Within a month the CRM mask project grew to a volunteer group of over 50, producing around 750 masks per week. Volunteers working with CRM have come from all over the Hudson Valley, from as far south as Wappingers to as far north as Coeymans. CRM has provided masks many local organizations to including fire departments, children's homes, assisted living local facilities, restaurants, grocery stores, nursing homes, counseling offices and smaller doctor's offices. In addition to these smaller facilities CRM has given approximately half their



masks to two local hospitals, Vassar Brothers Medical Center and Northern Dutchess Hospital. One of CRM's recent volunteers, Sandi Park, who has been helping to organize business sponsors, shared "It is inspiring to witness the bonding throughout our communities and area businesses with donations and volunteerism toward the common goal of helping to protect our heroes and others in need." As of April 21, CRM had made and distributed over 2600 masks. The workshop series, the second round since the New York State lockdown started, will unfold over six weeks between May 12 and June 30, with one make-up class scheduled for June 23 for writers who have to miss a class. Classes run from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

The back and forth on whether real estate is an "essential service" is perplexing considering the current health risks. People who want to sell generally are not interested in welcoming buyers through their homes at this time. Most who are out these days are not buyers but rather renters primarily from the city attempting to secure short terms rentals. Anyone has a short term (six month) rental out there, let me know.

Where I initially saw potential to fill immediate buyer need while minimizing risk was with vacant listings. With that being said, I have a vacant listing that I believed prime for virtual sale. To best position, I counseled my client to have an inspection by one of the most sought after five start inspectors in the county, which was done. We obtained documentation needed from the Town building department and tax assessors office to enable title to handle the rest virtually. I did an extensive video virtual open house; complete with running all water throughout. The condo is built by Joe Kirchhoff who is known for quality construction. It's a Phase 2 model condo packed with upgrades at The Gardens in Rhinebeck. Priced at \$399,000, for all intents and purposes it should be priced to sell. Professionally decorated with option to purchase with or without furniture. There is opportunity for a cash buyer to close in a week to ten days and move right in yet I have gotten hardly any calls on it. I can't think of a better scenario for a virtual sale which leads to question whether even the vacants are movers amidst this chaos. Mask Making for Our Heroes

Additionally, CRM continues to make masks for children's homes, nursing homes, animal shelters, EMS, fire departments, medical offices and essential workers. 





How Well Do We Handle Uncertainty? By Charlotte Michos, RN,

Interesting that with this virus (COVID-19), many more now understand what a global community means. We are all connected, and we are all in this together. People are in lockdown throughout the world and more alone than ever; but paradoxically we are all grieving, worrying or suffering in some manner – together. According to a recent poll by the Kaiser Family Foundation, 50% of the respondents claim that they are experiencing a negative impact on their mental health due to the coronavirus pandemic. Dealing with the uncertainty of what lies ahead is a major hurdle for most people. There is a continuous flow of information about the medical aspects of this pandemic as it pertains to our physical health, but less is being done to address the psychological impact of a pandemic (https:// www.nytimes.com/2020/04/09/ opinion/sunday/coronavirus-<u>depression-anxiety.htm</u>l). Andrew

Author,

Solomon, who is both a professor of psychology and knows about depression first-hand as a patient, describes four levels of responses that the social isolation and the uncertainty of this crisis have caused: 1. Some people are very stable and are taking this crisis in stridedealing with issues day-by-day. 2. Others might be described as worried and require "psychological first aid." 3. There are those people who are now experiencing clinical symptoms of depression, anxiety, panic, etc. for the first time. 4. Finally people, who already have clinical mental illness, are experiencing exacerbation of their condition (https://www. <u>nytimes.com/2020/04/09/</u> opinion/sunday/coronavirusdepression-anxiety.html) of Prevention psychological problems is key, just as preventative measures are very effective in warding off physical problems. Two major emotional concerns are elements of this pandemic: fear for our lives and the stress of social isolation. A reasonable response that things are not OK and that we have to make adjustments is a healthy response. If your thought process takes you down a path that things will never be OK and each day is increasingly unbearable, than this response considered pathological is and in need of intervention.

