re-circulated five to seven times a day, on average. Over time, this causes a build-up of dirt in the duct work.

Some people are more sensitive to these contaminants than others. Allergy and asthma sufferers, as well as young children and the elderly, tend to be more susceptible to the types of poor indoor air quality that air duct cleaning can help address. Also, some homes may be more susceptible to certain pollutants, including places with pets, smokers, or remodeling projects.

PANORAMA OLANA's Summer Learning Program Opens for Registration

The Olana Partnership announces its 11th annual Panorama, a Summer Learning Program for youth ages 6-11, will take place during three weeks in July 2020 at Olana State Historic Site. 

Heat the oil in a very large pot over medium heat. Add the fennel, onion, shallots, and salt and saute until the onion is translucent, about 10

Add the garlic and 3/4 teaspoon of red pepper flakes, and saute 2 minutes. Stir in the tomato paste. Add tomatoes with their juices, wine, fish stock and bay leaf. Cover and bring to a simmer. Reduce the heat to medium-low. Cover and simmer until the flavors blend, about 30

Add the clams and mussels to the cooking liquid. Cover and cook until the clams and mussels begin to open, about 5 minutes. Add the shrimp and fish. Simmer gently until the fish and shrimp are just cooked through, and the clams are completely open, stirring gently, about 5 minutes longer (discard any clams and mussels that do not open). Season the soup, to taste, with more salt and red pepper flakes. Ladle the soup into bowls and serve.



Facts about Heartworms

It's that time of year again. As the weather warms, we are reminded of the lesser joys of living in the Hudson valley – mosquitoes and heartworms. Please be sure your pet is on heartworm prevention. you may remember, heartworms are, in fact, worms that live in the vessels that connect the heart to the lungs. They can invade the chambers of the heart itself and cause permanent heart and lung damage, which often is fatal. Mosquitoes transmit these worms, and while the highest incidence is in the southeast of our country, this is a national (and local) problem. The problem starts when a mosquito bites an infected animal - typically another dog, but can also be a fox or coyote – and then bites an unprotected dog, thus giving them the worms. The worms migrate in the blood stream until they find

their home in the heart, where they can live for 7-10 years! While these worms are living, growing and multiplying in the dog's body, they are often silently causing damage until the damage is irreversible. While sometimes the signs are detected (coughing, decreased appetite, labored breathing, etc.), they are often not detected until the disease is advanced. This is why testing (and preventing) is so important. If we can detect the disease early, we have better success in treating it.

Which brings us back to this time of year. We typically test in the early spring, as that is when many people are restarting their heartworm prevention. Ideally, you would give your preventative year-round to hopefully catch any unseasonably warm days where mosquitoes come out, but a lot of people do stop in the winter months. Testing is important to catch any "silent" infections, but it is also helpful prior to restarting prevention, as there is a risk of causing complications if you

give heartworm preventatives to an already positive dog. Another important note is that the life cycle of the heartworm – from the time a mosquito bites your dog to the time where they will test positive – is about 6 months. That means that if you adopt your dog from a highincidence area, we will likely recommend rechecking the heartworm status 6 months from adoption, even if they were negative. This is also why puppies do not get tested right away - if

Treating heartworm disease in dogs is expensive and has potentially severe complications, so routine testing and prevention are the keys to avoiding this deadly disease. The preventatives are extremely safe and effective, and it is much more affordable to prevent than to treat. Many animal hospitals offer oral,

injectable and topical options. A quick word on cats: Cats can get heartworm disease, but they are not the natural host, so often they are more resistant, or the adults will never fully grow. However, they can from time to time be infected and there is unfortunately no great test, nor is there any treatment. Heartworm preventatives do exist for cats and are highly recommended, especially if the cats go outside.



