

the wayward winds of March take flight.



Following the Example of the Savior

As we approach Holy Week, the image of a crucified Savior is impressed on our minds. However, do we see Jesus as merely our Savior and as we try to do the work ourselves? Even in my own faith background perhaps I relied heavily on the teachings of Christ without letting Him come close enough to be my teacher. Often, we look to pastors, Sunday School teachers and Christian authors for the knowledge that we long to gain. Philosopher Dallas Willard writes that we should be embracing Christ as our Teacher. He points out that we have the idea that the life of faith in Christ should be a life of abundance and obedience, but we have no bridge from the faith to life. We fall into faith as a religion that we must learn about rather than a relationship that we learn from.

To have a teacher naturally means that we must become students, (i.e. disciples) of the teacher. To become a student of Christ. Who better to be our teacher of peace than the Prince of Peace Himself. From teachers we learn by their example, their words, actions, interactions, and instruction. In our pursuit of a life of peace this week will be focused on Jesus as our Teacher of peace. One of the great lessons I have learned from Jesus as Teacher

is the pursuit of silence with His Father. There are so many instances when we see Jesus separate Himself from the crowd and turn to silence. In Mark 1:35 He rose early to pray. In Luke 5: 16 Jesus withdrew from the crowds to pray. There are so many more instances, but in Jesus' example I see how His time alone with the Father gave Him strength for His ministry.

As Jesus ministered to the crowds, I can only imagine how overwhelming it might have been to have all those people needing him. I don't know about you but with all the activities of life the pursuit of silence can be pushed aside. It is likely that your life is also filled with the demands of people around you. The word 'overwhelmed' is a common feeling in our society. In my opinion "overwhelm" and sounds exactly opposite to the feeling of peace. 

Air Fryer Chicken Cordon Bleu



Ingredients

2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts

salt and ground black pepper to taste

1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

4 slices deli Swiss cheese

4 slices deli ham

2 toothpicks

½ cup all-purpose flour

1 cup panko bread crumbs

1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese

cooking spray

Directions

Place a chicken breast on a flat work surface. Slice horizontally through the middle, being careful not to cut all the way through to the other side. Open the 2 sides and spread them out like an open book. Place chicken breast between 2 sheets of heavy plastic on a solid, level surface; lightly pound with the smooth side of a meat mallet to a 1/4-inch thickness. Repeat with remaining chicken breast.

Season each chicken breast with salt and pepper. Spread Dijon mustard on top. Place 1 slice of cheese on each breast. Top each with 2 slices of ham and 1 slice of cheese. Roll

each breast up and secure with a toothpick. Place flour in a shallow bowl. Place egg in a second bowl. Mix panko bread crumbs and grated Parmesan in a third

Preheat an air fryer to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Meanwhile, dredge chicken breasts in flour; shake off excess. Dip into beaten egg, allowing any excess egg to drip back into the bowl. Press into bread crumb mixture to coat both sides; place breaded chicken breasts onto a plate and spray with nonstick spray. Let sit for 5 minutes while the air fryer preheats, then arrange breaded chicken in a single layer

in the air fryer basket. Cook in the preheated air fryer for 10 minutes; flip chicken breasts and spray any dry spots with nonstick spray. Cook until chicken is no longer pink in the center, 8 minutes more. An instant-read thermometer inserted into the center should read at least 165 degrees F (74 degrees C).

Pet owners in the Northeast United States are unfortunately already familiar with Lyme Disease, but there is another vector-borne disease* that is growing in incidence in the area: Heartworm Disease. Whereas Lyme Disease is a bacteria transmitted by ticks, Heartworm Disease is caused by a parasite (Dirofilaria immitis) that is transmitted by mosquitoes. These worms will infect dogs and live in the heart and the blood vessels going from the heart to the lungs. This will cause heart and lung failure and damage other organs such as the liver. Around 1 million dogs in the United States are living with heartworm at any given time, with approximately 100,000 new cases being diagnosed each year. These numbers are likely underrepresented because they only include dogs who were tested for heartworm, meaning the true number is likely greater. While most of the cases occur in the Southeast of the U.S., heartworm positive dogs have been found in all 50 states. In addition to dogs, heartworms can live in cats, ferrets, wolves, coyotes, and fox, making it a growing problem in areas where mosquitoes are not active year round.

