

Plenty of animals tuck away food for the winter, including red squirrels, who prepare a particularly unique snack to enjoy when the temperature drops. Along with storing seeds and nuts, the culinarily inclined critters dry out mushrooms in trees to make what National <u>Geographic</u> describes as "hand-made artisanal coniferdried mushroom jerky." Yum! Thundersnow is a rare, but real, weather phenomenon. It's not unusual to hear thunder during a summer storm, but did you know that thunder can come clapping during the

winter months, too? It's called thundersnow, and it's a rare weather phenomenon that refers to a snowstorm complete with both thunder and lightning. For thundersnow to occur, "the air layer closer to the ground has to be warmer than the layers above, but still cold enough to create snow," according to CNN. And there's also pink watermelon snow that has a sweet smell and taste. Spotting colorful snow of any shade is exciting, but if you happen to see pink snow then you can impress your friends by letting them know it's called watermelon snow, according to The Old Farmer's Almanac. Along with sharing the tasty fruit's pleasant pink shade, the snow also smells sweet. But that doesn't mean that you should eat it! The rosy hue is often due to algae, which can make you sick if you ingest it. rollers are Snow selfforming snowballs. Don't feel like rolling your own snowballs this winter? Then you'll want to keep an eye out for snow rollers, which, according

to *National Geographic*, are "the cold weather equivalent of tumbleweeds." Apparently, "wind pushes snow across the ground, gathering it into a hollow cylinder" and creating these self-forming snowballs. Some cities use beet juice, beer waste, and pickle brine on icy winter roads instead of salt. For years, it's been common practice to use salt on roads and sidewalks in order to melt slippery-and potentially dangerous-ice. But, salt can actually be harmful to the environment and in an effort to be more eco-friendly, some cities are using alternative methods to melt ice, such as beet juice, beer waste, and pickle brine, according to National <u>Geographic</u>. 





Veterinarians are often known for their roles in treating our pets and our farm animals. However, their responsibilities and skills go beyond these positions. While many people know that veterinarians are involved with marine life, wildlife, zoos, and shelters, it is also important to point out that they have a critical part in public health and government. Veterinarians in private practice also contribute to public health. They are trained to diagnose, prevent, and treat diseases of

animals that may affect both owners and their communities. This may include vaccinating against certain pathogens, implementing parasite control programs, and educating the public on certain diseases that could be harmful to public health. Veterinarians are also taught to report certain diseases to public health officials and collaborate with human medical professionals on zoonotic infections. Many diseases have been eradicated or significantly controlled due to veterinary inspection of animal imports and exports, which plays an important part in the defense against foreign animal diseases

Veterinarians also have careers directly in research and public health surveillance. These individuals are involved in understanding interactions between diseases, their hosts (animal or human), the environment, and how these connections impact society and our economy. This research leads to developing new therapies to manage and prevent threats to our health. As the World Health Organization has discussed, research of many diseases is handicapped by lack of knowledge, and veterinarians are part of the equation to breaking through that barrier.

Veterinarians are involved in making sure medications, vaccines and medical devices are safe and effective. They work with the FDA, USDA, and EPA to regulate these areas and encourage the development of safer and more effective products.

At both the state and federal levels of government, veterinarians work in food safety, disease surveillance, outbreak investigation, laboratory animal care, biomedical research, and public health management. At the state level, each department of agriculture has a state veterinarian responsible for protecting livestock, poultry, aquaculture, and the public. These veterinarians regulate the import and processing of animals to control and eradicate diseases, as well as protect the welfare of these animals. Veterinarians are also involved in the legislative branch of the government to publicize laws, rules, and regulations that protect public health and national defense. Veterinarians protect not only our pets, but play a crucial role in protecting humans, other animals, and society.

goes along with the holidays can be stressful for our dogs that don't quite understand what is going on. While we humans try to get more done in the time we have, our dogs only see an upset to their normal routine, trees growing in the living room and, in many homes, an unusual amount of kitchen activity that produces amazing aromas. HOLIDAY FOODS

While the array a food that comes from our kitchen are treats to be had by the human members of our households, they can be dangerous when consumed by our dogs; some even toxic. These include fatty or spicy foods, bread dough, fresh herbs, alcoholic beverages and sweets of all kind, especially those with chocolate or xylitol, an artificial sweetener. Particularly dangerous are cooked poultry bones. Cooked bones easily splinter, and the bone shards can cause choking or get stuck in your dog's gums. Instead, give "dog bones" specifically designed for dogs to chew.

