# Erica Extemporaneous

I was a sophomore in college when Operation Desert Shield became Operation Desert Storm. It was my first cognizant encounter with the United States at war. (I was a small child when the Vietnam War drew to a close. I knew that my church had sponsored a refugee family with several children close to my age, but that was the limit of my understanding.) I was startled. I was frightened. I didn't know what to think.

I remember going to a friend's house – her dad was a professor – and staying up long into the night watching the news coverage. We didn't have cable in the dorms, and television reception was spotty at best. I remember a friend from Germany returning home post haste, with hardly a chance to say goodbye. I remember thinking about friends and acquaintances from high school who were in the military. I remember an impromptu prayer vigil around the peace pole, and a professor's five-year-old daughter saying that she wanted her baby sister to have a chance to grow up.

I remember how I felt. I remember fear and anxiety and even compassion for collateral damage, whether intentional or incidental. I was struck by the gravity of the situation. I knew my understanding of the world around me would never be quite the same.

Fast-forward some thirty-four years, factoring many armed conflicts and profound unrest abroad along with significant terrorist attacks on our own soil, tenuous race relations, and nearly innumerable school shootings and other targeted acts of violence. The recent news of United States air strikes in Iran is troubling, but just as troubling is the extent to which it feels as though just one more story on the nightly news – although now our news is a 24/7 barrage, overwhelming even on a slow day.

I was visiting dear friends with different political sensibilities than my own when the news broke. We barely acknowledged the announcement, if at all. When did we become so hesitant to disagree with one another? Why does it feel so perilous? The independence and freedom we celebrate in such fine fashion each Fourth of July grants us the privilege of thinking for ourselves. Why not celebrate *that*?

We pray for God's peace. We pray for God's protection. We pray for God's grace, already freely given. We are invited, we are encouraged, to trust in God. I can't help but think... Are we paying attention? Are we doing all that is within our seemingly limited sphere of influence to shift the balance?

Are we numb, deadened somehow by the anger and fear and injustice we have come to accept as the cost of doing business?

Friends, care for yourselves during these difficult days. Care for one another. Pay attention to what all of this, whatever *this* may be, does to your soul, your heart of hearts, your faith – in God and in humankind. In the words of Colbert S. Cartwright, whose thoughtful prayer of thanksgiving I am fond of sharing following our celebration of communion, "So far as it depends on us, help us to live peaceably with all."