Now You Know How **Doctors and Nurses**

It's not that I am a worrywart or a pessimist; I just cannot help anticipating what might come next. That's the way the minds of nurses and doctors work. Spending years in the health field, a good nurse and doctor will always be planning for the next step or considering the "justin-case." You have a care plan for your patients, and you make sure all the next measures are in place. You stock up on equipment for emergencies; you make sure the equipment is ready and the medications have not expired. Would you want to be the patient in cardiac arrest when the batteries in the defibrillator have not been charged? That was my pet peeve. As charge nurse, I was compulsive about my staff performing checks

on the emergency equipment. You tend to transfer this same mentality into everyday life. I cannot help but anticipate what we might need: whether it's for a day trip to NYC, two weeks in Europe or we head out for the mountains on a hiking trail. My family makes fun of me – as I pull out of my purse or backpack exactly what they need. We hiked Mt. Washington years back with several families - sleeping in the huts along the Appalachian Trail. You can only imagine my backpack contents! In addition to my crystal aspirin (in case of a heart attack) and supplies to prevent hypothermia (even though it was July, Mt. Washington's weather is erratic), I pulled out a water filter when we discovered that the ranger station that we counted on being open was closed. We had planned to fill our water bottles there, along the 10-hour trek on a hot July day.

but now we only had untreated water in the bathrooms. We utilized my water filter for the entire group and drank fresh water, and enjoyed the boost in our blood sugar with the chocolate treats that I had stuck in my backpack – just in case. So what does this subject

have to do with the pandemic? Everything. The mindset of health professionals (not just nurses and doctors) is different from the rest of the planet – certainly unlike those of politicians or economists. We cannot help but anticipate, and we really become irate when surrounded with unpreparedness for emergencies. What we are experiencing with this pandemic is disrespect for the health profession. The world is paying a price for that. There are so many lessons to learn from this pandemic, but I truly hope this lesson is one of them. I have served in the health profession as a clinical nurse specialist for decades, and so I was driven to write about this subject, given the severity of what we are experiencing. What has this pandemic revealed? I do not understand why disrespect for science has evolved. My intention is not political or religious. To deny science is just plain foolish, and we are experiencing the consequences right now in the management of this pandemic. Instead of a long explanation, as Einstein stated in his 1953 interview, "Science without religion is lame. Religion without science is blind." - Numerous cuts were made to health organizations on federal, state, and local levels. That was a big mistake and we are suffering severely. Once again we are experiencing the consequences of this short sightedness. We always have to be prepared for emergencies; it is an invaluable investment. We seem to have a better understanding of this with our fire departments, which is wonderful, but why don't we apply this to crises preparedness? As I mentioned in the beginning, my pet peeve when I was in charge of my unit was the lax attitude about being prepared for emergencies. This endangers people's lives. That goes against

my grain as a nurse and a fellow

human being. My colleagues

are feeling this impact across the nation in the numerous health settings including public health departments, emergency rooms, urgent care centers, physician offices, cancer centers and health clinics. - Why did America decline help, such as not accepting test kits from the World Health Organization (WHO)? don't have the answer, but once again we are suffering with the consequences. Not having test kits is like doing surgery blindfolded. We were way behind in starting the testing, which results in being way behind with everything that follows. This includes tracking and treating the disease, which is extremely challenging in a crisis to begin with; health professionals do not need added burdens. By delaying a diagnosis due to lack of testing, we are creating a longer infection chain. It is critical to know who is infected and how many in order to determine the pathway of the spread of the disease and its overall progression. - Americans seem to struggle with recognizing that we are connected to the rest of the world. We value our independence, but denying that we are linked to others results in exactly what is happening now with this pandemic. We are learning a difficult lesson. It is to our benefit to recognize the patterns of the pandemic in other countries – China and Europe, for example - in order to anticipate what is coming next in America. As the WHO collects data, it provides a global perspective, which is valuable for our plans. we remain isolationists in this area, we will suffer. – Americans are not in tune to policies and practices that impact health professionals. Many of us know that there is a shortage of physicians in this country, but do you know why? For decades there has been a scarcity of residency slots for medical schools. Funding has been drastically cut for the training of physicians, and Congress in its "great divide" has been slow to pass legislation to fix this. Unless we change our policies, we will be short 90,000 physicians by 2025. More hospitals will likely close if we don't make changes in our practices. In the nursing field, many RN programs have two-year waiting lists, and the understaffing of nurses is all too common. Hospitals certainly require business people to help with the operation of the facility, but should CEOs - with less education and not necessarily having medical backgrounds - be making more money than the physicians? Should they making decisions about your healthcare without the

