#### Pastor's Commentary Fall 2018 Cowley Courier Traveler:

A psychology instructor had just finished a lecture on mental health and had proceeded to give an oral quiz to the freshman class. The instructor asked, "How would you diagnose a patient who walks back and forth screaming at the top of her lungs one minute, then sits in a chair weeping uncontrollably the next?"

A young woman in the rear of the room raised his hand and answered, "A fan of college basketball?"

We must patiently wait for God's timing. God's love is supreme and God weaves together our lives into God's plan for good.

"Don't be discouraged," the footnotes of Isaiah 60: 1-6 reminds us when we see so few people turning to God's bright light. Together, we serve, using whatever gifts we have to share the LIGHT.

Consider how you could 'mind the light' Christ for the world to see. Isaiah 60:1-6 *Arise,* shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the LORD has risen upon you. For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the LORD will arise upon you, and his glory will appear over you.

#### April 2018 Pastor's Column in the Cowley Courier Traveler Newspaper

Mark Zuckerberg compared Facebook to a church.

Is he right?

In 2017, he said that Facebook, with more than 2 billion users is like a church in that users feel part of "a more connected world." But is a virtual community known more for cat videos and political rants really a substitute for the church? Comparing a virtual church of billions of isolated individuals tapping on keyboards to the real thing will cause us to smile. **But** we have to ask the question: What is the church missing that allows Zuckerberg and millions of others to substitute wading through political rants and vacation selfies for real interaction with a living, breathing,

church? How has the church allowed this reality?

For the answer, go back to the church's birth and the book of Acts. Almost nobody worships, evangelizes or bowls alone in that book and all of the interaction is face to face. This is what the church does. While Facebook's innovation brings us faces (of friends and family) right to our screen, the church allows us to experience faces—the faces and lives of people in a community of faith, a community in which we act, serve and work together for the glory of God. (F2F," Homiletics, December 19, 1999, at homileticsonline.com.)

From Acts we learn that God created this community called church not for the purpose of people merely checking one another out, but for introducing people to the good news of what God had done through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The very premise was that God had come in person in Jesus and hadn't settled for sharing a meme or posting a manifesto. Jesus formed a real community of disciples, complete with their own quirks and flaws, and trained them how to interact with others in order to bring them into God's kingdom. The Spirit empowered them for this work and the church grew by leaps and bounds (2:41).

Immediately, this community began connecting in person around tables in their homes, in the temple and through sharing their goods with one another (2:42-47). We get a more detailed window into how the community functioned, and it was a lot more about selfless service than selfies!

# First Presbyterian Church Winfield, Kansas Board of Deacons End of 2018 Report

Book of Order: The office of Deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of sympathy, witness, and service after the example of Jesus Christ. It is the duty of the deacons, first of all, to minister to those who are in need, to the sick to the friendless, and to any who may be in distress both within and beyond the community of faith.

The Board of Deacons met each month; usually on the third Sunday of each month after church (11:30 AM). Each meeting was called to order by the moderator/co-moderator. Each meeting was opened in devotion and prayer presented by deacons on a volunteer (sign up in December) basis. Many wonderful and inspiring devotions were presented by the board's members consisting of: Will Badley, Ned Graham, Mike Hutchins, Mary Jarvis, Nancy Misasi, Ralph Royston, Jack Scott, Emily Davis, Cassandra Penka (until they moved), Erika Kendall, and Susan Thompson.

Minutes from each previous month's meeting, as well as the treasurer's report, was read, corrected if necessary, and approved by a majority of the board. Erika Kendall, serving as secretary/treasurer, performed her recording and accounting duties monthly, after locating the checkbook. There were approximately 9 months of inactivity on the account while the checkbook was being located, due to the passing of Lois Cole. The Dillons card we used for purchasing bereavement dinner items was also being tracked down, as Dixie Broadhurst was our faithful deacon that helped in purchasing food before she passed away. Our beginning balance in our account in January 2018 was \$3793.23. Of that amount, \$2800.00 remains earmarked for bereavement dinners.

Ending balance=\$3206.73 (406.73 +\$2800.00 Bereavement Fund)

The remainder of this report will be activities of our board's committees throughout 2018.

Bereavement Committee – Chaired by Jack Scott – served 5 funeral dinners in 2018. Jack's commitment to this committee's mission was admirable and our church has received many compliments from families served. We owe many thanks to Jack and the committee.

Christmas Committee – Chaired by Ned Graham – ordered and picked up 19 poinsettias for distribution to our Parish Friends. Ned's work on this committee was not only efficient but entertaining as well.

