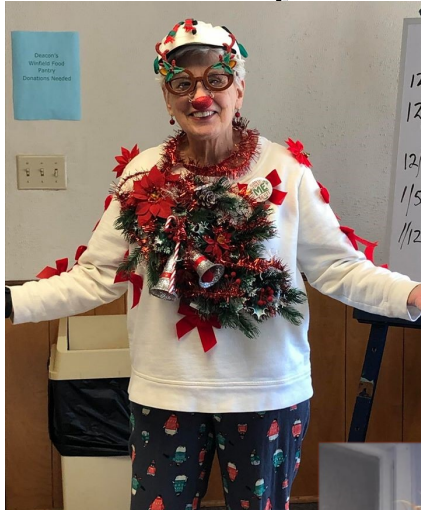

Pastor's positive thought

What is your STAR Word for 2019? The Word that you picked out of the basket in worship on January 6? Or, the word you called and asked us to draw from the STAR basket for you. Each of the unique words are opportunities to ask how Jesus is speaking to your heart and inviting you to SHINE in 2019. Catch God's stars....a great thing about LIGHT is that light attracts people. If you are lost in the woods at night, and someone has a lit candle, you will naturally walk toward it. The very same was true for Jesus, and Isaiah says that "Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn" (Isaiah 60: v. 3). Congregational Meeting

The annual congregational meeting was held following the 10 a.m. worship service in the sanctuary of First Presbyterian Church Winfield on Sunday, January 27, 2019. The purpose of the meeting was to receive annual reports offered by boards and organizations of the congregation.

Clerk of Session and Records, Cathy Royston, found that a quorum was present.

Rev. Angela Madden moderated the meeting and opened with prayer.

A motion was made to approve the Session and Committee reports for 2018. A thank you to the committees for their reports was expressed from the congregation. The motion passed unanimously.

A motion was made to allow the Session to approve these minutes at their next quarterly meeting. Passed unanimously.

The moderator adjourned the meeting with a benediction and prayer and a "Thank You" to the Clerk and committees for their work on the reports.

2019 Pastor's Report Cont.

Secret Pals began on February 3 and ran through February 24 with the Kid Friendly pot Luck as the highlight that day. Children from pre-K through 5th grade were paired with adults who left them gifts and clues as to who they were each Sunday. On the 24th the kids were invited to sit with their Secret Pals at lunch and get to know each other better.

Pastor Angela and the Worship committee went to the homes of those unable to get out for the Ash Wednesday Service to be held on March 6 in the evening. Ashes to Go were distributed in the Church's parking lot on Ash Wednesday, March 6. Everyone was invited to drive through and receive ashes from 12 to 1. The Ash Wednesday Service was held at the church at 7:00 p.m.

In April, the Maundy Thursday service was held on April 18, followed by the Cantata on April 19, and then Easter Sunrise and Easter Worship were on the 21st of April.

Also in April, congregants were reminded of the importance of tithing and what it means to our church. The children were challenged to attend as many of the pre-Easter and Easter services as possible for an opportunity to receive a gift from Pastor Angela.

New "I Love My Church" yard signs were purchased from funds donated by Ed and Kris Trimmer. The signs were given to congregants to put in their yards to declare their love of First Presbyterian Church.

In May the congregants honored three High School Students and 3 College Graduates. Decorating for Kids of the Kingdom began.

In June the youth went to Westminster Woods and Kids of the Kingdom was held with the help of lots of faithful volunteers. There were 49 participants this year.

In July we held our annual FREE Family Swim and had our largest crowds yet. 5 youth and Candace went to Triennium at Perdue University and Easton William Kerr was baptized.

July 28th was to Special Called Congregational Meeting to dissolve Pastor Angela's call.

At this point Cathy Royston (Administrative Assistant) took over some of the functions that would normally be performed by a pastor to allow the congregation to continue with its day to day activities (at least as much as possible). Cathy contacted the Committee on Ministry to get guidance for the Interim search but was told that we would have to wait until the Presbytery met in August to accept Pastor Angela's dissolution.