and nurses) in the field? To get back to the pandemic, the U.S. has essentially turned its back on our healthcare professionals. Yet now in this crisis, Americans are turning to doctors and nurses and other healthcare professionals to save lives. They are not only risking their own lives, but also their

consent of the experts (doctors

did not choose to face this crisis with inadequate supplies, staffing and protective equipment. They did not choose to carry this out without adequate preparation. We might think that they will "just get sick and recover" but that is not the case. Not only will they be exposing themselves to the vulnerable population who are at risk of dying or getting severely ill, but young doctors and nurses are also dying. They experiencing exhaustion and over exposure. There are also theories that a genetic factor may come into play with some of these deaths. It is called immune reconstitution inflammatory syndrome and this results in compromised conditions for some individuals (Medscape, March 16, 2020). – Where are our priorities? Have we put politics and the economy before our health? We know there are those individuals who will sadly take advantage of this pandemic, both politically economically. Then there are officials who downplayed pandemic, claiming that this (the healthcare experts) were overreacting. Healthcare professionals were not thinking about political sides when they addressed this months ago; they were thinking about saving lives and how we must protect ourselves. When we get to the other side of this, I hope Americans will understand and respect how nurses and doctors think. We have the ability to anticipate, maybe America will recognize the value of this skill. By the time this article is published, the course of this

pandemic will have changed. If we watch what has happened in other countries, we will witness not only the peak and the recovery, but the course of this virus will likely continue on with peaks and valleys. We need to stay connected (at a distance right now) and start thinking about our priorities. We are learning a hard lesson: America did not pay attention to the health experts. I'll end with my favorite quote, which is supposedly an old cowboy motto, once used by Winston Churchill: "Speak the truth but ride a fast horse." (You might see me riding my fast horse out of town!) Curt's from page 1 septics, but the majority of our work is land clearing, creating ponds, driveways, roads, and hauling gravel and top soil and other materials that need to be moved between sites. We also trim or take down trees, transport the wood, split it and deliver."

new ponds and swimming large or small."



Oil primer, which has superior binding power, is required to prevent cedar bleed, a process where tannins rise to the surface and leave a reddish-brown discoloration. The finish coat is Latex.

"The latex paints they make these days are really good, they have improved ten-fold from when they first came out 40 years ago," Stefan says. "The old guys used to laugh at latex paint. 



Barkbusters from page 7 from. Odor in your dog's mouth could mean dental problems, digestive problems or underlying internal diseases, such as kidney problems or diabetes. If his teeth are discolored or he has an odor worse than his usual doggie breath, have your veterinarian perform dental a exam.

Next, check his ears. If the skin inside is red or sore, if the ear has a bad smell, or if your dog reacts in pain when you examine his ears, have your vet check him for an ear infection. Also check your dog's skin for the common disorder seborrhea, usually characterized by flaky dandruff or an oily, waxy feel to the coat and a strong odor. You can prevent this by bathing your dog with a medicated shampoo. Finally, an infection or anal gland problems can also lead to odor and discomfort, in which case your dog will need to be seen by your veterinarian. **Enjoy the Outdoors and**





Cross Pollination: Heade, Cole, Church, and Our Contemporary Moment

Catskill and Hudson, NY: Olana and the Thomas Cole National Historic Site announced today that they will co-host a major exhibition, "Cross Pollination:

Heade, Cole, Church, and Our Contemporary Moment," opening at the two sites in May. For the first time in over two decades, 16 paintings from the influential series of hummingbirds and habitats - The Gems of Brazil (1863-64) – by Martin Johnson Heade (1819-1904) will be on tour in New York for public audiences. The project uses the metaphor of cross-pollination inspired by Heade's paintings to explore interconnections in art and science, between artists, and across the 19th and 21st centuries. Paintings, sketches, sculpture and natural history specimens will be displayed in provocative juxtapositions within the historic spaces. After the exhibition's debut in New York, the show will travel to three additional museums, ending at Crystal Bridges Museum in Bentonville,