Communion/Extended Communion – chaired by Mike Hutchins –with assistance of various deacons throughout the year helped prepare communion elements with worship committee from the session each month. Extended Communion was served to at least 94 people during the year at Cumbernauld, Rest Haven, Good Samaritan Rest Home and Nursing Facility, Veterans' Home,

- Presbyterian Manor, and individual homes each month. Deacons volunteered each month to serve communion along-side a session member to many parish friends and extras at 11:30 and 12:30. We consider this to be one of our most cherished contributions. Mike made this a very valuable committee for our church.
- Courtesy Committee Chaired by Cassandra Penka for much of the year sent anniversary cards, birthday cards and get-well cards each month to congregation members. Deacons also volunteered to make personal birthday telephone calls each month to children and adults of our congregation.
- Food Pantry Committee Chaired by Mike Hutchins delivered non-perishable food supplies each month to the Winfield Community Food Pantry. Each month had a designated "food of the month" but many "others" were also contributed by congregation members. Jim delivered these each month and reported amounts at monthly deacons meeting. The overall total number of Food items collected for 2018 is at least 2,339 items. Not all month's totals were reported at our meetings. Mike and Jim Godfrey are to be commended for delivering the foods each month.
- Prayer Chain Committee chaired by Ralph Royston The prayer chain consists of all board of deacon's members, the pastor and church secretary, plus many past deacons. Most of the passing of information and requests for prayers are by phone, however many are also contacted by email. Mike Hutchins kept emails going. The prayer chain was activated approximately 71 times for 88 people needing our prayers. This is a powerful committee evidenced by the glory of God's blessings in times of needs. All who participated in this chain were influential in its positive outcomes.
- Rosebud Committee Chaired by Mary Jarvis this year we only acquired 1 rosebud for a baby born to our church family, displayed it on the altar on Sunday and presented it to the parents/ grandparents. Mary was most gracious as a deacon for this joy. We hope to have more to purchase in the new year!
- Scholarship Committee Chaired by Erika Kendall awarded \$2,250.00 in Deacons Scholarships.

  Recipients of these scholarships were Nick Lockyear, Nikki Kirk, Billy Wollard, Kylee Wollard, and Noah Graham.
- Outreach Committee Chaired by Mike Hutchins is a new committee formed by this year's deacons by a motion to our board from Mike. Our duty is to find needs throughout our community and involve our church family in providing help with those needs. He has been instrumental in the application of many of the missions created by our deacons. We continued with our mission for USD 465 in collecting school supplies. Through a Minute for Mission announcements during Sunday Church services, the congregation was asked to donate supplies and they were delivered to the district office for distribution to students in need. Julie Mignone was the contact for that. Through a Minute for Mission request, we also continued with the collection of money from the congregation for Kindergarten Milk Scholarships that had begun by a motion from Julie Mignone in 2016. Our board and individual deacons contributed to this mission. Minute for Mission for Food Pantry reports and requests each month was again our message to the congregation. First Presbyterian supports Helping Hands, an alliance of churches that provides help for community members with financial aid. Julie Mignone is our representative and worker for that effort. Deacons have supported the Blessings Box with contributions by individual deacons as well as promoting this mission through Minute for Mission announcements.

Mike is now President of the board of Habitat for Humanity and plans ways for our congregation to contribute to that mission. Mike also organized the first annual Piggyoke event. On September 23, 2018, we hosted the event with included karaoke provided by Bobby Baker and a pork burger meal donated by Drake Lowe. The deacons all volunteered for various jobs during the event. It was a huge success. Mike is truly a steward for God in his commitment to community needs and we are grateful for his big heart and kind works.

Care for Parish Friends – no chair – all deacons participate in visiting those members of our church that can no longer attend our church services. We want them to continue to feel that they are valued members of our church family. We visit them as often as we can, often taking things to remind them of our concern for their well-being. We report our visits at each monthly meeting to keep updated on their situations. We had 89 reports visits to our parish friends. This number is likely higher, do to absences at meeting so visits aren't reported. Deacons also sign up for a week at a time to make hospital visits. We had only 2 reported hospital calls in 2018.

Each Deacons meeting was closed in prayer led by Ned Graham.

This concludes the report of the Board of Deacons for 2018. Leaving the board at the end of December will be Deacon Ned Graham, Ralph Royston, Susan Thompson, and Will Badley. Cassandra Penka moved away earlier in the year and Ruthie Westfall passed away. Joining the Board of Deacons for 2019 will be Jim Godfrey, Jackie Russell, Belinda Mueller, Pennie Miller, Laura Wollard, Ethel Scott, and Jenette Hanna.