The heartworm lifecycle relies

on the mosquito for transmission

– a mosquito will feed on an infected animal and ingest the young worms that are circulating in the blood stream. From there, the young worms will mature somewhat inside the mosquito over the course of 10-14 days, and then will be deposited into a new host when the mosquito bites another animal. Then the worms will travel to the blood vessels in the heart and lungs and continue to mature into adult worms. This whole process takes 6-7 months. Adult heartworms are 6 to 12 inches long and can live for 7 years.

Signs of Heartworm Disease will not occur for at least several months to years after the initial infection, and when signs do occur, it often means the disease is quite advanced. Common signs include lethargy, decreased appetite, labored breathing, coughing, and weight loss. Heavy worm burdens and chronic cases will lead to life threatening conditions such as heart failure and blockage of the blood flow within the heart.

Heartworm Disease can be treated in dogs using several methods and medications. However, the process can be tedious, expensive, and dogs can develop life threatening during treatment. reactions Thankfully, Heartworm Disease is preventable using medication that kills the heartworms before they have a chance

to infect. There are several products effective at preventing Heartworm Disease – most come in oral pills, topical liquid, or injections. These products are safer and less expensive than treating Heartworm Disease. Cats are a different story that will be told in another article. Briefly cats can become infected with heartworms, and it can be life threatening without any outward signs of the disease. Testing is tricky in cats and the infection can often be missed. Also, there is no treatment for Heartworm Disease in cats, making prevention the only way to avoid the disease. While Heartworm Disease in the Northeast U.S. may not be as prevalent when compared to other parts of the country, it is a growing disease with more resident dogs being infected due to the number of heartworm positive wild animals. This means that routine testing and prevention are strongly advised to avoid life

*A vector-borne disease is one in which one living organism transmits a pathogen (i.e. virus, bacteria, parasites) to another living organism. In this article, the mosquito is the vector, transmitting a parasite (heartworms) from one animal to another. This means the disease cannot transmit directly between two animals without the use of the vector.

Winter Weather **Keeping You** Indoors? Can't or don't want Try these indoor games.

All dogs need exercise, even when there is inclement weather or you just don't feel like going out. Try playing some of these indoor games with your dog to keep him healthy and happy. In addition, playing with your dog, just like training him, enhances the bond you share and helps him keep his focus on you!

You can change these depending on how your dog is best motivated: enthusiastic praise, belly rubs, or treats. If you do use treats, one way to keep your dog from gaining weight from too many snacks is to use some of his mealtime kibble to play the games. Think about healthy snacks like a piece of apple or a baby carrot. As with any activity, keep each session short and fun! It's better to end the game before your dog gets bored or overly excited. WHERE'S THE TREAT?

Start with 3 or 4 paper under one of the cups. Then say

WHERE'S THE TREAT? and encourage him to smell the cups — give him lots of praise when he paws, sits beside, or barks next to the correct bucket, and then lift it up so he can claim his reward. In the beginning, you may have to help him understand the game by tapping or tipping the cup to give him a hint. You can increase the difficulty level by changing the placement of the cups after you hide the treat or pretend to put treats under multiple buckets. NAME THAT TOY

Gather a group of toys that are noticeably different (for example, a stuffed duck, a rubber chew toy and a ball). Hold a toy up for your dog to sniff and see, get him excited, and toss it, saying WHERE'S YOUR DUCK? When he comes back with it, give him lots of praise, then do the same with the chew toy, then with the ball, etc. Repeat again and again, and again, and be consistent with your naming and be patient. Once he has mastered a few names, set out multiple toys

and tell him which one to get. FIND IT!