During this pandemic, we want to be mindful of our level of emotional responses and seek help accordingly. If you describe your level as #3 or #4, seek professional help. Consider yourself fortunate; there are many others in the "same boat" and in this environment there is less of a stigma attached to mental health conditions than during normal times. Certainly at level #2, you can seek counseling and there are many resources. You can ask your physician for a referral; word-of-mouth may work, or contact The Department of Behavioral and Community Health at 845.486.3400 or <u>healthinfo@dutchessny.gov</u>. For level # 1 and in conjunction with other professional measures for levels #2-4, consider self-help measures. Take advantage of the time and choose daily walks, bike rides, running, or hiking. Try taking ZOOM exercise classes; they are fun. Get creative with ZOOM: there are book clubs (I belong to the Red Hook Library's Book Club), cocktail parties, and all types of meetings and social gatherings. Online concerts, theatre productions, art shows, dance ensembles, comedians, and virtual tours (e.g. The Orchid Show at NY Botanical Garden) provide endless choices. You can get those projects done that you have talked about, do more reading, watch those classic movies you've been meaning to get to, or enjoy your hobbies. Start up new activities: try knitting, learning a new language, cooking or baking, growing a vegetable or herb garden, woodworking, volunteer (safely) and donate to those who are really struggling during the pandemic.

As we wrestle through this pandemic, we are also becoming very aware of time: it is passing differently than ever before. I was surprised with a discovery I made: We, as a society, are now identifying with the disabled. I honestly did not know what "crip time " meant until I did research for this article. "Crip" is defined by Wikipedia as "an inclusive term, representing all disabilities." In referring to "crip time" Margaret Price describes the term as "we (the disabled) live our lives with a flexible approach to normative time frames – like work schedules, deadlines, or even just waking and sleeping." The study/essay by Ellen Samuels is entitled "Six Ways of Looking at Crip Time" and it gives us a window into the world of the disabled as it pertains to time for them (https://dsqsds.org/article/ <u>view/5824/4684</u>). There are many angles to crip time, but one example that we can relate to as we experience what this virus has done to our lives is the uncertainty of our schedule. Maybe what we put on our calendar will happen or maybe it won't. For us, the presence of COVID-19 has resulted in the uncertainty of many of our plans. This is a way of life for the disabled. Take for example a person with disabling cancer: What they put on the calendar is routinely uncertain. Plans and what happens could depend on what their next cancer scan reveals or what changes might happen with their mind or body (Our Pandemic Summer by Edwin Yong, Atlantic 4/14/20). Yong states: "We now have a better understanding of living in a world of shorter increments."

To end on a more hopeful note, there is a local program running at The Starr Library via ZOOM. It is called: "Getting Through This Virus Together" and is presented by Judith Garten, a lecturer, writer and leader of workshops (www. JudithGarten.com). If interested you can email Nan Jackson at njackson@starrlibrary.org for an invitation. It will be running on Wednesdays from 4:00 to 5:00pm for several weeks. We will get through this pandemic; it is just a question of "how." Let's hope this path will lead us to a more positive way to live - together!

