the meeting and the minutes of 1951 annual meeting - a motion was made by Laura Allen and seconded by Robert Hale that the minutes be accepted as written.

President Howe then gave his report to the association first stressing the importance of membership in the ass. then reviewing the Forest Practice act and its advantages to me in regard to our forest holdings - He told about a meeting of the Board which appointed Milton Valois and himself to act in regard to the selling of standing wood on Maple Hill to the Jamestown Sterling Co. under direction of G. Fabre - The association has received to date \$195.00 for the wood and the forest land is unharmed by the cutting - The woodsmen have made a reasonable road into the property which would be a help in case of fire - It is estimated that there is <sup>700 to 1000</sup> ~~700,000~~ cords available on the property - The Board is in complete control of the lumbering.

President Howe then spoke about the Board's decision to purchase the upper sand beach for the ass. and their funds - The project would start with the removing debris - weeds etc. pushing back shore gravel to enlarge sand area - building a landing for motor craft - installation of slides and raft and that most the work involved be being volunteered by the Campers. He said that we have about 125 kids on the lake and hoped the beach

would help train them for camp life as well as be a source of entertainment.

The next subject was about the revised S.T.P.A. ~~minutes~~ Booklet edited by Elig. Hanovan and a Committee composed of Laura Allen, M. Griffith, Bob Hale, J. Howe, <sup>W. Fisk</sup>. The Booklet cost \$70.00 and contained no advertisements - One booklet would be given to each member when he or she paid their dues and any extra copies would cost \$1.00 and could be secured from the treasurer or Bill Smallman.

He then told about the Special Board Meeting which set the price on the lots held by ass. at \$500.00 each, <sup>paid</sup> singly, but in a block sale, the price would be proportionately lower.

President Howe said that the ass. owed about \$600.00 for taxes. He spoke about the map of the Lake issued in 1951 that was on sale at Smallman's - He said that 10,000 legal trout had been liberated <sup>from the lake.</sup>

He read <sup>from the purpose</sup> of the ass. (to be found on page 14 of new Booklet) and thanked the Board and various committees for their cooperation during the year then called on the Com. Chas. to read their reports.

Pres. Report July 17 1951.

Welcome to everyone:- As you know, every owner of shore front property is eligible for election to membership by the Board of Trustees, and it's a pleasure to see so many members, their friends and guests present.

During the past year we have lost one of our old members, Dr. Rust. Although he was not active in the past few years, he always took a great interest in the welfare of the Association and Lake Titus activities. He will be greatly missed by all of us.

Your trustees have posted navigation rules at each camp and boathouse. It is especially important that these rules be observed for the safety of all concerned. It is very important that power boats reduce their speed approaching shore or landing docks - there may be people swimming in the immediate vicinity. Furthermore, it is of utmost importance that small craft, such as outboard motor boats, row boats, canoes, carry running lights at all times after dusk. Bill Smallman will show you a very inexpensive set of lights that can be connected to your boat.

We have landing docks and signs at the trails to Mt. Immortelle, Cathedral Rocks, and Elephants Head for the convenience of the hikers. We have also posted signs at the two roads leading into the outlet, reading, "Private Road, for use of property owners only. Launch boats at Smallman's dock."

During the spring fishing season, many people carry ~~an~~ outboard motor boats up here and launch them wherever they can find a spot in the outlet. They observe none of our rules: start fires on docks, and have no consideration for private property. By going to Smallman's dock, Bill can acquaint these people with the rules and allow no undesirable persons to use the lake. In this connection I want to ask the younger people to be more thoughtful of these rules and do everything they can to make the lake safe for all the campers and themselves. We are all up here to have a good time and we do not want it dampened by such an accident as we had last year.

The Conservation Dep't. have stocked the lake with about 20,000 rainbow and speckled trout during the past year. We should have fishing here some day.

It looks as though the West side will have lights, if not this year, surely next. The cutting of the power right of way is progressing in very good shape.

We all enjoyed the L.T.P.A. "Newsletter" published last year by Elizabeth Donovan, and she has consented to continue this publication again this year.