Artist Martin Johnson Heade has long been associated with the Hudson River School of landscape painting that is characterized by the epic landscapes of the artists Thomas Cole (1801-1848) and Frederic Church (1826-1900). Heade, though, was making a different kind of "landscape" that magnified the intricate operations within nature itself. Heade traveled to Brazil in 1863, so that he could study the hummingbirds in their natural habitat. Heade's focus in The Gems of Brazil and his related writing, which decries the overhunting of bird species, aligns with the protoenvironmentalism of Thomas who wrote against deforestation in his own time. Heade's own Brazilian journey

was inspired by Frederic Church's travels in Latin America. The ecological awareness and advocacy of these 19th-century artists connect thought and conversation taking place today as concern for preservation and protection of the environment has reached a new urgency.

The exhibition will also include

paintings by Thomas Cole and Frederic Church, as well as botanical works on paper by Cole's daughter, Emily Cole, and Church's daughter, Isabel Charlotte Church, together here for the first time. The exhibition highlights natural specimen collections amassed by Thomas Cole and Frederic Church, including Cole's neverbefore-exhibited herbariums and a sampling of the Church family's extensive collection of bird eggs.

"Cross Pollination" positions these 19th-century artists in a call and response with 21stcentury American artists, whose works engage current issues related to biodiversity, habitat protection, and environmental sustainability. The contemporary artists are Rachel Berwick, Nick Cave, Mark Dion, Richard Estes, Juan Fontanive, Jeffrey Gibson, Paula Hayes, Patrick Jacobs, Maya Lin, Flora C. Mace, Vik Muniz, Portia Munson, Lisa Sanditz, Sayler/Morris, Dana Sherwood, Rachel Sussman, and Jeff Whetstone. Thematically resonant projects include works in the Crystal Bridges Collection by Jeff Whetstone, Flora C. Mace, Richard Estes, and **Patrick Jacobs**. Additional work by contemporary artists includes Mark Dion and Dana Sherwood's outdoor pollinator pavilion designed to attract rubythroated hummingbirds, Rachel Sussman's series The Oldest Living Things in the World, Maya Lin's interactive site What is Missing, and Sayler/Morris' Eclipse, among others. The joint project will be presented simultaneously as one exhibition at both the Olana State Historic Site in Hudson, NY, and the Thomas Cole National Historic Site in Catskill, NY, from May 9 to November 1, 2020. historic sites are connected by the Hudson River Skywalk, a scenic walkway across the Hudson River – with sweeping views of the Hudson Valley and the Catskill Mountains – that opened in June 2019. "Cross Pollination" is the second major collaborative project between Olana and the Cole Site and builds upon the success of the inaugural "River Crossings: Contemporary Art Comes Home" exhibition which took place in 2015. "Cross Pollination"

exhibition was created by The Olana Partnership at Olana State Historic Site, Thomas Cole National Historic Site, and Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art, Bentonville, Arkansas. The exhibition tour is organized by Crystal Bridges. 





His interest goes back to his personal family story. "I'm a local, born here in 1962, and my parents owned the Rhinecliff Hotel for 57 years. I developed an early fond appreciation for the older buildings in this area. I learned how to plaster, and the old styles of doing things."

That specialized knowledge of plaster techniques is invaluable for homeowners of historic older dwellings. Stefan can help with repairing problems or deciding other avenues of replacement. "Some of it might be in such poor condition, or if you're planning a renovation and everything has to be retrofitted, it might be better to take it all out, and put in sheetrock. You really need someone with expertise to come in and look at it and see which the best way is to go. If maintaining the historical integrity of the place is your primary intention, then definitely I'd recommend plastering it." Glazing and cleaning windows

There's a welcome feeling in being able to throw open the windows and let the spring breeze and sunshine in. Unfortunately fall and winter build-up can

often block that light, and worse, spread dust and dirt that can take the healthy fresh out of the air.

"There's been a tremendous demand for somebody to clean windows, and that's something we're available to do," says "Many homes have windows so high the customer won't even attempt them, even on interiors. I've had 28foot ladders in peoples' living rooms. While I was up there, they would see other things that needed cleaning or repairing."

