Panorama: OLANA's Week-Long Summer **Youth Program Opens** for Registration

Today, The Olana Partnership announced its 13th annual Panorama Summer **Program** for four weeks starting in July through early August 2022 at Olana State Historic Site. Certified teachers, professionals, and museum educators will deliver the weeklong programs. This year, instructors developed hands-on educational activities for children ages 7-11 that encourage creative

Week one will be July 11-15 **Exploring Nature.** Educators from the Taconic Outdoor Education Center will use the lens of environmental education to guide students throughout Olana's 250-acre artist-designed landscape. Students will learn more about the flora fauna that inhabit their local environments and explore the way artists and historical figures like Frederic Church related to the natural world in their own time. Through hands-on activities, walks, and tours of the site, students will be encouraged to explore their relationship to the environment around them.

Week two will be July 18-22 and will focus on the theme of Art **Expeditions.** Inspired by Frederic Church's art and masterwork, the tools and training you need. their artmaking. This week will

draw attention to how artists like Church explored different parts of the world and the American landscape to fuel their artmaking. Students will learn more about how exploration and place can serve as a source of inspiration for artists of all backgrounds.

The third week will be July 25-July 29, focusing on Exploring Architecture. Led by The Olana Partnership educators, students will learn more about what inspired Frederic Church's unique design of the Main House to create their own architectural vision. Students will use different designs and structures throughout the week to boost their creations.

The fourth and final week will d will focus on the theme of be held from August 1-August 5, focusing on Garden Adventures. Who Was St. Patrick?

Friday nights, they want to be able to walk into their homes knowing that my team and myself have made sure their houses are clean, their grass is green, their pools are blue, their ice is fresh, etc. Some clients ask us to decanter their wine ahead of their arrival, that in itself is a form of art I have learned.. I believe that when you have somebody with several years' experience that's also able to handle the construction and project management as well on top of it, that's key.

"On Fridays, all of my workmen know that house should be in its best possible state. When the client walks through the door, the home should be free of any tools, material or construction debri.... It all needs to be cleaned up. All of my workmen know I hold very high standards for respecting the clients space no matter what we are undergoing

that day. I think that kind of thing is what has given me kind of a gold star right now in the local industry. They are so appreciative of that level of management."



Deadline: March 14, 2022

Arts Mid-Hudson announces the Statewide Community Regrant Program, a funding program with over \$125,000 in funds to support the arts in Dutchess, Orange, and Ulster Counties. This funding is available to individual artists to create new work in 2022, and to nonprofit organizations, individual artists, libraries, and municipalities for arts and cultural activities in 2022. Please note: this program was previously called the Decentralization Program. Eligible projects may include but are not limited to: exhibits, performances, concerts, festivals, and in-school community workshops, screenings, readings, cultural programming, and the creation of work. Grant awards are determined by a peer review panel made up of community members. Three distinct grant programs:

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Slow-Cooker Corned Beef and Cabbage

Ingredients

peeled and cut into 1/2-inch coins

medium yellow or sweet onion, thinly sliced

l large clove garlic, thinly sliced

1 large bay leaf

1 3-pound corned beef brisket (in package with spice packet)
1 12-ounce bottle of dark beer such as stout or porter (for a nonalcoholic version, replace the beer with an additional 1 1/2 cups beef broth)

1 tablespoon apple cider vinegar 1 tablespoon light brown sugar

1 teaspoon Dijon mustard 1-2 cups beef broth (plus additional as needed) 6-8 medium red potatoes, rinsed and quartered

1 small head green cabbage

Preparation

ASSEMBLE THE CORNED BEEF: Place the carrots, onion, garlic and bay leaf in the bottom of a 6-quart slow cooker.

Place the corned beef on top of the vegetables. Whisk the spice packet that came with the corned beef together with the beer, vinegar, brown sugar and mustard. Pour over the corned beef, then pour in the 2 cups beef broth. The liquid should completely submerge the vegetables and partially cover the corned beef — the amount needed to do this will vary depending on the depth and model of slow cooker, so add more broth as necessary.

Place the potatoes on top of the corned beef.

