

Robert Patterson from page 1 received his high school diploma. In spite of this (or maybe partially because of this), he calls himself a "late starter," since he didn't go on to get that college degree until he was in his thirties and already married. His wife is a dog person, working in the vet clinic arena and has been involved with show dogs and grooming for decades, in her own business as well. Of course, she was also instrumental in being there for him getting his advanced schooling. They migrated up to this area in 2003 and have two sons now who are eleven and thirteen. Bob is very focused on training, and spent the last decade (before "hanging up his own shingle" last year at his current location at 2602 State Route 23 in Hillsdale) working and learning at a local accounting firm in Hudson. At the College of Saint Rose, Governmental Accounting was mandatory, and much of his work in Hudson was municipal accounting. Work for villages, towns, fire districts, and some non-profit entities still comprises about fifty per cent of his client base in his own office today. You might think - as I did at first - that this would mean he WAS more of a "numbers guy" than a "people person," but not so. The reason he enjoys this governmental work is that more than just helping one individual, he considers it watching the funds for ALL of the taxpayers to make sure their monies are being allocated to the right places according to the budget!

Bob hastens to explain that he is not a Financial Advisor who manages investments for people. He does a lot of tax planning and preparation work for individuals, corporations, partnerships, estates, trusts, etc. and knows much about tax implications for people, however, on occasion, he does the bookkeeping end of it and someone else does the actual taxes. He prepares individual tax returns and financial statements for people for a variety of reasons, but it's a different kind of work than that done by financial advisors. He does a lot of consulting work for people who are starting their own businesses, or would like to do so.

When asked about the changes this last year has brought to the business, he says that while there isn't as much delay and "closing" of business, even more and more than before, it is often handled electronically. Bob doesn't really like this at all, as he enjoys meeting his clients and getting to know them face to face, and he misses that aspect of the business. He is, of course, set up to do that hands-off type of transaction, and will continue to do so. He always did have some clients who were out of state anyway and had to electronically review and sign documents, etc. Not very "people friendly" but that's the way of

America, Put Your Mask On – Before It Is Too Late

If all of us wore masks, we could bring the COVID-19 cases under control within a month or two (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) and save the U.S. economy \$1 trillion (www.forbes.com). At the early onset, people were initially confused about the necessity of masks because we did not know how the infection rate would impact the U.S., and there was also a shortage of supplies. Now there is no excuse. Masks are a necessity for both our public health and our economy. How foolish and naïve that Americans are making masks a political issue! As a healthcare provider, I find the current behavior of Americans, who are mismanaging this pandemic, both disrespectful, dangerous and selfish, especially the health toward field. Masks work. You can choose cloth or surgical masks. Although bandanas are not as effective, it is better than nothing. It is not necessary for the general public to wear N95 masks. There are also many misconceptions about the subject. Here are the facts: Many people foolishly think that cloth masks cannot be effective because they can't filter out the tiny viral particles. These particles expel from the mouth and nose in much larger droplets that become smaller as they move away from the body. Masks trap the droplets and therefore, fewer viral particles escape. "So, when all parties in a gathering are wearing well-constructed, wellfitting masks, it provides an extra layer of safety for everyone. If person is not wearing a mask, those particles can float through the air 30 feet or more and stay alive for up to 30 hours." Yes of course the transmission rate is also a consideration, but overall infection risk increases the when one person takes his/her mask off (https://med.stanford. edu/news/all-news/2020/06/ stanford-scientists-contribute-towho-mask-guidelines.html).

Some people think that if you wear a mask for long periods of time you will trap and breathe in excess amounts of carbon dioxide, which could lead to brain damage. That's just not true. A properly constructed mask provides more than enough ventilation (Medscape, July 15, 2020). We know that people can spread the virus before they have symptoms. By using masks, we reduce the spread from these potentially infected people. It is called "source control" (*Medscape*, July 8, 2020) The CDC recommends all people 2 years of age and older to wear a cloth face covering in public settings and when around people who don't live in your household, especially when physical distancing is difficult to maintain (https://www.cdc. gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/ prevent-getting-sick/clothface-cover-guidance.html). In a recent study (published in Health Affairs) mask mandates led to a slowdown in daily COVID-19 growth rate. With 5 days of mandate, the daily growth rate slowed by 0.9 percentage and after three weeks, the daily growth rate slowed by 2 percentage points (https://www. ucsf.edu/news/2020/06/417906/ still-confused-about-masks-<u>heres-science-behind-</u> how-face-masks-prevent) In addition to masks the other two parts to the equation in protecting ourselves from the spread of the virus are physical distancing (in general 6 feet apart) and washing our hands. These three simple measures - 1. Wearing masks, 2. **Physical Distancing**, 3. Washing hands – have shown that the resurgence of the disease can be prevented (https://med.stanford. edu/news/all-news/2020/06/ stanford-scientists-contribute-towho-mask-guidelines.html).