Ask your veterinarian or trainer for suggestions. Discourage your dog from foraging in the garbage. Secure all trash cans. It's natural that you do want to share holiday treats with your dog. While a small taste of turkey or sweet potatoes can make your dog happy, don't over do it. Too much of a good thing can make him sick.

DECORATIONS ARE NOT PLAYTHINGS

Keep your pets away from holiday plants, many of which are poisonous, such as holly, mistletoe, poinsettias and amaryllis. Snow globes can contain antifreeze, which is extremely toxic to dogs. Keep any antifreeze products away from your happy, tailwagging dog. If there is an antifreeze spill, send your dog out of the room while you clean up the liquid. Dilute the spot with water and floor cleaner to ensure your dog does not lick the area later. **Continued on page 7**

Keep electrical wires and batteries out of your pet's reach. Chewing or biting anything electrical can cause shock or burns. lighted Don't leave candles unattended. A lit candle knocked over by a swinging tail can burn your pet or cause a fire. CHRISTMAS TREES CAN BE

HAZARDOUS Anchor the tree to the ceiling or



The trajectory of ordinary life consists of growing, school, college, and then many years of work. What about Jesus? Do you every wonder what His days were like? He grew up in a carpenter's family, with brothers and went on to be a carpenter Himself.

Stop for a moment and think of Jesus as a young man, working with wood, building beautiful things. I wonder if He was ever restless, thinking that He was wasting His life hammering nails, impatient for the "real" work of "ministering".

Don't we all seem to think that the public life of a person in the limelight of a pulpit or stage is what is most important? Yet most of our lives is made up of work.

In her book *Simply Tuesday*, Emily P Freeman has some profound insights into the work of our hands. She wrote, "We were made to build, to co-create, to bring glory to God with the work of our hands, to move into the world as unique reflections



of Christ. But we were not made to fill rooms, stadiums, or bank accounts. We were not made to fill our souls with worth we construct with our hands."

If the work of our hands is a work of co-creating to bring glory to God, would not the work of Jesus' hands as a carpenter been such a work as well. Rather than lament the boundaries that work puts on our life and our time, could we learn to look at work as an opportunity to "move through the world as unique reflections of Christ"? (As Emily P. Freeman puts it)

Reflecting Christ in our work starts first in our heart attitude and heart relationship with Him. It may begin with a thankful attitude, about the work His has given, or it may begin with an attitude of availability asking Him to use our work to bring encouragement or joy to another. As a professional seamstress I think of my own work as a way of creating beauty in this world, in such a way that brings others joy.

I wonder what reflection of the character of God was seen in the carpentry of Jesus' hands. This Christmas season may you find joy in the work of your hands as you reflect the image of Christ in all that you do. Don't belittle the smallness of any task, it is all equal opportunity to bring glory to God in your everyday life.

May Colossians 3:23 bring you encouragement and joy, "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for human masters."

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).







"We're taking on more properties to maintain and manage for absentee landlords, or landlords who are investing and buying multi-families." 

and that Dan helped formulate the current town zoning laws. He was part of the team that helped update the zoning law and Comprehensive Plan back in 2009, so he's an expert on that. A History of Commitment To Community

The Staley family has long been an integral part of the Rhinebeck and Northern Dutchess community. In the 1960's Knick and his father, Homer Sr., were instrumental in helping Brooke Astor dispose of her large family property, and creating subdivisions of land, but also working with her to preserve a substantial area, Ferncliff Forest.

But even before that, Knick notes that his grandfather Irving led work projects and helped

fellow families during the tough times of the Depression.

"He was a very successful contractor who built "stone row" at Bard College. He was a stone and brick mason, mainly. And he had a crew of 25 men when the Depression hit. And what they did back then before there was any government assistance, welfare, food stamps, is everybody took care of everybody else. My grandfather kept paying his men, even though he had no work.

"And he came up with work for them. One of the things he did is he got some investors together and they bought some apple orchards, and made the Red Hook Golf Club. And so he invented work, and those 25 families over the years turned into hundreds of families. And because of what my grandfather did, we've received back a lot of local business."

Knick credits his grandfather Irving, whose slogan was "Build Right the First Time" for sowing seeds that influenced the region and created lasting good will.

Continuing that community involvement is just as important to Knick and Dan.

"We're established here, 73 years this year, and we'll be going into our 74th, which we're very proud of," says Dan. "My goal is to maintain the Staley Real Estate family business. And have no intention of merging or anything like that in the future. I'd like to make it to 100 years in my lifetime."