ALZHEIMER'S ASSOCIATION OFFERS TIPS FOR **CAREGIVERS IN**

Control and Prevention considers older adults at a higher risk for developing COVID-19. Stay-athome orders like New York State on PAUSE have put caregivers on 24-hour duty, as family and friendskeep a safe, social distance. The problem is larger than most people recognize, Sobel said. According to the Alzheimer's Association 2020 Alzheimer's Disease Facts & Figures report, 70 percent of individuals with Alzheimer's living disease reside at home. "Public health strategies aimed at limiting contact with others are nearly impossible for people living with Alzheimer's and other dementias who rely on family caregivers and others to live their daily lives," Sobel said. "This reality affects these individuals across all settings, including home, adult day services, residential and assisted living facilities and nursing homes.' To help family caregivers navigate the complex COVID-19 environment, the Alzheimer's Association is offering additional guidance to families, including: Help people living with Alzheimer's practice safe hygiene. People living with Alzheimer's and other dementias may forget to wash their hands or follow other precautions ensure safe hygiene. to Caregivers are encouraged to be extra vigilant in helping individuals practice safe hygiene. Play gatekeeper with outside caregivers and guests. The majority of individuals living with Alzheimer's and other dementias are over 65, putting them at the highest risk for complications from COVID-19. This is especially true if a person living with dementia has other chronic conditions of the heart and lungs or diabetes. It's critical that family caregivers carefully monitor who is coming into the home and to ensure all who enter are healthy. Monitor sudden or sustained changes in behavior. People living with Alzheimer's and other dementias may not be able to communicate if they are feeling bad and showing early symptoms of illness. It is important that caregivers monitor family members closely and respond quickly to any signs of distress, discomfort, or increased confusion. These signs do not necessarily indicate a serious condition like COVID-19, but it's important that caregivers be diligent in investigating what is causing any sudden or sustained change in behavior. Even when and all other dementia - by people living with Alzheimer's cannot communicate verbally, their actions may sending а message. be Be calm and create a nurturing environment. The current

added anxiety for everyone. Do your best to remain calm, particularly in your interactions with family members living with dementia. Often these individuals will take their cues from the people who surround them. Creating a calm environment will help individuals living with dementia feel safe and protected. Anticipate and prepare that current care and support options may change. As public health containment strategies for COVID-19 escalate during the next several weeks, it is important for families to anticipate that less help and support may be available. It is also important to discuss alternative plans for care management if the primary caregiver should become sick. Many primary caregivers are not good about asking for help even as care responsibilities escalate. It's important for family members and friends to be proactive during the current crisis in asking caregivers how they can help. Ask residential care facilities about its communication policies. In order to protect the health of their residents, many facilities are restricting access to outside visitors, so it's important to ask how you can get updates on your family member's health and how you can communicate with loved ones during the current crisis. Ask to see if phone calls, video chats or even emails will be offered and how best to coordinate. If your family member is unable to engage in calls or video chats, ask the facility how you can keep in touch with facility staff in order to get updates. Keep prescriptions filled. Caregivers may also want to ask their pharmacist or doctor about filling prescriptions for a greater number of days to reduce trips to the pharmacy. Leptospirosis

With warmer weather on the way, we are spending more time outside, and so are our pets. We know the dangers that fleas, ticks and mosquitoes bring, but it is important to discuss another danger: leptospirosis (often shortened to "lepto"). Leptospirosis is caused by bacteria called Leptospira. These organisms live in stagnant or slow moving water. Our pets can become infected by drinking contaminated water, having the bacteria enter open wounds, or from exposure to urine and tissue of other infected animals. Lepto can be found in rats, mice, raccoons, skunks, cows, pigs, and horses, as well as other dogs. Cats, thankfully, are more resistant to infections. Peak incidence of infection in dogs occurs between July and November and often after periods of rain or flooding.

The bacteria can damage several organs, but mainly targets the liver and kidneys, leading to the failure of these organs. This often results in poor appetite, vomiting, and diarrhea. Drinking and urination can be either increased or decreased. Some dogs can experience muscle stiffness, shock, and neurologic signs. Lab work generally reveals increased liver and kidney values, and there are specific tests to detect the bacteria and antibodies to these proteins in the blood. Thankfully, this disease is often quite responsive to antibiotic therapy and survival rates are reported between 80-90%. However, infected dogs typically require hospitalization and isolation from other animals. measures Preventative can be taken to reduce the risk of infection. Controlling rodent populations, limiting exposure to wildlife, removing stagnant

water and vaccinating dogs can help. It is important to know that Leptospirosis is a zoonotic disease, meaning humans can be infected. People working in animal care, farming and sewer/ septic care are at an increased risk, as are people who enjoy swimming, boating and hunting. The warmer weather brings many activities that we can enjoy, but we have to be aware of the risks that can occur. If you are concerned about leptospirosis or are considering the vaccination for your dog, please make an appointment to see your veterinarian.