The pandemic is a crisis, and

If your doctor offered a solution to prevent you from getting sick or dying, would you go out in the streets and protest this, claiming it was taking away your freedom? It is a very simple solution; otherwise the result is a spread of the infection, more deaths and a worsening economy. We have already witnessed what happens when our hospitals and our healthcare providers are overwhelmed with the onslaught of this virus. The surges are happening all over

the country and this fall we will seeing the co-occurrence be of COVID-19 and influenza (regular flu season). This means our healthcare system will be overextended even more than what we have already witnessed. If the federal government does not change its approach to the management of this pandemic and the American public continues its infantile behavior, we will have absolute bedlam this fall, and into the winter. In addition to the resurgences of the virus occurring in an unpredictable manner, our economy will go in the opposite direction-a direct and predictable decline. We will likely see more increased violence, mental illness, conspiracy theories, panic and shortages in such necessities as food products, toiletries and medications. Association released an 'official letter' to the public strongly encouraging the use of cloth masks" - see this link for the actual letter (https://www.aha.org/ lettercomment/2020-07-06-ahaama-ana-open-letter-urging-publicwear-mask-stop-covid-19-spread). A physician's assistant "recalled her husband leaving food on the cellar stairs while she isolated herself for months for fear of infecting her family: 'I felt like an animal,' she said, her voice cracking" (Medscape, June 18, 2020). "It is haunting to think it may all happen again... I feel like it's a calm before a second storm," said an emergency room physician who lost a relative to the virus" (Medscape, June 18, 2020). stressors of Covid-19. And how ironically the pandemic may help us to grow in character, and strength. When we examine Jesus' life, we glimpse what is truly valuable in our day to day living, insights easily overlooked before the pandemic." Though Rev. Gram was technically retired, his past experiences and training made him well suited to the dilemma at hand. In addition to his

at hand. In addition to his theological degrees from three different seminaries, including a doctorate, he also has an MS from The Graduate School of Social Work at Columbia University. The book he has authored is rich with everyday details, psychologically insightful, and infused with actionable wisdom gleaned from biblical texts. "You know, in Scripture, God states, "Be still and know that I am God," Rev. Gram relates a bit about one the meditations found in his book. "And what's happened with Covid-19, is that it has produced a restlessness in all of us. Which is probably magnified when we are in quarantine or lockdown. So, what happens is that we find ourselves in a panic because of the viral threat, and we race around, often not knowing where we're going, or what we're doing. When in fact, what we're called to do, is just be still. Just sit in a straightbacked chair and focus on your breathing, and sense that God is in every in-breath and out-breath. He is always present in the basics of respiration, and the basics of reality. That calms. Our minds can be as restless as our bodies, sometimes more. The Buddhists have a wonderful phrase for

skittering thoughts. They call it 'monkey mind'. And the practice of meditation and prayer becomes a way of stilling ourselves. An added benefit is that honoring God in such simplicity helps others to see that a wonderful way to honor God and provide a positive example is to sit still. Meditations Christ and Covid-19 are divided according to church seasons. Rev. Gram points out that living mindfully within church seasons-like Lent, Holy Week and Easter-- orders life, particularly at a time when pandemic upends our calendrical sense, including when or even if traditional events, past times, and celebrations can even occur. Just speaking locally, the Dutchess County Fair in Rhinebeck, among many other customary activities,

will not take place this year. In the mid-Hudson Valley, the coronavirus spread perniciously during Lent, and the meditations in Christ and Covid-19 begin with that season. Meditations for holy week focus primarily on Jesus's dying words from the cross. With Easter, the church turns to resurrection. The book concludes by coinciding with Pentecost, a time when the disciples were graced by the Holy Spirit to be able to speak foreign languages they could not have learned on their own.

Grappling with fear, whether of a virus, or losing loved ones, or an uncertain future, is one of the toughest battles Rev. Gram has seen people face. "The psalmist writes that God delivered him from all of his fear. And I note that fear is hardwired into humanity. And it's a positive thing. Primitive man, because of fear, could sense carnivores which were faster than he was, and he could mobilize his resources. He could get away, or do whatever he needed to do.