Cathy continued to place articles in the newsletter that had to do with preparation for calling an Interim Pastor. Cathy also made arrangements for the 6 funerals that were held in the 2nd half of the year, coordinated pulpit supply for each Sunday, and made sure all preparations were complete for all services.

In August Candace Stephens (CE Director) and Cathy completed the annual calendar for 2019-2020 for church activities. Also in August, the youth under Candace's and Nick's leadership, made their annual trip to the McSpadden's.

The annual Rally Day was held on Sunday, September 8 with a Zoofari theme, making use of the props that we used during Kids of the Kingdom. There was a petting zoo (rabbits), games, activities and food.

In October the annual Stewardship Drive started. An Interim Committee assigned by the Session started meeting to begin the Interim Search process. The Annual Clerk's Records review was completed and approved with no exceptions.

In November we held a Ladies Night Out Bingo and had lots of fun. There was an annual Congregational meeting to approve the slate of officers for 2020. The youth put together 27 turkey boxes for those in need.

In December we held a special Ruthie's Soup Lunch in honor of Ruthie Westfall and the soup Sunday she used to hold the Sunday following Thanksgiving so the ladies of the church didn't have to cook lunch that day.

The Christmas Cantata was on Friday, December 6. Staff hosted a Christmas Open House on December 17, the Children's Interactive Service was on December 22 and the Christmas Eve Service was on the 24th.

First Presbyterian Church Winfield, Kansas Board of Deacons 2019 Report

Book of Order: The office of Deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of sympathy, witness, and service after the example of Jesus Christ. It is the duty of the deacons, first of all, to minister to those who are in need, to the sick, to the friendless, and to any who may be in distress both within and beyond the community of faith.

Members: Emily Davis, Jim Godfrey, Jenette Hanna, Mike Hutchins, Mary Jarvis, Erika Kendall, Pennie Miller, Nancy Misasi, Belinda Mueller, Jackie Russell, Jack Scott and Laura Wollard.

The Board of Deacons generally met each month, usually on the third Sunday following the worship service. After being called to order, each meeting was opened in devotion and prayer.

The business of each meeting commenced with the secretary/treasurer reading the minutes of the previous meeting and giving the finance report. The following is a summary of this year's financial activity:

Bank Bal. 1/1/2019: General Fund \$653.73 & Bereavement Fund \$2800.00 = Total \$3453.73

Bank Bal. 12/31/2019: General Fund \$991.63 & Bereavement Fund \$2669.72 = Total \$3661.35

Most of the financial activity revolved around These Days devotionals and poinsettias purchased for our homebound and shut-ins and purchases made for funeral dinners. Most of our receipts came from family donations for funeral meals and the 50/50 raffle we held.

After the above reports were given and any correspondence was read, new and old business was discussed followed by reports from committees. Committee activity is as follows:

Bereavement: Funeral dinners were provided for the families of Byron Jones, Newt Richardson, Grace Lowe and Dan Holcomb. A dessert (cake and cookie) reception was provided for the family of Donald O'Connor. No meal or reception was requested for Carolyn Jones or Beverly Reiter. Numerous deacons and other congregation members, especially Carol Mackey, assisted in these efforts either by providing food or in the set-up, serving and clean-up duties.

Christmas: Nineteen poinsettia plants were ordered from the greenhouse at Southwestern College. The deacons then took them to our homebound and shut-in Parish Friends.

Communion: The deacons assisted the elders in preparing communion and partnered with an elder in serving extended communion to our homebound and shut-in congregation members.

Throughout the year, there were about twenty shut-ins at Cumbernauld Village, Rest Haven, Good Samaritan Society, Presbyterian Manor and the Kansas Veterans Home.

Courtesy: The two members on the courtesy committee alternated a month at a time. They either made telephone calls or sent get well, sympathy, anniversary or other greeting cards to congregation members as appropriate for the occasion.

Food Pantry: Two deacons shared the responsibility of taking non-perishable food, donated by church members, to the Winfield Food Pantry. There were at least 228 “Food of the Month” items and 1145 other items reported for a total of 1373 items this year. However, we believe that contributions were actually over and above that number.