- At a special meeting of the Association held this spring at the Wead Library, it was unanimously voted to purchase all property owned by the Parmelee Estate adjacent to Lake Titus. This included all building lots, property at the outlet including property that the dam is on, Maple Hill, and approximately 300 acres at the head of the lake including the sand beach and the lake side of Mt. Immortelle. A map has been made showing the land purchased. This map is revised to July 1951 from the 1940 tax map. Copies of this map may be purchased from Bob Hale <sup>at</sup> \$2.50 each. It shows the brooks, trails, and property owners. You will notice that each camp has a number. This is in case of fire or accident. The State Police

and Call Firemen have a copy of this map. I would suggest that each camp display their number in a conspicuous place.

A note was put in the Farmers Bank for \$1000.00, signed by Mike Kissane, Bob Hale, and myself, to purchase this property. It was voted that we issue certificates of indebtedness to members to finance this deal, and we have about \$600.00 of this amount to date. Anyone wishing to purchase one of these certificates may do so by seeing Bob Hale. They will draw no interest but will be paid back as soon as we have the money.

Since purchasing this property we have sold \$161.00 worth of ash on Maple Hill and more coming. Lots to Bill Roberts, \$250.00, and a possible sale of right of way for \$200.00. I think this was a very wise move as the Association now owns everything on the lake that is not privately owned and I believe we can finance the deal O.K. The taxes are about \$125.00 per year on the entire purchase. *There will be more later, under the head of New Business*

It has been a pleasure to work with this board for the past year. Quite a few problems of vital importance have arisen and the board has cooperated one hundred per cent.

We are now further informed that one of the Channell heirs is seriously ill. Also that there are lumber interests anxious to acquire this property if the property were to be sold at public auction.

At the present time the Association has an opportunity to purchase the Channell or Parmelee holdings for the sum of \$1,500.00. This includes property at the outlet, all of Maple Hill, the upper sand beach, much of Mt. Immortelle, including the Palisades, and about 25 camp lots. The total land involved is between seven and eight hundred acres.

The trustees of the Association held a meeting Feb. 21, 1951 and were unanimous in their opinion that the Association should acquire this property so that they could control the lake and keep it in its natural beauty. They felt that if a lumber company should purchase this property they would float their logs down the lake, thus making a menace to navigation. Furthermore, if the land were denuded of trees, it would seriously diminish drinking water sources as well as spoil our natural shore line.

We will hold the special meeting for the purpose of taking action on the above mentioned proposal to purchase the Parmelee properties at \$1,500.00 upon such conditions and terms as may be agreed upon by the Association and the trustees of the Channell estate.

We are enclosing a postal card proxy which we wish you would sign and post by return mail if you are unable to attend the meeting in person.

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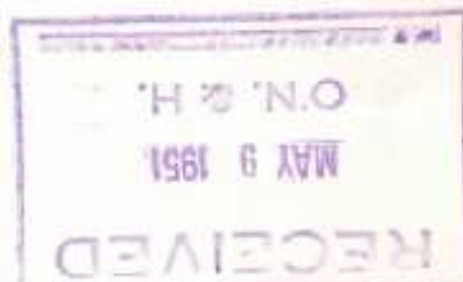

PRESIDENT'S REPORT-JULY 26'th,1950.

1. WELCOME TO EVERYONE. As you know , every owner of shore front property is eligible for election to membership by the board of trustees and it is swell to see so many members, their friends and guests, present.
2. It is of extreme sorrow that we have lost three members of our association. Fred Fisk, George Moore, and Miss Jessie Child, during the past year. Both Fred Fisk and George Moore have served as officers of this association, and will be greatly missed for their advice and cooperation. We deeply regret the passing of Miss Child.
3. Last year a survey was made by the Conservation Dep't. and will be read by Bob Hale later. This Spring another survey was made by the Conservation Dep't. who sent four men and equipment up here for three day's work. They put out nets in various parts of the lake. At the upper inlet they got a 14 pound brown trout 32 inches long. The report of this survey this year has not as yet been received.  