As far as window glazing, it's a project beyond the average homeowner's skill set. actual glazing and painting are best done by a pro, since serious issues can otherwise result. "The glazing has to be removed very carefully," Stefan explains. "There are air pockets between the wooden mullions and the glass due to expansion and contraction. This is why you hear a rattling sound when you close the sill, and eventually the glass brakes. Next you put oil primer on the window, corresponding to the height of where the glazing will be. It has to be an oil primer. A latex primer will suck all the linseed oil out of the glazing,

and it will crack and fail." **Taking Care Of Decks**

Spring is also a time when homeowners notice issues with decks, says Stefan. "I can really do a nice job with decks. I'll re-sand them if needed. People are often in a hurry to do decks at the beginning of the season. But often, it's better that they schedule to have it done in later spring, or early summer, when superior conditions arrive."

Stefan says moisture is a major reason why deck paint jobs can fail. "Just because the top of a board feels dry, doesn't mean the bottom is dry. If it's still wet, that moisture must go somewhere. It's important to clear foliage and man-made obstructions, so air can circulate underneath and dry the bottom of the deck board out. Air is the best dryer, and decks that are at least 18 inches off the ground or higher dry out much faster."

In cases of rot, Stefan can replace affected boards. He says sometimes applying an epoxy can be a cost-effective solution.

are tips to help: Here 1. Read your owner's manual. Follow all guidelines for your outdoor power equipment and familiarize yourself with the controls. If you have lost your manual, look it up online (and save a copy on your computer for easy reference in the future). 2. Inspect equipment.

Check the air filter, oil level and the gasoline tank. Also check loose belts and missing

damaged parts. Replace any parts needed or take your equipment to a qualified service representative for servicing.

3. If you have gasolinepowered equipment and didn't empty the tank before winter storage, drain the fuel now.

You should never leave fuel sitting in the gas tank of your equipment for more than 30 days. Untreated gasoline (without a fuel stabilizer) left in the system will deteriorate, which may cause starting or running problems or damage the fuel system.

4. Protect your power by only using E10 or less fuel in gasoline-powered outdoor power equipment.

With today's higher ethanol content fuels, most manufacturers are recommending a fuel stabilizer be used, especially if you don't use up all the gas purchased right away. Some gas stations may offer 15 percent ethanol (E15) gas or higher ethanol fuel blends, but any fuel containing more than 10 percent ethanol can damage--and is illegal to use in-- small engine equipment not designed for it. 5. Store fuel safely.

Label your fuel can with the date of purchase and ethanol content of the fuel. Never put "old" gas in your outdoor power equipment. If you don't know the date of purchase, safely dispose of the fuel in the can and buy fresh fuel. Always store fuel out of the reach of children or pets and in approved containers.

6. For battery-powered equipment, recharge only with the charger specified by the manufacturer.

A charger that is suitable for one type of battery pack may create a risk of fire when used with another battery pack. Follow all charging instructions and do not charge the battery pack or tool outside the temperature range specified in the instructions.

7. Store batteries safely.

When the battery pack is not in use, keep it away from other metal objects, like paper clips, coins, keys, nails, screws or other small metal objects, that can make a connection from one terminal to another. Shorting the battery terminals together may cause burns or a fire. 8. Clean your equipment and store it in a dry place.

Remove any dirt, oil or grass. Clean equipment will run more efficiently and last longer. Never store your equipment in a place that is damp or wet. To learn more, go to www.opei. org. For further information on safe fueling, go to www. LookBeforeYouPump.com.

GILDED AGE MUSIC PERFORMANCE AT STAATSBURGH STATE HISTORIC SITE



Pay attention changes and warnings: friends family •Have or worries members expressed your driving? •Have you ever gotten lost on familiar routes or forgotten how to get to familiar destinations? •Hasapoliceofficerpulledyouover to warn you about your driving? •Have you been ticketed for your driving, had a near miss, or a crash in the last three years? •Has your healthcare provider warned you restrict or stop driving? **Consider Getting a Professional** Assessment If you've experienced driving problems like these or are worried about your ability to be a safe driver, consider getting professional assessment of your skills. 