WORKING FROM HOME WITH YOUR DOG

Presented by Barbara Sweeney Fassett and Bark Busters Home Dog Training Dutchess County Its April 2020 and for most of us, Covid-19 has invaded our lives and disrupted our normal daily routine. For many of you, that means your children are home from school trying to keep up with schoolwork remotely. For most of us, Covid-19 has caused our social, recreational and faithbased activities to be suspended. For many, working from home has become our new normal, at least for the foreseeable future. So how does all of this lifestyle disruption affect our dogs?

Some dogs ease into changing scenarios and are able to be with their families throughout the day without exhibiting behavioral issues. For others, however, there are a number of problems that may arise, such as dogs that demand attention by barking or whining, often at the worst possible times.

WHY DO SOME DOGS ACT UP? Because of the large amount of time spent together in close proximity, oftentimes dogs have increased opportunities to train their families! They might nudge to be petted or climb into a family member's lap without being invited. They often nap under the table or desk where people are working and when they wake up, they demand attention and usually get it.

While some see this as cute and innocent, whenever a dog gets to you such as a toy, a bully stick or food delivery puzzle such as the Bark Busters "Game Changer" or the traditional Kong.

Do NOT go to your dog's space if you hear any barking, whining or pacing. Only return when your dog is calm and quiet. If you return when he's acting out of stress, he will learn that making a fuss is rewarded with your attention.

Practice obedience when you do return. Training your dog engages his brain. This will tire him out and help him become calmer. Ask him to SIT and STAY before you pet him or toss a toy.

Be proactive in asking for your dog's attention and focus. Always begin play on your terms. If he brings you a certain toy for play, take control of the toy and wait until later to bring it up yourself and initiate play. Then engage him on your terms, not the dog's. Work on establishing set times for interactions. If you went off to work without your dog, you

would only have certain times when you could interact with him. Continue that strategy. For example, take a 10 - 15 minute break mid-morning and again in the afternoon or a half hour at lunchtime to interact with your dog. Do what works for you and also meet your dog's physical and mental needs. It's important that you don't continuously stop what you're doing and interact with your dog. If your dog nudges your arm while you are sitting at your desk, don't stop what you are doing, simply move your arm out of his reach and continue what you are working on. Don't even make eye contact with him. He will quickly get used to the cues you give that indicate you are taking a break to play with him and will settle down quicker during the in between times. What we all are facing these days is stressful for us. Dogs prefer consistency and predictability any changes in routine can be distressing for them. Be patient,

direct the behavior of a human, the dog sees itself as being put in a leadership role. As the leader, the dog may feel he needs to demand his owner's attention, often at inopportune times, such as when people are distracted, on the phone or involved in a project. WHAT YOU CAN DO Separate your workspace from your dog's space. People should work in a room separate from the

dog. It's important that the work area be off-limits. That may require that the dog sometimes be confined to another room, separated by a gate or crated for a while so that the dog does not have access to humans 24/7. When the current crisis is over it will be easier for your dog to get back to normal. Give the dog something interesting to do while he is separated from

As the climate changes, rough weather—tornadoes, hailstorms and the like—that used to trouble single areas of the country now occur in places that never expected to see them. **The Problem**

Consider these statistics: • Rain: Over the last 50 years, much of the United States has seen increases in downpours, reports the National Climate Assessment Federal Advisory Committee. 1. Look out for your windows and doors. Get storm windows and consider storm shutters. 2. Check for cracks. 