In September 8000 legal sized speckled trout were put in the lake. In October 15000 rainbow fingerlings and this Spring before the ice went out 5000 legal sized rainbows.
4. In January we had a bad wind storm which blew down many trees making most of the trails impassable. Margaret Fisk, who is chairman of this committee, will report later .
5. There was quite a little damage to docks this year, as the ice went out three times this winter.
6. You will notice the disappearance of the eye sore of the Hanna boathouse opposite Smallman's dock. Milton Valois has received written permission to allow us to tear this

boathouse down. The association paid for this operation.

7. It has been a privilege and a pleasure to work with this board of trustees for the past year. We all have the interests of Lake Titus at heart and the entire board has cooperated to the fullest extent.

## Lake Titus Protective Association.

The Annual Meeting of the Lake Titus Protective Association was held at the camp of John P. Badger, on Saturday, August 18th.

At this meeting the following were elected Officers and Trustees: G. H. Hale, President; Libe Washburn, Vice-President; C. Wells Russell, Secretary and Treasurer; William L. Allen and John P. Badger.

It was decided to incorporate the organization that it may acquire and hold real estate.

Board Meeting July 12, 1948

President Allen called the meeting to order at his camp at 8:00 P.M. All the members with the exception of Lawrence Porter were present.

The posted sign at the dam should be renewed.

Next in the order of business was a discussion of the state of the Lake Shore and water - It was agreed that the lake was free of floating obstacles - A suggestion was made that canyons be informed of the dangers to motor craft of their careless throwing floating timber into the lake - Also it was suggested that a letter from the L.T.P.A. to Robert Hanna concerning the unsightly condition of his property might influence

to do something about it.

In view of the fact that the navigation laws were being enforced it was thought wise to bring <sup>boat</sup> licence blanks to the annual <sup>unannounced</sup> meeting for the convenience of the boat owners and also to again stress the rules and regulations concerning power boats.

Robert Hale told of discovering a fire burning on "Blackberry Point" which had been started by candles <sup>if unattended</sup>. The consequences would have been very serious if it had remained undetected. It was decided to ask Mr. Moore to draw up a proper sign that could be posted in the hope that such an act would induce further thoughtfulness and be a help in preserving our forest.

The subject of fire fighting equipment was discussed - Unless the equipment could be available with speed and handled with efficiency, it would be more desirable that to acquire the equipment or the expense involved. The subject was left open for discussion at a later date.

President Allen adjourned the meeting at 8:30 and then followed informal talk and refreshments.

§ 402.

A person, who, with intent to commit some crime therein, breaks and enters, in the night time, the dwelling-house of another, in which there is at the time a human being:

1. Being armed with a dangerous weapon; or,
2. Arming himself therein with such a weapon; or,
3. Being assisted by a confederate actually present; or,
4. Who, while engaged in the night time in effecting such entrance, or in committing any crime in such a building, or in escaping therefrom, assaults any person,

Is guilty of burglary in the first degree.

§ 403.

A person who, with intent to commit some crime therein, breaks and enters the dwelling-house of another in which there is a human being, under circumstances not amounting to burglary in the first degree, is guilty of burglary in the second degree.

A person who,

§ 404.

1. With intent to commit a crime therein, breaks and enters a building, or a room, or any part of a building; or,
2. Being in any building, commits a crime therein and breaks out of the same,

Is guilty of burglary in the third degree.

§ 405.

A person who, under circumstances or in a manner not amounting to a burglary, enters a building, or any part thereof, with intent to commit a felony or a larceny, or any malicious mischief, is guilty of a misdemeanor.

§ 406.

A person who, having entered a building under such circumstances as to constitute burglary in any degree, commits any other crime therein, is punishable therefore, as well as for the burglary; and may be prosecuted for each crime, separately, or in the same indictment.

1. Burglary in the first degree, for not less than ten years.

MR. HOUSE has served for three years on the organization's Board of Trustees and is a camper of long standing at the Lake.

Others on the slate that was presented by a nominating committee composed of Mrs. Willard Ames, Miss Esther Northridge and Lawrence Wilson were: Miss Margaret P. Fisk and Robert F. Hale who were re-elected as secretary and treasurer respectively, and Louis J. Child and Edward Skowrya, trustees.