#### **Building & Grounds**

#### 2018 Annual Report

Committee members were: Russ Miller, Gilbert Scott, Chris Rogers, George Lowe, and Casey Woner.

The largest expense was masonry repairs to the water table and brick surfaces 2 1/2 feet below the water table and east face of the church. The east face included the square columns on which the round columns sit and painting the exterior ceiling above the east entrance. This work was done by Mid-Continental Restoration Co., Inc. The total was \$35,582.00.

The flat roof west of the main dome was replaced after a windstorm tore some of it loose. The cost was \$2,800.00 with insurance paying for it less the deductible of \$1,000.00.

The Fire Marshall inspected the church and we were required to replace several exit signs and emergency lights. We also needed to replace some outlets in the kitchen with GFCI outlets and add a new outlet for the pop machine to eliminate the use of an extension cord. Chris Rogers touched up the paint around the exit signs and emergency lights as well as some other areas in the church.

We switched the elevator to a more economical maintenance contract.

The locks were changed on all exterior doors because many of the old keys were unaccounted for.

There were three motors replaced on the outside air conditioning units.

At the manse we replaced the heat and air system at a cost of \$4,000.00 as well as a new lift pump.

George supervised the lawn mowing this summer doing it him self sometimes and organizing you other times. We did come up a little short on donations to pay the youth.

In the future, we still have leaks in the roof. The worst are around the northwest dome and shingles facing the west. All of the shingles on the main church are old and cracked with age and will need replaced. The domes need work as well as sealing the rest of the brick on the church.

A truly moving experience! The processional was recorded and posted on the Church's Facebook page and has been viewed 562 times upon the submission of this report!

#### 3/29 Maundy Thursday

This Holy Thursday Service is a commemoration of the Last Supper of Jesus Christ. Service was held at 7:30 p.m. The 46 in attendance listened to Jesus' Mandatum: Love One Another. This traditional service included a re-enactment of John 13:1-17 with the pedilavium (foot washing).

#### 3/30 Good Friday Cantata

The choir engaged 118 people with their outstanding delivery of We Remember Calvary: A Contemporary Tenebrae Service at 8 p.m. This service reminds us the history of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, and how he gave freely of himself for the forgiveness of sins and inclusion of all. A truly memorable experience!

#### 4/1 Easter Sunrise Service

17 people braved the extreme cold to gather in the North Sanctuary Entrance to worship God. All partook in communion and listened to the drum beat of Resurrection. This moving experience concluded with the placement of flowers on the cross (displayed at the East entrance) and the singing of Great are you Lord.

#### 4/1 Lou Mackillop Breakfast

This fundraiser was held to help the youth earn funds to help pay for camp costs to go to Westminster Woods this summer. Tier 1 pricing for summer camp ranges from \$245-\$495 for each youth. 8 youth gathered very early Sunday morning to prepare and serve breakfast. Casseroles, fried potatoes, cinnamon rolls, croissants, biscuits, gluten free muffins, and many other items were enjoyed by all. The youth accepted free will donations the day of the breakfast and successfully raised \$613.30! Thank you to everyone who showed their love and support to the youth of our caring faith family.

Fun and engaging Easter activity stations were set up in Fellowship Hall for all to enjoy. A history page was placed in each Grapevine this year. Because my computer programs are not compatible with the churches, I thank Cathy so much for her help, as she has had to retype all my articles.

The church family celebrated the churches 145th birthday on January 21, 2018 with a birthday cake and punch.

Name and dated brass plates were purchased and will be placed on a number of our memorial gifts.

Due to being on the Museum Book Committee for the new Cowley County Heritage Book, Vol. II, a lot of research time went into finding the histories of the 12 Presbyterian Churches that were in Cowley County in the early 1890's. Those being: Walnut Valley, Floral, New Salem, Cambridge, Tisdale, Dexter, Maple City, Arkansas City 5th Avenue, Arkansas First, Winfield First, Mount Vernon, Geuda Springs (across the street from being in Cowley County). I will be sharing these stories in 2019.

Updated the scholarship records, church officer, and staff records. Filed all the Presbyterian Women records since they have disbanded.

A picture of the second year of the Kids of the Kingdom program was given to us. Most of the children were identified. We did ask the congregation for their help in identifying three of the children. One more child was identified as Craig Pringle. The picture has been framed.
