With five state-of-the-art bays for both training and playing available for individuals or groups, as well as a sports bar boasting five big screen TVs and classic bar food, Hudson Valley Indoor Golf has quickly become a go-to spot for entertainment serious enthusiasts.



ACCORDING TO QUACKERS



The name for January comes from the Roman God Janus, who is always depicted with two heads. He uses one head to look back on the year before and the other head to look forward to the New Year! In leap years, January always starts on the same day as April and July. Some historical names for

January include "Wulfmonath," which came from the Anglo-Saxons because it was the month hungry wolves would come scavenging. King Charlemagne would call it "Wintermanoth," meaning "winter/cold month." Originally, the Roman calendar had only 10 months, and it excluded January and February. King Numa Pompilius, the second king of Rome, is responsible for adding both January and February to the Roman calendar. He did this so calendars would be equivalent to a lunar year. Even so, it only had 30 days. Finally, Julius Caesar added the 31st day to the month and completed it to the full month of January that we practice now! Generally, January is the coldest month of the year in Northern Hemisphere.

there's nobody doing really high tech golf instruction. I use force plates and dual high-speed cameras that integrate into computer software, where I can really break down your swing to highlight what's working and where to improve. I've only been using this technology for the past few months, and the number of students who have made huge progress very quickly. There's nobody else doing that locally."

For competitive golfers, Hudson Valley Indoor Golf has five bays equipped for sophisticated virtual golf training, metrics feedback and game play simulation.

"So there could be five individuals or five groups," Evan explains. "And the way it works is you come into a bay and you're basically renting a bay for a period of time. We go in half hour increments, with most groups staying for a few hours. In off-peak times, which is Monday through Friday from nine until three, it's \$45 an hour. And then on evenings and weekends it's \$55 an hour. But if you bring four people, you chop that cost in quarters, making it a very affordable way to spend some free time."

"The general rule of thumb is that if you're a single player, you can finish 18 holes of golf in well under an hour. So you hear about some of the traditional golf playing nine holes, even as a single can take an hour and a half to two hours. Here you're doing 18 in 45 minutes. So it allows you to do a lot more in a lot less time. Generally, a foursome, once you kind of get the hang of the technology, can play 18 holes in about three hours."

"If you're a really serious player, there's dual overhead cams that are high speed, and an infrared field that the club swings

through. And that gives you data analytics on face angle, exact impact position, club speed, ball speed, smash factor, as well as all your distances, carry distance, total distance, spin rate, rollout trajectory, launch angle, all that stuff. To your average recreational player, that's not going to mean a whole lot. But to serious players, that's the holy grail."

At Hudson Valley Indoor Golf, players can choose virtual courses from around the world. The software used at the facility has almost a hundred thousand courses on it. Just about any course played by golfers on the pro circuits are available, says Evan.

"One of the most popular features is the slow motion replay that shows your club actually making contact with the ball. This plays after every swing and makes it so clear for all golfers what is actually happening at impact, they get better without really trying. So you're in the bay, you take your swing, you hit it, you get to watch the ball flight simulated, which is insanely accurate. Then it gives you all your launch data and statistics along with a slow motion video of your club actually hitting it so you can see precisely where you hit the ball on your club."

Hudson Valley Indoor Golf is just as good at providing recreational entertainment that families and even young children can participate in via intuitive and friendly technology. That includes special features for younger players, and a world of zany virtual golf courses meant to accentuate the fun.

"There are plenty of makebelieve and silly golf courses that are available to play too. One favorite is called parents versus kids, with courses that would never work in real life, but they're designed so that you can have mom and dad play from adult tees. And then you can have your five-year-old play from five-yearold tees and your 8-year-old play from 8-year-old tees. That's great. And it all automatically adjusts."

Hudson Valley Indoor Golf has basic but tasty pub style food offerings, and a vibe that puts the accent on fun, Evan emphasizes. "One of the things that I think really differentiates Hudson Valley Indoor Golf is our emphasis on fun and being welcoming. I've always said

that golf is a game for everyone, and we try to make that clear when people come in. You don't need to be a pro or even consider yourself a "golfer." There are plenty of guests who come in and borrow clubs and just have a good time playing a great game. We give everyone free popcorn when they come in, so it gets a little bit of a movie theater feel, except the popcorn is way cheaper. And yes, we have food because that's part of it, but we're never going to become a full-blown restaurant. We've got chicken wings, mozzarella sticks, french fries and big German pretzels, the kind of food you can eat while playing and having a good time." A Pro With A Passion For

Teaching

Evan's personal journey in the sport started relatively late, for someone who managed to become a PGA professional.

"I started when I was 13. I was helping my dad clear out the basement of a rental property that we had, and there were some old golf clubs down there. And



being a teenager, I was hitting rocks with sticks, and I was like, man, this is kind of fun."

"The only person in my family that played golf was my uncle. So I convinced him to take me out. We went to a baseball field and he was just going to let me hit a couple. The very first one I hit was a driver, and I absolutely pounded it from next to home plate. The ball flew out of the park and bounced it off the side of the school building that was a couple hundred yards away. So he was like, alright off to the driving range we go. From that point on, I just fell in love with it and then made my high school team the following year."