Rosebud: One rosebud was placed on the chancel in honor of Calee Belair’s baby girl Royalty.

Scholarship: The deacons on this committee awarded Steven Kendall (the only applicant) the scholarship. The amount is \$750 per semester for his freshman year for a total of \$1500.

Outreach: The focus on this effort was to identify needs throughout our community. With the help of the congregation, we were able to fulfill some of these by collecting school supplies and donations for the Kindergarten Milk Scholarships. These are in addition to the ongoing efforts for the Food Pantry, Helping Hands Fund and our Blessings Box.

Prayer Chain: Mike Hutchins and Ralph Royston led in this effort. Mike utilized email and Ralph texted in an effort to alert church members who wished to be notified of prayer needs. We had 47 requests for prayers for 49 individuals. Some prayers were for multiple individuals.

Birthday greeting telephone calls (or perhaps cards) were shared by all deacons with each taking a turn by month. Contact was made with children, youth and adult church members.

Likewise, most deacons had one or more Parish Friends that they would check on or periodically visit. The number of homebound and shut-ins changed as the year progressed.

However, at any one time, they numbered approximately twenty of our church family.

Each meeting was closed with prayer.

Roof and Repairs:

The flat roof on the northwest corner of the building needs repair. Brett Thomson (roofing contractor) has been contacted but the work has not been completed as of this report.

All shingles on the main church are old and cracked with age and need to be replaced at some point in time.

Fire Marshall: Inspected church in February and required breaker spaces in panel be filled in. This was completed.

Heat and Air Conditioning

Toggle switches were replaced with programmable T-stat system in the sanctuary and basement areas, which has contributed to energy savings.

Baseboard heaters in sanctuary were repaired and are now working.

Gilbert and Chris helped Air Tech with service of units and changeover this year.

Outside of building: Replaced 3 condensing motors and cleaned up wiring in the units.

Murray room: Repaired rusty drain pan that had been leaking and clogging the drain pipe.

Lawn care:

George supervised the lawn mowing this summer – he assured it was done sometimes himself.

George performed maintenance on the mower and replaced old tires.

Lawn was treated for dandelions in the spring.

Security:

The church was broken into in May and the office area was ransacked; petty cash stolen.

After the break-in, the whole church was re-keyed. At that time, a very limited number of keys were made and issued to essential staff only. This will be the policy going forward to limit access and risk of a lost key getting into the wrong hands.

Kitchen:

On June 25th the cabinets on the southeast side of the kitchen fell off the wall. These, as well as all kitchen cabinets were re-attached with proper screws to assure they are firmly attached.

Other:

Chris painted the hand-rail for stairs to sanctuary near office.

The Worship team had a busy year. We had a Worship team meeting the first Wednesday of the month each month throughout 2019.

Our first communion was held on January 13, Baptism of the Lord. Also in January the officers serving in 2019 were ordained. On February 10, communion was held which was the 5th Sunday after Epiphany. March brought us our first special day service for Ash Wednesday. The Worship team went with Pastor Angela to do homebound and place ashes on the foreheads of the parishioners.

Several church members, including some from Presbyterian Women, got together for a sewing session earlier this year to create diapers from t-shirts and drawstring bags.

The diapers, along with a couple of baby blankets, were mailed to a woman in Minnesota, who coordinates shipments of the diapers and other layette items to orphanages and other mission locations throughout the U.S. and abroad.

Thirty-nine little drawstring bags, along with purchased wash cloths (36), girls' panties (42 pair), and gallon-sized ZipLoc bags (42), were mailed to a contact person with the Omaha , Nebr., chapter of Days for Girls. Along with bars of soap and specially-designed, waterproof panty liners, they will be shipped to women primarily in Africa and the Middle East for distribution to girls to help keep them in school after they have begun their menstrual cycle. (The girls can take needed items to school with them in the bags, with no one the wiser, and use the Zip Loc bags and soap to wash the panty liners, using a minimum of water. The liners open up into a square to dry, again with no one the wiser on their use.) Embarrassment and taboos can keep girls in many countries from finishing their education, which has an overall detrimental effect on their future—and their country's economy.