Put your dog in a SIT/ STAY. Show your dog a toy or treat and put it on the floor so the dog can see it. Say FIND IT! Naturally, your dog will enthusiastically, and hopefully, easily, find the toy or treat. Over time make it a bit more difficult by moving it farther away or out of view, perhaps, behind a chair. Continue to vary treat placement, or, for a real challenge, set up a roomful of hidden delights in advance. Watch your dog as he searches, and tap your foot and give an OOH or gasp to get him excited about the ones he's missed.

CLEAN UP! Teach your dog to CLEAN UP after playtime by picking up his toys and putting them back in the toy box. Have

your dog pick up a toy while you hold the toy box up to him. Tell him to DROP IT. When he does, give him lots of praise. Repeat with the next toy. Once he gets

Brenda Brockett explored the role of enslaved people and their descendants in the creation of Hudson Valley gardens. Brenda is a member and former president of the Rhinebeck Garden Club and is co-chair of their plant sale and Program Planning Committee.

She described how some women, kidnapped to be slaves, hid seeds in their hair or clothes, hoping to create gardens and maintain generational continuity.

We have okra as a result. Wealthy white families meanwhile needed labor from enslaved people to create and maintain their European-style gardens -- a social expectations of the time. As a result, skills and seeds brought from Africa blended with European practices to create many of the species we now enjoy.

Very few black gardeners have been recognized for their work on the Hudson Valle's great estates. They include Alexander Gilson, who became head gardener at Montgomery Place and whose contributions are honored by a plaque on the estate. He is known also for the nursery he created and for two entirely new plant varities. James F. Brown, a former runaway slave who started work in 1829 at Mt. Gulian in Beacon, New York, rose to the position of master gardener. Brown kept a diary of his work which gives insight into his contributions.

The club learned about others, including black women, who contributed nationally to horticulture, botany, and gardening. There are also current efforts to involve local communities of color in gardening such as Grow Black Hudson (which can be followed on Instagram and Facebook).

ODVGC members then reviewed plans for the annual May plant sale. A popular event in Red Hook, the plant sale attracts hundreds of locals who rush to arrive for bargains before all the plants sell out. The sale will take place at Memorial Park

(opposite CVS) starting at 9am on May 18. Mark your calendars!!

Consider thinning out your perennials, ground covers, ferns, herbs and small shrubs so you can make a plant sale donation. Linda Lawson, plant sale Chairperson, can be contacted at 845-399-9532 if you have plants to donate- she will give you the location to drop them off, no later than May 3. ODVGC will divide the plants if necessary and pot them. We can will come to your garden and dig out plants but we are very appreciative if you could do this yourself or work with us.

The funds earned from the plant sale go directly back into the community in the form of trees, benches, scholarships, community events and the maintenance of ODVGC's Memorial Garden.

At our next meeting, March 14, Dorian Hyland from the Cornell Cooperative Extension will present a talk on "Gardening in a Changing Climate." We meet at 12:30 pm in St. John's Reformed Church, Upper Red Hook, and look forward to seeing you there! Please check our Facebook page for more details about ODVGC and our activities.

Ways to Achieve Optimal Health





the idea, put the toy box on the floor and guide the dog over to it and say DROP IT. Keep it fun and simple, and use the same words each time for every command.