Evan played on his college golf team while at St. Rose.

After spending some time after college teaching an eighth grade English class in Brooklyn, Evan grew a passion for giving golf lessons into a full time gig.

"It kind of just led from one thing to another, with people booking lessons. I became head pro at Marine Park Golf Course in Brooklyn for a couple of years. I was running their shop and giving tons of lessons. And then I left to go down to South Florida, where I worked for the PGA of America at PGA Golf Club golf for five years. And I got my PGA certification and learned a ton there. And then it was time to have kids. So my wife and I moved back to New York, and I became the Head Pro/Director of Golf at Columbia Golf and Country

Evan and his wife Elisabeth made a decision that they wanted to open their own facility, just before COVID hit the world scene. "I was the director of golf at Columbia

County,

Golf and Country Club, and I was looking at what was going on in the winter, and there was just such a huge void in golf opportunities. I wanted to build a simulator center. The technology was coming along, and I really saw the need for activities like this in the community up here, because there really just wasn't much happening, especially in the winter months. I got started working on it and found this space, which is in a commercial building. We converted the whole thing in 2020, when Covid was happening, and we opened what I call a soft open in January of '21."

Evan says one of the biggest personal reasons for starting his own business was to pursue his passion of teaching.

"I'm passionate about growing the game and helping people play better and introducing new people and creating more

golfers. I believe a big way of doing that is by removing some of the obstacles. And as I rededicate myself to my first love of teaching, I'm investing in this technology in a way that nobody else is doing locally. I'm working on offering programs for beginners, for women, and working with companies on doing corporate clinics as part of professional development."

Another endeavor that Evan takes pride in is Hudson Valley Indoor Golf's work with PGA of America in their program called PGA Hope.

"HOPE stands for Helping Our Patriots Everywhere and it's free golf instruction and lessons to veterans. Over the winter we're going to be hosting a HOPE Clinic here, which is eight weeks of clinics that are completely free to the veterans. They can come in, and they'll use the facility and get instruction from myself and a couple other PGA pros that are coming in, all at no cost to them. 



Ingredients

1 1/2 pounds ground meatloaf mix (equal parts ground beef, pork and veal or turkey)

1 cup dried breadcrumbs

2 tablespoons chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley 2 large eggs, lightly beaten

1 medium onion, grated

1 clove garlic, minced

1/2 cup ketchup

1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

2 teaspoons light brown sugar

Directions

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Line a rimmed baking sheet with parchment.

Combine the meatloaf mix, breadcrumbs, parsley, eggs, onion, garlic, 1/4 cup of the ketchup, 1 tablespoon of the Worcestershire, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper in Using your hands, mix together until a large mixing bowl. well combined.

Transfer the mixture to the prepared baking sheet and form it into a compact oval-shaped loaf about 9 inches by 5 inches. Bake the meatloaf for 30 minutes.

Stir the brown sugar together with the remaining 1/4 cup ketchup and 1 teaspoon Worcestershire in a small bowl for the glaze. Brush the top and sides of the meatloaf all over with the glaze. Return to the oven and bake until the glaze starts to caramelize and a thermometer inserted in the center of the

meatloaf registers 160 degrees F, about 25 minutes more. Let rest for 10 minutes before slicing and serving.

Motion Sickness in Dogs and Cats

We love taking our pets with us on adventures with us, but the feeling isn't always mutual. Dogs and cats can become sick while riding in the car and this can cause anxiety and fear about traveling. This can be particularly stressful, especially when we need to travel with our pets.

This is typically more common in younger animals compared to older, presumably because the ear structures used for balance aren't fully developed. However, the cause is not fully understood. While most of the pets that have motion sickness when they are young will outgrow it, some will not. Sometimes the pet can begin to equate travelling with the sensation of nausea even after they mature. Or, they equate travelling with going to the veterinarian, which causes stress resulting in the same outcomes of vomiting, drooling, pacing and panting. If you suspect your pet may be feeling sick from the motion of the car, there are several things you can to do to prevent this from becoming a chronic issue:

Do not feed your pet for 2-4 hours prior to a car ride. Some pets require longer fasting but consult your veterinarian to make sure it is safe.

Start slow – allow your pet to be in the car with the engine off for a few occasions. Once they seem comfortable with that, turn the car on for a few minutes but don't move. Once that seems okay, start going short distances (i.e. 30 seconds at 5 mph.) and work up to longer trips "around the block" and then full car rides to your destinations.

Have your pet face forward or in a carrier with coverings on the sides so they must look forward to see out of the carrier

Consider a seatbelt for keeping your pet secure if you don't a carrier. Some

require seatbelts or carriers for pets while in the car.


Keep the vehicle cool. If it seems like anxiety is playing a role, give a treat with praise when they get into the car and before they get out, (this is assuming putting food in their stomach doesn't trigger vomiting).

Consider medications to help prevent the sensation of feeling sick. If pets are less likely to vomit or feel nauseous, they will feel more at ease in the car the next time they travel because they did not have that previous negative experience.