Miss Laura C. Allen, retiring president, had held that post for three terms and prior to that served on the Board as secretary and vicepresident for seven years; Lawrence Porter, retiring trustee, had served three terms in that position.

Ward Castle presided during the nominations and election.

The more than 60 campers who attend the meeting at Mrs. Raymond Lynn's camp heard reports on the principal activities that concern the organization.

Mr. Hale stated a comfortable balance in the treasury; Miss Fisk described the condition of trail maintenance; Morton House and Lawrence Porter told of problems and action taken in connection with controlling the water level in the lake. ness the gathering and answer questions. Dr. Lawrence is Senior Biologist, Northern Fisheries District, N. Y. State Conservation Dept., with headquarters at Saranac Lake.

He and his crew had just completed a three day field survey of fishing at Lake Titus. Dr. Lawrence based his remarks on his observations of general conditions and on the variety and poundage of the fish taken by seining, netting and electric shocking in the lake and its contributory streams. The survey will not be finished until the material can be studied in the laboratory.

According to Dr. Lawrence, complete elimination of perch and other "weed fish" from a lake the size of Titus is hopelessly high in cost; he emphasized that study of new methods, that may make such a procedure practical some time in the future, are under constant scientific study and experimentation. When asked to advisability of introducing another type of fish such as bass or pickerel, Dr. Lawrence said that aside from the fact that it would be extremely unlikely that the Conservation Dept. would allow it in the upper reaches of a watershed containing trout, in only one instance in the Adirondacks has such a plan been in anyway successful, for the new fish taper off and become less numerous and stunted in growth within a very few seasons.

**IN CONCLUSION** Dr. Lawrence said that considering the facts that the native brook trout is the least able to compete with a population of other fish and the brown trout are taken by only the most successful fishermen, the Conservation Department will continue to stock the lake with rainbow of good size. The fishermen at Lake Titus can look forward to some trout fishing and a lot of perch fishing, and that the latter should by no means be looked down upon from the standpoint providing good eating.

Upon adjournment of the meeting a standing vote of thanks was offered Mrs. Lynn for her hospitality and to Miss Allen for her service as president. Everyone seemed to enjoy refreshment by the entertainment headed by M

Board Meeting Aug. 30, 1948 Lauris Camp

President Allen called the meeting to order at 7:15 P.M. - The minutes of the July 18th meeting were read and approved - President Allen inquired of Treasurer Hale how the "500 dues" were coming in - Mr. Hale said "about as usual" - that the members, regardless of the amount, followed much the same routine - It was decided to ask Mr. Skowron to be chairman of a membership committee, whose duty it would be to track down the non-payers and present to them the benefits they received from the work of the S.T. P.A. Also that the committee should start functioning June 1, 1949. The annual picnic was discussed and declared a success and various improvements were suggested - It was agreed to give Mrs. Tullback (chairman of entertainment com.) the responsibility of arranging the 1949 events - President Allen asked for a report of "fixed expenses" of the ans. Mrs. Hale responded that Ralph Williams receives \$0.00 annually for the care of the dam - that Bill Smallman collected \$10.00 for removing floating obstacles from the lake. - It was decided by the board that the job ~~was~~ <sup>would be</sup> a responsibility of the "navigation com." from now on and did not authorize Bill to collect any and did not authorize Bill to collect any dues he removed unless specifically hired for that duty. His fee ~~is~~ <sup>variable</sup> for accompanying the troops during inspection tours was left unchanged - The expenses of the annual picnic and meeting are also "fixed expenses" though variable.

There is always the question of the dam - Mrs. Porter agreed to be responsible for the decision of making any change in the flow of water - It is the aim of the board to arrange the spill way so that the flow of water is continuous at a definite level - The gate locks, abutment and particularly installed, will be the answer we hope

Next in order was a discussion of the duties of the management committee - President Allen recommended that the chairmanship of the com. be changed from Mr. Woyet to Mr. Valais. It seemed wise to have a person who was on hand the year around to take charges. For years the S.T.P.A. has authorized the blocking of rocks in the lower outlet channel - They are still there. The Board agreed to the appointment of Mr. Valais as chair. of new com.