COME WHEN CALLED

Call your dog to COME, put him in a SIT/STAY, and then move away from him. After a short time, call him to COME again, and repeat. Try to increase the distance you move away and the length of time you wait before calling your dog to you. This game is great for dogs with attentionseeking behaviors, as it teaches them to wait for your commands. CIRCUS CLOWN

If your dog likes to jump, you can burn off a lot of his

energy by teaching him to jump over and through things. Start with your dog on a leash. Place a pole or stick just barely off the ground, and have your dog walk over it. Bookeo.com/StaatsburghSHS Staatsburgh was the autumn home of Ruth Livingston Mills, a prominent figure in New York Society, and her husband, industrialist and philanthropist Ogden Mills. The mansion was redesigned by the famous architect Stanford White in 1895 and decorated in the styles of 17th and 18th century Staatsburgh State Historic France. In this lavish setting, Ruth Livingston Mills hosted parties for the elite of Gilded Age Society. Guests included people





Since its foundation in 1971 by the legendary Crystal Field, Theater For The New City has been considered to be one of New York City's greatest incubators of new talent, showcasing new works by Sam Shepard, Charles Ludlum and many others. The tentative dates for the "Ella The Ungovernable" production June 17th to July 10th, 2024. "Ella The Ungovernable" is a play about 15 year-old Ella Fitzgerald's incarceration at The NY Training School For Girls in Hudson, NY, in 1933.

This will now be the fourth iteration of "Ella The Ungovernable," a play whose ascent has been impacted by the pandemic at each and every step.

The play originally debuted in February, 2020, at The Valatie Community Theatre in Valatie, NY, literally *two weeks* before

the outbreak of the pandemic. A month-long engagement was then planned at the self-same Theater For The New City, only to be quashed by the pandemic. It was then replaced by two, live, Zoom performances with an estimated viewership of 25,000. Finally, in 2022, the play was the recipient of a \$75,000 ARPA grant by the city of Poughkeepsie and was to be performed at the Bardavon, only to be once again thwarted by the pandemic.



The Origins Of The Play Playwright David McDonald

first heard about the story while living in Hudson, NY. "As a resident of Hudson, I had heard rumblings about this story for years, "recalls Mr. McDonald. "However, I always sort of presumed it was only Hudson lore – I mean, if Ella really *had* been incarcerated there, wouldn't the world have known about it?" After doing some digging, however, McDonald found unimpeachable sources for his material. The first was a 1996 article in The NY Times that came out just a few weeks after Ella's death called: "Ward Of The State: The Gap in Ella Fitzgerald's Life" back in 1996. https://www.nytimes. com/1996/06/23/weekinreview/ ward-of-the-state-the-gap-<u>in-ella-fitzgerald-s-life.html</u> The second, "The Ungovernable Ella Fitzgerald," was prepared a group of historians studying the prison system in and around Hudson, NY: <u>h t t p s : / / w w w .</u> prisonpublic memory. <u>org/blog/2014/the-</u> ungovernable-ella-fitzgerald These two articles established the basic facts of what we know today about Fitzgerald's incarceration

That while living in Yonkers, Fitzgerald's mother had died, leaving Ella in the care of her reputedly abusive stepfather;

as a fifteen year-old girl in 1933:

Ella had ended up living on the streets of Harlem, serving as a lookout for a numbers runner for a bordello; She was then snapped up by the police and sent up to Hudson;

She had been incarcerated for almost a year before escaping back to Harlem, and a few weeks later, a friend convinced her to sing at the first-ever Amateur Night at The Apollo Theater in Harlem.

Ella ended up winning.

Bandleader Chick Webb was sitting in the audience, and he basically ended up hiring her on the spot, and she was eventually paroled by the state of New York to the Chick Webb Orchestra. After reading all of this material, McDonald became convinced that the story of Ella Fitzgerald's incarceration was an incredibly powerful double-headed allegory, first, of African American incarceration throughout the centuries, but also for life under Trump. He deliberately wrote the play in an effort to empower and uplift a demoralized public, and particularly to inspire kids with the play's mantra of never giving up. To garner support for the project, he then proceeded to make the following narrative trailer, which has ended up having quite a bit of a life of its own, being accepted into three international film festivals this year and winning best trailer at The Madrid International Short Film Festival. https://www.youtube.com/ watch?v=uoyQg2cIOOE&t=18s In recent months, McDonald has been casting far and wide for his new production of Ella. 




