

Stamp Issuance Planned at Hall of Fame

The National Cowboy Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center will become a U.S. Post Office for a few hours Oct. 9 when a commemorative postage stamp honoring Frederic Remington, American illustrator and sculptor, is issued.

The 1981, 18-cent stamp features Remington's bronze sculpture "Coming Through the Rye." On the first day of issue, a large replica of the sculpture by Jane and Franco Vianello will be installed at the Cowboy Hall of Fame.

The stamp shows the sculpture in a bronze shade against a white background with light green lettering.

Speaker for the dedication ceremonies, which will be-

gin at 11 a.m., will be M.A. Wright, former chairman of the board of governors of the U.S. Postal Service.

Guests for the ceremony will include Gov. George Nigh; Iron Eyes Cody, a motion picture actor; and Paul Calle of Stamford, Conn., who created the Remington stamp design.

Remington, who was born in Canton, N.Y., in 1861, studied at the Yale Art School. After two years there, he struck out on his own to make sketches and spent much of his time in the American West.

The subject matter for which he is best known includes Indians, cowboys, soldiers, horses and scenes of life on the plains.