The subject of the lumbering operations on "Maple Hill" was the next topic to be discussed. It was agreed that a letter should be sent to the land owners which notified them of the possibility of lumbering operations, thus giving them a chance of buying their back land or striving to arrange a protection for the beauty of our lake horizons.

It seems that the work of the trapline inspector would be greatly abetted by some sort of distinguishing camp owner maps - The sect. agreed to work out a system for him and for the records of the sec.

Dr. Lawrence's address and advice was discussed at length - President Allen checked her list of fishermen who would be interested in receiving envelopes to record fish scales for the Conservation Dept.

The signs concerning fire warnings to be posted at such spots as "The Golden Point", "Paines Point" etc. were approved.

The Meeting was adjourned at 10:50 P.M. Refreshments were served by President Allen.

Annual Meeting July 16, 1947  
at Camp Lyman Brook

The meeting was called to order by President Laura Allen at 8:20 P.M. - There were 47 persons present and 21 were property owners (voters).

The minutes of the 1946 meeting were read and approved.

President Allen spoke about the splendid record we had made in meeting the expenses of the dam through the \$10,000 assessment. She told about the success of the 1946 picnic and reviewed our trail clearing "bee" - She reviewed the Trustees' meetings held since the 1946 annual meeting and discussed the need for equipment to fight fires.

Reports of the standing committees  
Entertainment - Fredricka Allen discussed plans for annual picnic and it was voted to have it Wed. July 30<sup>th</sup>.

Trails - M. Fisk reported that the trails were in very bad shape due to the unseasonable snow storm Oct. 1, 1946 - Mr. Moore recommended that the L.T.P.A. hire men to clear them and also to fix the dock at the foot of the Immortelle trail.

Navigation Mrs. Wright reported for Mrs. Wright - The Lake shore had been patrolled for floating obstacles - Bill Smallman said he had removed several logs from the outlet.

President Allen reviewed navigation laws and stressed with 3 reasons why speed boats should travel up and down the middle of the lake -

- 1 - to protect swimmers
- 2 - " " small craft
- 3 - to conserve shore line -

Mr. Valois said that he had written to Albany inquiring about the rules for licensing motor boats and had received the information that all motor propelled boats in navigable waters had to be licensed -

Annual Meeting

1946 July 18

The Annual meeting of the Lake Titus Protective Association was held on July 18, 1946 at 7:30 P.M. at Camp Lynnbrook.

Twenty-six members were present in person or by proxy in a meeting of forty-five persons. President Moore presided.

L.T.P.A. meeting - August 1, 1945

1945

A special meeting of the members of the Lake Titicaca Protective Assoc. was held on Wednesday, August 1, 1945; at 7:30 P.M. at Camp Lyndonbrook.

Thirty-five persons were present; Mr. George Moore, president, presiding.

The chairman read the call of the meeting sent on July 24 as attached. Bobo Hale moved that the first proposed amendment to the constitution be accepted and after discussion it was passed unanimously.

After consideration of the second amendment proposition a favorable resolution was carried unanimously. Annual dues for associate members were set at \$2.00.

A summary of the minutes of the 1944 Annual meeting were accepted as presented by the secretary.

Mr. Moore stated that although the Trustees have been on the job there was little to report; but he noted that, prewar years not excepted, this is one of the most successful camping years ever.

The Treasurer's report was accepted as attached. Mr. Hale pointed out that 1944 dues came in after the annual meeting last summer, and are now still coming in for this year. Total on hand at present \$222.20

Mr. Hale reported that eight new members had joined during the year. He also said that the State Troopers had patrolled

during the winter & in reporting, they had even made recommendations on which roofs needed shoveling, & what windows & doors they had closed.

F. F. Fisk reported on the Dam which because of a combination of circumstances is not yet repaired. About a foot of the top needs replacing. It is expected that the work will be started the last week of August or the first of September.

As the dam will have to be renewed to about 8 in. below the top present water level, it will be necessary to lower the water in the lake.