There are some successful remedies used in humans such acupuncture/acupressure, ginger, and other herbs. These have not been confirmed to be helpful in dogs and cats and, unfortunately, there is no safety data for their use in animals.

If anxiety is also playing a role, consider pheromones such as Adaptil in dogs or Feliway in cats. Spray it on a towel where your pet will be and allow at least 10 minutes before you put your pet in the car. Ensure all cats are in a carrier (whenever possible) as this will provide a safe space for them to hide if they prefer. Consider anti-anxiety supplements and medications if your pet continues to pace, pant, vomiting, or have diarrhea. Cats tend to develop these signs from anxiety rather than true motion sickness, so a lot of managing cat "car sickness" is targeted at managing anxiety. Discuss these tips, supplements, and medication with your veterinarian to help make your pet comfortable so they enjoy taking the trip with you.

WINTER-PROOFING YOUR DOG

The holiday season has come and gone and now we look forward to the slower pace and tranquility of the winter months. During this colder season, we need to take special precautions to protect our canine friends from the cold. While it's easy to think that dogs are immune to cold because of their fur, the fact is that more dogs perish due to stress in the winter than at any other time of year. The following are some basic safety tips that are worth repeating and will help ensure your dog remains healthy throughout the winter.

WATCH FOR SIGNS OF FROSTBITE OR **HYPOTHERMIA**

Puppies, smaller dogs, older dogs and those with short coats should not be left out doors below 40°F. With proper shelter, other dogs can be safe down to 20°. However, be alert to signs of frostbite or hypothermia. Dogs' ears, paws and tail are especially susceptible. If you suspect frostbite, bring your dog into a warm location and contact your veterinarian. Always wipe your dog's feet after a walk in the snow to remove ice balls and salt deposits from the

road. Signs of hypothermia are shivering, lethargy, low heart rate and unresponsiveness. If you notice any of these signs, bring your dog into a warm area, place a light blanket over him, and call your veterinarian. Short hair dogs such as Chihuahuas, Greyhounds and even Pit Bulls might need a sweater or other protective gear. Leaving the warm temperature of the house to go outside can result in immediate chilling for these dogs. PROVIDE A PROTECTIVE **SHELTER**

If your dog stays outside much of the time in the winter, make absolutely certain that doghouse meets certain minimum criteria. First, it needs to be raised a couple of inches off the frozen ground or concrete. The inside should have a floor covered with cedar shavings or straw. Add a flap to the door and face the dog house away from the wind and weather. Place the dog house under an overhang or other shelter to keep snow off its roof. The size of the dog house should be large enough so your dog can sit and stand, but small enough so his body heat will be retained in the house. Provide water frequently and in plastic dishes to ensure the dog's tongue does not get stuck to cold metal.

KEEP OLDER, ARTHRITIC DOGS INSIDE

Older, possibly infirm or arthritic

dogs should not be left outside circumstances! any Escort the older dog outside for toileting and use a leash if the ground is covered with ice or snow. Older dogs can easily fall and seriously injured himself. Keep your dog safe!

YOUR DOG MAY NEED **SOME ADDED NUTRITION**

Dogs will use more calories in the winter if they remain active. This will require the amount of food to be increased by approximately 10%. However, many dogs become less active in the winter because their owners don't walk them as frequently or they are not outside as often. If that is the case, do not increase the amount of food. Like many of us who are less active during the winter, less active dogs may be inclined to add on a few extra pounds during winter months, which should, of course, be avoided. The bottom line is, pay attention to your dog's appetite. If he seems hungrier, give him a little more food. If he is a couch potato in the winter, cut back a bit or give him healthier treats. Fresh fruit and raw vegetables are good choices. Experiment to determine what you dog likes. Apple slices (with skin and core removed), carrots and sweet potato slices are popular favorites.



With names like Astor, Roosevelt, and Livingston, the women featured in "Ladies of the Valley" were born into families of great privilege, owners of large tracts of land in the Hudson Valley. These women were mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of wealthy landowners, and were often left in charge of these estates while the men were off pursuing political, military and business glories. Despite little education in these fields, these women often took on the roles of farmer, landlord, accountant, merchant, horticulturist and nurse to do what was required to maintain their families, their employees, and their properties. At the same time, they worked to fulfill their roles as society matrons, matriarchs, and philanthropists in the society of New York City and the Hudson Valley, overseeing the education of their children, arranging appropriate marriages, and insuring their heirs' successes in that small society of Old New York.

Presenter Mary Mistler has lived in the Hudson Valley area for most of her life, has worked as an administrator and teacher, and has volunteered as a docent at the Home of Franklin D. Roosevelt, the Vanderbilt Mansion and the Wilderstein Historic Site. After a walk, be sure to clean your dog's paws. Salt that is spread on roads and sidewalks can be toxic to pets. Please don't use any products unless the packaging specifies that it is "pet friendly" and be sure to wipe your dog's feet if he has been walking in areas where you don't know what may be on the ground. Many dogs become very sick or even lose their life from drinking antifreeze. Dogs like the sweet taste of antifreeze. When left in the garage, dogs may seek out a plastic antifreeze container that was inadvertently left on the floor and may try to open it. Make certain that all antifreeze containers are well out of reach of your dog.