Close the slow cooker and cook on low for 6 1/2 hours before adding

the cabbage. (If your slow cooker has a warm function, you can hold the beef and vegetables for up to 90 minutes before adding the cabbage if ADD THE CABBAGE: Core the cabbage and slice into 8 wedges.

Open the slow cooker and place the cabbage on top of the potatoes and corned beef. Close and cook for another 1 1/2 hours, until the cabbage is

tender but still retains its shape.

FINISH AND SERVE: Remove the cabbage with tongs, then carefully lift the corned beef out of the liquid and transfer to a cutting board. Strain the potatoes, carrots and onions from the cooking liquid, discarding the liquid. Slice the corned beef and serve with the cabbage and vegetables.

Since big families frequently want to be present during endof-life it's easier on everyone to say goodbye at home.

During the the most daunting phase of covid -- before we fully understood about masks and vaccinations -- Dr. Danielle made house calls outside or in the garage as she followed the often-changing safety guidelines. "Now every set of circumstances is different and I have the ability to be flexible," she explains. "And, in my experience, dogs and cats do not get Covid." However, pets have gotten used to people being at home during lockdown. As employees return to the office, "pets are experiencing separation anxiety." Some dog owners find CBD to be helpful in managing this separation anxiety but Dr. Danielle says, "The American Veterinary Medical Association does not condone any use of CBD products for animals" because there is currently no scientific research on the

effectiveness of CBD to treat anxiety in pets and CBD products are not yet regulated. Astatement on the AVMA website says, "The AVMA continues to encourage well-controlled clinical research and pursuit of FDA approval by manufacturers of cannabis-derived products so that high-quality products of known safety and efficacy can be made available for veterinarians and their patients." Meanwhile, there are anxiety medications as well as natural over-the-counter products and tinctures that may help to relieve separation-anxiety symptoms. Any severe or chronic cases may need to be addressed by a licensed veterinarian who can recommend prescription medication.

Ultimately, Dr. Danielle believes, "Fresh air and exercise are most beneficial as well as proper nutrition and hydration." And she firmly believes in talking to your pet using affectionate words since your furry friend "responds to the emotions conveyed in your tone of voice."

Lastly, Dr. Danielle claims, "If I have learned anything about Covid and veterinary medicine it is this: People of all ages should have a contingency plan for pet care, should the unthinkable happen." During lockdown and during the recent ice storms, folks were buying food and medicine in bulk, putting up bottled water, making sure gas tanks and oil tanks were full in case of emergency, and writing their wills. "Please remember our pets when making just-incase plans," she insists, "and make sure friends and relatives are aware of your wishes."

Dr. St. Pierre covers in-home veterinary visits to pets in the Dutchess County, Ulster County and Columbia County areas including but not limited to Kingston, Hudson, Red Hook, Rhinebeck, Tivoli, Hyde Park, and Poughkeepsie. Visits farther than 20 miles can be arranged on an individual basis for an additional fee. Payment arrangements must be made prior to services. Clients have the choice of burying their pet at home, individual cremation (with ashes returned in person) or selecting group cremation.

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
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Inappropriate **Urination in Cats**

It is no question that cats can be complex creatures. If you have (or have had) cats in your life, you'll know that they are not always easy to read and can act very different from one another. This can make living with them a bit tricky, especially when their complexity results in urinating on your carpet or shoes!

Urinating outside of the box, often referred to as inappropriate urination, can have a multitude of causes. This can lead to very difficult and tense times as you cannot easily treat the problem if you don't know the cause. Inappropriate urination can be grouped in to three main root causes: Litter box avoidance; preference for somewhere else; and a vague "I don't feel well" this last one can refer to medical psychological. reasons or

Litterbox avoidance means that there is something about the box

could be the location, the box itself (sides are too tall, covered, not covered), or the type of litter used. Cats are most likely to prefer the finer, clumping litter that is not strongly scented. Be sure the litter box is not near a loud noise (washer/dryer, furnace, a busy street, playroom, and so on). Some cats like covered boxes, whereas others do not. Be sure the kitty is not getting bullied in or around the box by another cat, dog, or child. Many cats like to use the box in privacy. To help this situation, be sure you have enough boxes, offer a few types of litter to see which is preferred, and make sure the boxes are in different (and quiet) locations. The golden rule for boxes is "n

+ 1", meaning it is the number

of cats you have plus 1 more

that the cat does not like. This

box. So if you have 1 cat, that's 2 boxes. If you have 5 cats, that's 6 boxes (sorry). You can also use litter that has an attractant to help draw the cats to it. Lastly, if your kitty is older, make sure they can easily access the box and get in/out without much effort.

