The United States Constitution

Article II, Section 1 of the U.S. Constitution imposes only three eligibility requirements on persons serving as president, based on the officeholder's age, time of residency in the U.S., and citizenship status:

U.S. Constitution – Presidential Candidate Eligibility

"No person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States, at the time of the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of President; neither shall any person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty-five Years, and been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States."

Executive Order on Strengthening the United States' Commitment to Human Rights and Sovereignty

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, it is hereby ordered as follows:

Preamble

The United States has always stood as a beacon of hope and justice, a nation founded on the principles of freedom, equality, and respect for human dignity. In a world still plagued by oppression, forced labor, and systemic abuse, our commitment to human rights must not waver.

This Executive Order embodies our pledge to lead with integrity and purpose, confronting injustices at home and abroad while safeguarding our national sovereignty.

We recognize that sovereignty is the cornerstone of our nation's strength. This Order ensures that all actions undertaken remain firmly rooted within the Constitution, protecting the freedoms and rights of our citizens and serving as a model for the global community. Through narrow, precise interventions and unwavering accountability, we will combat human rights violations and build partnerships that honor the independence of every nation.

To the people of the United States and the world, let this Executive Order be a testament to our shared humanity. Together, we will forge a future where dignity is universal, justice is unyielding, and no one is left behind.



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Section 1. Purpose

The United States affirms its unwavering commitment to upholding human dignity and eradicating human rights violations globally. This Executive Order establishes a comprehensive framework to align federal actions with the principles of sovereignty, justice, and accountability. Recognizing the United States' leadership role, this Order ensures all efforts strictly adhere to constitutional provisions and protect our national sovereignty while promoting international collaboration to achieve a zero-tolerance policy on human rights violations.

Section 2. Policy

(a) The United States shall lead by example in addressing human rights issues domestically and globally, ensuring alignment with constitutional principles, and setting a standard for transparency and accountability.

(b) The sovereignty of the United States and other nations shall be respected in all actions, with any intervention narrowly tailored to specific, documented violations of international human rights norms.

(c) Public participation shall be integral to all initiatives under this Order, empowering individuals to contribute to the development and implementation of human rights policies.

Section 3. Strengthening Domestic Human Rights Protections

(a) Federal agencies shall audit their operations, policies, and supply chains to identify and eliminate any association with forced labor, exploitation, or other human rights abuses.

(b) The Department of Justice (DOJ) shall establish a task force to address systemic human rights issues within the United States, including racial disparities, prison labor practices, and protections for vulnerable populations.

(c) The Department of Education shall develop and promote curricula to educate the public on human rights issues and the role of the United States in addressing them.

Section 4. Enhancing Global Collaboration

(a) The Secretary of State shall:



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- Convene a Human Rights Leadership Alliance (HRLA) comprising nations committed to upholding human rights.
- Prioritize human rights in all bilateral and multilateral trade agreements.
- Advocate for U.S. participation in and alignment with initiatives such as the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) and Alliance 8.7.

(b) The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) shall ensure that humanitarian aid reaches civilian populations directly and transparently, bypassing corrupt regimes.

(c) A Global Human Rights Fund shall be established to support grassroots organizations, independent media, and civil society initiatives addressing human rights violations worldwide.

Section 5. Targeted Measures Against Human Rights Violators

(a) The Department of the Treasury, in consultation with the Secretary of State, shall impose targeted sanctions on individuals and entities complicit in human rights violations under the Global Magnitsky Human Rights Accountability Act.

(b) Customs and Border Protection (CBP) shall intensify enforcement of the Tariff Act of 1930, prohibiting the importation of goods produced with forced labor.

(c) The Department of Commerce shall launch a technology initiative leveraging blockchain and artificial intelligence to trace and verify supply chains, ensuring goods entering the United States are ethically sourced.

Section 6. Public Participation and Accountability

(a) Federal agencies shall develop platforms to allow public input on human rights issues, including anonymous reporting systems for violations.

(b) Annual Human Rights Forums shall be established to facilitate engagement between policymakers, civil society, and the public.

(c) The Department of State, in partnership with independent organizations, shall publish an annual Global Human Rights Index, ranking countries based on compliance with international human rights standards.

Section 7. Implementation and Oversight



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(a) The National Human Rights Accountability Task Force is hereby established to oversee the implementation of this Order and ensure coordination among federal agencies.

(b) The Task Force shall submit an annual report to the President summarizing progress, challenges, and recommendations for advancing the United States' human rights objectives.

Section 8. General Provisions

(a) Nothing in this Order shall be construed to impair or otherwise affect:

- The authority granted by law to an executive department or agency, or the head thereof; or
- The functions of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget relating to budgetary, administrative, or legislative proposals.

(b) This Order shall be implemented consistent with applicable law and subject to the availability of appropriations.

(c) This Order is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the United States, its departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.

Section 9. Effective Date

This Order is effective immediately.
