

The Shema

'Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all you heart, and with all you soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' MINISTRY OF THE WORD

A reading from the book of Genesis chapter 22 verse 1 to chapter 14

After these things God tested Abraham. He said to him, "Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains that I shall show you." So Abraham rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him, and his son Isaac; he cut the wood for the burnt offering, and set out and went to the place in the distance that God had shown him. On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place far

away. Then Abraham said to his young men, "Stay here with the donkey; the boy and I will go over there; we will worship, and then we will come back to you." Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering and laid it on his son Isaac, and he himself carried the fire and the knife. So the two of them walked on together. Isaac said to his father Abraham, "Father!" And he said, "Here I am, my son." He said, "The fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" Abraham said, "God himself will provide the lamb for a burnt offering, my son." So the two of them walked on together.

When they came to the place that God had shown him, Abraham built an altar there and laid the wood in order. He bound his son Isaac, and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to kill his son. But the angel of the LORD called to him from heaven, and said, "Abraham, Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him; for now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me." And Abraham looked up and saw a ram, caught in a thicket by its horns. Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt offering instead of his son. So Abraham called that place "The LORD will provide"; as it is said to this day, "On the mount of the LORD it shall be provided."

Psalm 13

How long, O Lord, will you so utterly forget me: how long will you hide your face from me?

How long must I suffer anguish in my soul, and be so grieved in my heart day and night: how long shall my enemy triumph over me?

Look upon me, O Lord my God, and answer me: lighten my eyes, lest I sleep in death;

Lest my enemy say 'I have prevailed': lest my foes exult at my overthrow.

Yet I put my trust in your unfailing love:

O let my heart rejoice in your salvation.

And I will make my song to the Lord: because he deals so bountifully with me.

A reading from Paul's letter to the Romans chapter 6 verses 12 to 23

Therefore, do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.

When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Merciful God, we thank you for these gifts of your creation, this bread and wine, and we pray that by your Word and Holy Spirit, we who eat and drink them may be partakers of Christ's body and blood. On the night he was betrayed Jesus took bread; and when he had given you thanks he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, 'Take, eat. This is my body given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.'

After supper, he took the cup, and again giving you thanks he gave it to his disciples, saying, 'Drink from this, all of you.

This is my blood of the new covenant shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.'

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Therefore we do as our Saviour has commanded: proclaiming his offering of himself made once for all upon the cross, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming again, we celebrate, with this bread and this cup, his one perfect and sufficient sacrifice for the sins of the whole world.

Renew us by your Holy Spirit, unite us in the body of your Son, and bring us with all your people into the joy of your eternal kingdom; through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, we worship you, Father, in songs of never-ending praise:

Blessing and honour and glory and power are yours for ever and ever. Amen.

With our hearts set on the kingdom and our hands open to serve,

we pray as Jesus taught us...

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power,
and the glory are yours,
now and forever. Amen

***some thoughts from Rev. Mel

This week has seen another change in our restrictions to do with COVID19. Unfortunately more outbreaks have occurred and the rules have had to be adjusted to suit.

I know this is frustrating and painful for many of you, particularly in regards to being able to come to church. It is painful for me too, not being able to celebrate in person with you each week and not knowing the best ways to keep us together. These are afterall unprecedented times for us and we're all just going along as best we can.

I hope that you will be encouraged, as I was, by Bishop Matt's words that he sent to the clergy of the Diocese this week:

I imagine that having restrictions imposed before the announced relaxations even took place will be disheartening for many. May I encourage you to do two things in the midst of this disappointment and frustration:

1. Be a people of thanksgiving and praise – We worship and serve a God who cannot be thwarted. This means that even through disappointment and trial Job could say "Blessed be the name of the Lord." Our desire to participate in godly, gathered fellowship is fantastic, but it is not

ultimate – the persons and work of our God is! And for this we can give humble and hearty thanks.

2. Be a people of prayer and supplication — In working through my own frustration at having to write this to you I remembered Daniel Andrews and the Medical Officers of Victoria, and all those who work alongside them. How difficult and frustrating it must be to have to make decision after decision knowing that each one will impact many in different and diverse ways. Let us be people who pray for our leaders; that they have energy and wisdom for each new day, good information and clarity of insight as they face challenge after challenge, and hearts that seek what is good for the people they lead and serve...and encouragement from us that their effort is not in vain.