Lowering the dam itself by 4 in. should take care of spring flood water automatically.

Mrs. Lynn moved, Archie Hyslop seconded & it was passed that the matter be left to the discretion of a committee to be appointed. F. F. Fisk, Lawrence Porter & Bob Hale agreed to constitute a Dam Committee.

Mr. Fisk suggested that the planks used for cement forms be saved to make small docks at the foot of the two mountain trails.

Entertainment Committee - Frederick Allen referred the report of current activities to Margaret Fisk who said that the Trail Committee was conducting a program of hikes. Two have been held to date & the hikers cleared the two mountain trails on their way. The planned program assures continuity and guidance to those who would like to know more

of the walks near the lake.  
By show of hands all showed they  
were in favor of holding the Annual  
Picnic on August 15. (Wed.)

Navigation - Oscar Ames reported that he  
~~the~~ last cleared floating obstructions  
with the aid of Geo. Gravel + Geo. Will-  
iams in a day + a half. Now there are  
some few hazards but he does not believe  
that necessary help is available. Suggested  
that everyone help by removing small  
logs + boards.

Trails - Margaret Fick reported that the  
mountain trails are in good condition but  
that other trail clearing will have to  
wait until manpower is available.

She told about how a group of which  
she was a member discovered a lightning  
caused fire in the Notch and brought the  
fire warden in to take care of it.

Road at Burton's - Mrs. Lynn described the  
bad state of the road leading to the  
main dock. Mr. Moore said that he had  
talked with Mr. Badger + Alex Burton -  
(Alex's agreement with Mr. Badger is that  
he will maintain the road in return for  
shore front privileges.) Nothing has happened  
As only a small percentage of the Assoc.  
use the road the organization cannot  
finance its upkeep.

Mr. Moore said he had arranged with the  
Smallmans to keep the dock light on until mid-  
night and that he would speak to Mr. Badger  
about mending the main dock.



Mr. Moore urged that everyone patronize the store.

Dr. Tulloch moved an amendment — that a committee be appointed to work on a booklet. The motion was carried with three dissenting votes.

Twenty-five persons present, with Mr George Moore, President, presiding.

On motion the reading of the minutes of the August 1942 meeting was waived.

Reports

Treasurer - Robert Hale read the financial statement for the period August 1942 to August 1944, as it is attached.

He said that he intended to send out bills for dues in the near future and expected about seventy or seventy-five dollars in return.

Upon motion by Mrs. Missane, seconded by Mrs. Moore, the report was accepted as read.

Flag. The used flag is at the Fish Camp, the new one at Mr. Hale's and several old ones at Laura Allen's. A new flag pole is needed.

Entertainment - Larkrop Allen reported for the Entertainment Committee that there had not been a Community Picnic for two years because so few camps had been occupied. The same reason holds true for the current season.



We have a new flay and will have the light on the main dock at Bador's again this year - for which we pay the usual service charge.

The special illumination by campers during August is very nice.

There is no Post Office Substation for Lake Titus - Mary Burton receives mail for us out of the goodness of her heart. Families that get their mail at Burton's are expected to pay \$2.00 per season for the service. It works out most satisfactorily for Mary Burton to collect it herself.

Mr & Mrs Smith are doing their best to give good service at the store but they need our patronage.

We are developing a certain esprit de corp. The young people must learn to take responsibility if the community is to hold up its standard.

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted for filing as read.

Laura Allen reported for the Trail Committee and Mr Fildenburg for the Navigation Committee.

Mr Gibson said that the Law Committee probably sits on the lid so that nothing happens.

Mr George Moore reported for the Law Committee said that he had searched the new statutes of N.Y. & the U.S.A. and had found nothing in any new law that is particularly condemnatory of our actions. No suits to settle - no assaults.

The Sanitation Committee has had

no problems during the last few years.

Lester Allen reported as secretary of the Entertainment committee that plans for the Annual Community Picnic were progressing satisfactorily and the date set for Aug. 14. This year there will be a treasure hunt during the afternoon. Everyone should bring something to sit