Preference for somewhere else is tricky and frustrating. There might be nothing exactly wrong with their box, but they've decided they prefer the scent of your shoes or the texture of the couch. This can also be seen with cats who are marking their territory. Marking is differentiated from other urination in that it is often a smaller amount and directed on to a vertical surface. This usually means there is a cat around who is making them anxious. To help this problem, try to make the

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Making Hard **Decisions**

Advance Care Planning means just that; we make plans about our healthcare in advance. Obviously we cannot predict what will happen to our health, but we can make our wishes known as to what treatments and types of care we want carried

out when the time comes. Adults over the age of 18 y.o. (in most states) have the right to manage their health affairs. An important step is to complete the necessary documents in case you become incapacitated - a situation where you are unable to make medical decisions. Keep in mind that you are not relinquishing your ability to decide when have full capacity. When

assign someone to make our wishes known that person is called the healthcare agent and we fill out the health proxy form. Although it is considered a "legal" document, this form does not require a lawyer's involvement and it does not need to be notarized. It requires the witnessing of two signatures. But that is the simple part; it tells the world "the who" you assigned to take your place. The critical completion of advance care planning is "the what" – having a conversation with your healthcare agent in order to describe your healthcare decisions in detail. "The Conversation" by Angelo E. Volandes, MD. is a helpful guide, since talking to others is often challenging when the subject is "the unspoken" – the decisions about end-of-life care.

In addition to completing the health proxy form and having the conversation, other helpful forms include a living will and/ or MOLST/POLST form. These forms list specifics as to what treatments you want done or do not want done. By putting this information in writing and signing it, there is more

weight and clarity placed on your decisions. MOLST stands for Medical Orders

Life-Sustaining Treatment. A POLST form Continued on page 10

is the same document; the "P" stands for "Physician." With MOLST/POLST, you review your decisions with your provider (doctor, nurse practitioner, or physician assistant depending on the state) and in addition to you signing the form, the provider signs the form. By completing this form, it officially makes your decisions medical orders, and those orders are to be followed when/if the time comes. If you are interested in more details about the use of these forms, more information about advance care planning and ordering these forms (they are free), visit the following link: https:// compassionandsupport.org/.

The next step is to distribute these forms. They

don't do any good if they remain in your file cabinet. You must give a copy to your healthcare agent, so they can reference your decisions and prove that they are the healthcare agent. You also want to make sure your key providers have a copy of this form, so that includes your primary physician and perhaps any specialists. Some people with severe chronic conditions give a copy to their local ER.

Overall, the above advance care planning steps seem pretty simple. Yet, I have served in assisting many families in my career and people are often not prepared for end-of-life decisions. One family member never told her niece, who lived out-of-state, that she was the healthcare agent. The niece had no form and never

had a conversation about her aunt's wishes. Yet when the aunt was dying and unresponsive, the niece had to make the decisions. It is not unusual that healthcare agents have the health proxy form but have failed to obtain a copy of the living will or MOLST form, so they have nothing to reference and are not sure what to do. There are people who have all the forms, but never had the conversation.

Even for those who are prepared, people struggle when the time comes to take action. Do you think you will be ready to manage end-of-life decisions? All too often I have witnessed healthcare agents backing off and changing the outcome of what their loved one's expressed. So, I will pause here; this is where you want to think long and hard about who you trust to be your healthcare agent. It's a possibility that the one you love the most may not serve you well in this position. We see this happen in our ICUs throughout the country: aggressive interventions taking place when the person did not want this. Then the question becomes: "Who are We Caring for in the I.C.U.?" This is the title of an opinion piece - described as follows. With the pandemic we are reaching the one-million mark for the number of deaths following end-stage COVID. Here is what it looks like: Your loved ones are intubated, in total respiratory failure, unable to ever breathe again on their own; they are unresponsive and nothing more can be done, except to deeply sedate them in hopes that they are not suffering in pain. But all too often what happens, instead of allowing the person to die, is that family members are not ready to let go. Despite death being inevitable in these cases and even if aggressive treatment is not what the individuals