"But the bible also talks about a fear which overwhelms our rational and coping capacities, and that's understandable. Because the Neanderthal could at least spot the leopard in the distance, who was eyeing him for lunch. But how do we outwit a predator who carries off his victims in an invisible maw? That's more terrifying."

The Reverend says the best spiritual response to fear...is faith. "What we need to do, and what the psalmist tells us to do, is that we need to look back at our past, and see how God has helped us in the past. How God has delivered us from fears in the past. And so we have to develop our capacity to recollect. Because I think when we do, we can understand that God has been with us in times past. And we need then to transpose that to the present, and know that God's continuing love for us does not end, but will continue."

Perhaps the central purpose of Christ and Covid-19 is to engage readers with a supportive spiritual dialogue that can help them overcome the anxieties of this time. "You know, the book helps people manage fear, grief and negativity. And it explores self-defeating behaviors, which Covid-19 gives rise," says Rev. Gram. "One of the insidious self-defeating behaviors is that we minimize or dismiss the psychological burden which Covid-19 places on us. We don't allow ourselves some slack here. So if we do not perform the way we did in our pre-coronavirus period, we get down on ourselves. We say, 'What's wrong with us?' Well, what's wrong with us, is that we are living in a reality danger fraught. And if we can understand that, then it seems to we can be gentler with ourselves. 'Cut yourself some slack' the expression goes. In the book, I say in jest that Jesus may said those 'Cutteth thyself very words: some slack'. And while he may not have said those words, he certainly intended the sentiment. And it's gospel for all of us."

God's Corner

Peace Instead of Anxiety "Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts." (Colossians 3:15a) By Naomi Fata

Peace is something we all want. Peace in our emotions, in our thoughts, in our homes and in our world. Peace is God's will for us but it doesn't happen automatically. Think of the home you live in. If you don't clean it, it continues to get dirty. It takes work to clean and to make your home a place that you want to live. In the same way if you don't clean your mind and heart, they will become anxious. Anxiety is like dirt and disorder that comes in by natural result of us living. With the current state of our world anxiety is on the rise. Simply passing someone on the street without a mask or

going into the grocery store can cause you to feel anxious. This anxiety must be confronted, or it will begin to take over your life, affecting your relationships and your decisions. A first step toward confronting anxiety is the simple awareness or recognition that you are struggling with it. Sometimes it helps to name the thing you are anxious about rather than letting it be just a feeling. I have found that I can become anxious even in the small things, like hiking with children and having to pull them off the path, at a 6-foot distance just so another group can pass. Anxiety can also come from suppressed grief. Grief is a

real emotion that many of us are feeling. We have lost a way of life, lost graduations, celebrations, vacations, and finances. We have lost control, predictability, and stability. Denying that our hearts are heavy with it all brings further anxiety.

Colossians 3 offers us the promise of God's peace that will rule our hearts, but there are instructions that come with it. In Colossians 3:1 the apostle Paul reminds us to set our sights on the reality of heaven. When our focus is on the circumstances of the world, looking for peace to come, for our family to be healthy, for our finances to be secure, or for the political parties to get along, we will be disappointed.

Besides looking for our hope in heaven, this passage of Colossians also encourages us to be thankful. Be thankful in the small things. Be thankful for the everyday joys. In the above scenario, or one in which your pet is being approached by an aggressive dog, it is nearly impossible to get control of the situation if the need arises. It's much easier to regain control of - or protect -- a dog at the end of a six-foot standard flat leash than it is if he's 20 or more feet away at the end of what

can amount to a thin string. 3. The thin cord of a retractable leash can break - especially when a powerful dog is on the other end of it. If a strong, good-sized dog takes off at full speed, the cord can snap. Not only can that put the dog and whatever he may be chasing in danger, but also the cord can snap back and injure the human at the other end. 4.If a dog walker gets tangled up in the cord of a retractable leash, or grabs it in an attempt to reel in their dog, it can result in burns, cuts, and even amputation. In addition, many people have been pulled right off their feet by a dog that reaches the end of the leash and keeps going. This can result in bruises, "road rash," broken bones, and worse. 5.Dogs have also received terrible injuries as a result of

the sudden jerk on their neck that occurs when they run out the leash, including neck wounds, lacerated tracheas, and injuries to the spine. 6.Retractable leashes allow dogs more freedom to pull at the end of them, which can look like aggression to another dog who may decide to "fight back." 7. The handles of retractable leashes are bulky and can pulled out of be easily human hands, resulting runaway in а dog.

