### THE STATS ARE CLEAR-ISH

On the 8th October two very well prepared teams took on the challenging question of what is worse: bad stats or no data?

After the improvised Table Topic session, where guest Raja Laxmi won the prize for best impromtu mini-debate speech, our Founding President Paul Carroll chaired the prepared debate on the motion: **This House Believes The Misuse of Statistics is MORE Damaging Than The Lack of Data**.

Before the debate 12 people voted in favour, 8 against with 6 abstainers. After the debate 12 voted in favour and 12 also voted against, with 4 abstaining, so we had a tie! As the Proposition has the burden of proof, and the swing clearly was in favour of the Opposition, the Debate Chair declared the motion as defeated.

### Average attendance up!

We've had 24 meetings at The Windsor Castle this calendar year, and the average attendance

Through a contact made by our Immediate Past President David Sexton, the club was invited to The Sunday Papers Live on Sunday the 6th October, a one-day event that focusses on current issues and culture with live speakers, music, food and drink.

Our task was to present a very short debate on a current issue, and so we dived right in with **THB Hate Speech Laws Go Too Fa**r.

William argued in favour and Paul against, with Sarah masterfully charing the turbo-speeded affair, as we had to do it all in about 35 minutes. The response was very positive, so who knows, we may even be invited back.

The event is arranged a few times a year, and is currently held at at the repurposed Holy Trinity Church in Marylebone, designed by John Soane and built in 1828 to celebrate the defeat of Napoleon.

### **EVEN MARRIED MAN HAS FREE WILL**



On the 1st October the Online Club took on the age-old philosophical question of free will - do we have it, and if not, how do we choose how to vote?

Before the debate 6 voted in favour and 5 against with 12 abstaining, and so with everything to play for, the two teams presented compelling arguments for both determinism and free will.

In the end the Prop's line that although some things are determined, there is a core free-will ability, won the day, and the motion was carried with a swing to the Prop: 10 in favour, 5 opposed and 8 abstaining.

### **TRUMP GOT TRUMPED**

### A record 52 people crammed into the function room of The Windsor Castle on Tuesday 22nd October to debate an election in another country.

After a welcome by Club President KB, Raya Ahmed led the improvised Table Topic mini-debate session, with topics ranging from tax breaks for millionaires, seagulls on the pill (or should they just be shot?), British food, selfmarriage, whether Halloween should be embraced or rejected (perhaps in favour of Bonfire Night, yay!), to where King Charles should reign and philosophy in schools.

Guest Saad won Best Table Topic for his philosophical opposition to philosophy in schools.

After a break for refreshments, Debate Chair Joann introduced the prepared debate on the motion This House Would Support Donald Trump In The US Election. The vote before the debate was 17 in favour, 25 opposed with 10 undecided.

And after a debate where there was passion as well as facts, the swing did go in the direction of the Opposition but funnily enough even more for Undecided - with the final vote being 10 in favour, 27 opposed and 15 undecided.

The motion was as such defeated with a swing away from the Proposition, so well done to the Opposition team and especially Laura McCracken for winning best Debate Speech and also Well Done to Hassan Raza for delivering his Maiden Speech at the club!





On Tuesday 26th of November the club met for its usual combination of improvised and prepared debate, this time with question To bacco or not To bacco? as the main topic.

Opening the meeting was Club Founder Paul Carroll as President KB was away, and he prompty handed over to Ranjit who chaired the Table Topic Mini Debates, touching on such topics as train drivers, rugby, stamp duty, assisted suicide, drink spiking, bus lanes and court cases on TV.

After the break Renata chaired the main debate on the motion **THW Allow Smoking In Privately Owned Public Spaces**. Before the debate it became clear what the Proposing team had their job cut out: Out of the 27 people present, only 5 voted in favour, 12 opposed, with the rest abstaining.

When the vote was taken after the debate there had been a slight swing in favour of the Proposition, with 2 votes added, so 7 in all, but the Opposition still managed to defeat the motion with 13 votes opposed and the rest abstaining, so well done to the Opposition!

This was the first in-person debate for Simon Jacobs, so very well done for a beautifully delivered speech.

Swarajit from the Opposition and William from the Proposition both won Best Debate Speaker - congratulations to both!