wished for in their advance care planning, we see family members following their own needs and desires. What happened to respecting the wishes of their loved ones?" As the author states in this article: "There is a largely unacknowledged moment in critical care when doctors and nurses shift from caring for the patients in front of us to caring for their loved ones" (https:// www.nytimes.com/2022/02/06/ opinion/intensive-care-patienthospital.html?campaign_ i d = 2 & e m c = e d i tth_20220207&instance_id=5 2367&nl=todaysheadlines&r egi id=38880717&segment id=81884&user id=84c20c0f c176cb81ea3bb1ada54911fe).

Taking on the role as a healthcare agent requires contemplation. We need to be realistic about our abilities and determine if we are prepared to

take on the task. The one serving this role must have compassion for the person dying, while overriding their own grief. There is nothing easy about that.

I want to let my readers know that I will be taking a hiatus from writing this column for an indefinite time. Many thanks to all of you and publishers John Vogt and Doreen Baretsky for the many years of support. preferred spot less desirable. Block off access, if possible, and clean the area with enzymatic cleansers to clear the urine odor and make it less likely that they'll go back. If it's an area that will allow this, consider placing one of the boxes close by in hopes they'll use the box instead. If there is another cat around, you might need to talk to your veterinarian or a behaviorist. Lastly, when a cat is upset for any reason, this can translate

into inappropriate urination. It is important to note that it can be something medical or emotional. Another pet in the house, lurking wildlife, or nearby construction can be stressful for them. They may be bored or want to watch the birds but are unable to. They may have a urinary tract infection, or another medical issue that is causing them discomfort and distress. Because

The best way to get to the bottom of this problem is to check with your veterinarian. They can first rule out medical issues and then work through the scenarios you are dealing with to identify the cause and come up with a treatment and prevention plan. This might include environmental enrichment, pheromone sprays, consultation with a behaviorist, and possibly some

BUSINESSES ARE COMPOSTING THEIR FOOD SCRAPS THROUGH LOCAL HAULER

The O Zone Sustainability Center, located on Greig Farm in Red Hook, is a bulk-refill marketplace and a plastic-free shop that opened in February 2020. The O Zone provides a variety of goods, services and workshops for local residents to learn about many new sustainable options for our everyday life. Not only can you refill your own bottle of laundry detergent or body wash, make your own facial scrub, or partake in one of their many free recycling endeavors, such as textile or battery recycling, but you can also participate in their Community Compost CSA program! This local small business inspires our community members to take small everyday steps towards action against the climate crisis.

Since starting their Community Compost CSA program a little over a year ago, they have built a steady foundation of over 50+

residential families & businesses composting their food scraps. In 2021, they diverted over 20 tons of food scraps from the landfill, four times the amount that they diverted in 2020! An amazing community effort. This network of compost participants ranges from Rhinebeck all the way up to Hudson, many of whom would not be able to compost otherwise, as they live in apartments, in the village center, or in a residential community. Not only does The O Zone provide a local drop-off location at their shop, but they also offer weekly residential & commercial pick-up services! They can pick-up your food scraps

right from your doorstep! The O Zone is partnered with the Ulster County Resource Recovery Agency "UCRRA" in Kingston as well as Almstead Nursery in Ghent, to process our local food scraps into a nutrient-rich soil amendment called *compost*.

Municipal models are also in the works, with Village Compost of Rhinebeck, leading the way! Village Compost, a new pilot program put together by Climate Smart Rhinebeck, is selecting 100 families within the Village of Rhinebeck to participate in a 6-month long subsidized compost program, with food

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



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

This iconic American river, at the heart of the rise of New York City and westward expansion into the interior of the continent, was also a transportation super highway long before automobiles were invented. Throughout it all, the lighthouses kept watch, guarding the safety of the Hudson's waterborne traffic.

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
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