8. Along those same lines, many dogs - especially fearful ones - are terrorized by the sound of a dropped retractable leash handle and may take off running, which is dangerous enough. Microchip: A Small Investment that **Promises Big Return** for Pets

By now, most of us have heard of at least one tearful success story in the national news of a lost pet reunited with its family only after having been identified by an implanted microchip. Most of these stories garner media attention only when the animal has made an extraordinary journey. It is less recognized, however, how often these devices assist locally displaced or wandering animals. At our hospital, we are asked with increasing frequency, often several times a week, to scan for and identify lost and wandering pets by their microchip.

Pet microchips utilize radio frequency identification technology (RFID), similar to the technology most of us use daily in our E-Zpass® toll devices. The implanted device is about the size of a grain of rice and is injected under the skin between the shoulder blades where it remains inert until activated by Continued on page 11

a scanner targeting a specific frequency. When scanned, radio waves generate an electrical impulse that is processed by the microchip and relayed back to the scanner in the form of a numeric identifying number.

Over the years, the safety of implanting microchip devices has been closely scrutinized by the public, animal health providers and scientists alike. There have been several sensationalized stories in the media linking microchip implantation to cancer. While there are rare instances in which microchips have been suspected of causing a localized tumor, this risk is infinitesimally small--no greater than the risk of developing a tumor from a splinter, other medical implants or even routine injections. The British Small Animal Veterinary Association has been tracking adverse reactions related to microchip implantation since 1996, and in over 3.7 million registered pets there have been just two cases of a tumor developing at the site of injection. The most common issue noted, although also infrequent, is migration of the microchip. This is improving with newer generation microchips designed to attach to tissues more

quickly and securely.

reactions reported are rare and consistent with that of any injection, and include localized infection, hair loss or swelling.

While microchips are often implanted by non-veterinarians, under New York State law it is considered a veterinary practice and should be performed by, or under the supervision of, a veterinarian. Having your veterinarian implant the microchip also has added safeguards: it significantly decreases the potential for adverse reactions, ensures the use of a reputable ISO standardized 134.2 mHz microchip and provides a failsafe when databases do not have current contact information for pet owners. In the event of inaccurate owner contact information, microchips can be tracked to the veterinary office where this vital information is maintained.

Combined with traditional ID tags and collars, microchips are a safe and important tool in preventing pet theft, tracking their health, and most importantly reuniting lost animals with their families. If you have not yet had your pet microchipped, please consider this potentially life-saving procedure. Talk to your veterinarian to determine if microchip implantation is the right choice for you and your pet.

UBI pilot program for Hudson. Many advocates of basic income have long maintained that the coming technological shift and wave of automation would wipe out millions of traditional jobs and leave everyday Americans without a safety net. The concept of a universal basic income is a simple one: unconditional, regularly recurring payments made to everyone. With HudsonUP, The Spark of Hudson & Humanity Forward aim to partner with the Hudson community to test this simple concept by providing \$500 each month to 22 randomly-selected Hudson residents for five years.

Universal Basic Income has a longer history than some realize. One of the first proponents of Universal Basic Income in the United States was Thomas Payne, author of the Common Sense pamphlet, and individuals as varied as Martin Luther King, Jr. and economist Milton Friedman have spoken in support of the concept. Andrew Yang's recent presidential campaign highlighted the importance of a national UBI program for the United States.

Albert Wenger is a managing partner at Union Square Ventures (USV), a thesis-driven venture capital firm. USV backs trusted brands that broaden access to knowledge, capital, and wellbeing by leveraging networks, platforms, and protocols. USV's current portfolio companies include Coinbase, Duolingo, Nurx, Skillshare, Stash. Past portfolio companies include Etsy, MongoDB, Twilio and Twitter. Before joining USV, Albert was the president of del.icio. us through the company's sale to Yahoo and an angel investor (Etsy, Tumblr). He previously founded or co-founded several including companies, а management consulting firm and a healthcare data analytics company. Albert graduated from Harvard College in economics and computer science and holds a Ph.D. in Information Technology from MIT. In his book, World After Capital, Albert describes the shift to a Knowledge Age — and its implications not only for businesses but all of us.
