Some areas in five Metro Manila cities and Cavite province will experience water service interruptions next week, Maynilad announced Monday.

The service provider said it will conduct pipeline realignment activities between 11:00 a.m. and 11:59 p.m. on Oct. 25 to 28 that will affect parts of Las Piñas,

Makati, Manila, Parañaque, Pasay, and Cavite.

This in line with the flood control initiative of the Public Works and Highways Department. The project, which aims to mitigate flooding in the capital region, involves the installation of a drainage line along Cristob-

Eleazar lauds successful anti-drugs op in Cavite

Philippine National Police (PNP) chief Gen. Guillermo Eleazar on Sunday lauded various anti-illegal drugs units for their successful buy-bust operation which resulted in the confiscation of PHP1.656 billion worth of shabu in Dasmariñas City, Cavite.

"The operation prevented the illegal drugs from being used especially by the youth," he said, citing the proper coordination between the police, Philippine Drug Enforcement Agency (PDEA), the National Intelligence Coordinating Agency (NICA), the Bureau of Customs (BOC), and the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP). The buy-bust operation conducted on Saturday in a parking lot in Barangay Salitran 2 along Aguinaldo Highway also resulted in the arrest of Wilfredo Blanco and Megan Lemon Pedroro,



both residents of Montalban, Rizal. Seized were 240 kilos of shabu and the van reportedly being used by the suspects in the transportation of the illegal drugs. The operation in Dasmariñas City was

part of the series of anti-drug operations that started with the confiscation of some PHP3.4 billion worth of shabu in Zambales and over PHP1 billion worth of shabu in follow-up operations in Bataan and Cavite. The three other operations conducted last month were based on coordination among the PNP, BOC, NICA, and the AFP with the PDEA as the lead agency. (PNA)

Tagaytay City regulates observance of 'Undas' 2021



TRECE MARTIRES CITY, Cavite (PIA) – The city government of Tagaytay approved Executive Order No. 393 S. 2021 that sets guidelines for the observance of this year's 'Undas' in the cemeteries within the city.

The order calls for the temporary closing of all public and private cemeteries in the City from October 30 – November 3, 2021.

It also urges city residents to visit their family and relatives' grave sites on dates prior or after indicated dates.

Only up to 200 persons would be allowed inside the cemeteries at any given time with only up to an hour's visit to offer flowers, candles and prayers.

It also strictly prohibits selling of food and beverages inside the cemetery.

The strict implementation of this order is assigned to the Tagaytay Office of Public Safety (TOPS), local PNP, and barangay officials with the directive to conduct inspection at the cemetery entrance, as well as number cueing to properly monitor the number of persons going inside the cemetery.

Designated roving personnel will ensure that the minimum public health standards are followed inside the cemeteries. This is the second year that the annual tradition of remembering our dearly departed loved ones is observed under quar antine restrictions due to the ongoing CoViD-19 pandemic. – Ruel Francisco, PIA Cavite

"Dito papasok 'yung programa na Pantawid Pasada kung saan pinopondohan muna ng gobyerno para ma-absorb 'yung pagtaas ng presyo ng petrolyo (This is where the Pantawid Pasada program comes in, where the government can subsidize to cushion the oil price increases)," the reelectionist senator said.

Likewise, Gatchalian called on the Department of Energy (DOE) to monitor

the compliance of oil companies on their inventory requirements to ensure adequate supply and help mitigate further price increases in the coming months.

The senator noted key players, particularly Chevront Philippines Inc., PTT Philippines, Seaoil Philippines, PetroGazz, Unioil Petroleum Philippines, and Cleanfuel have imposed as much as P1.50- per liter for diesel, P1.45 per liter for kerosene, and P1.30 per liter for gasoline effective Tuesday, Oct.12. The Senate Energy Committee chair pointed out

there is a potential average increase of P1,422.50 in the monthly expense of jeepneys for gasoline and a potential average increase of P598.36 for diesel.

The senator said that to cover for the 3-month subsidy of the estimated 178,244 valid franchise holders of public utility jeepneys (PUJs) nationwide, the government would have to shell out at least P914.160-million.

"Inaasahan nating tuloy-tuloy pa ang pagtaas ng presyo ng langis sa pandaigdigang merkado hanggang sa katapusan ng taon (So we expect the price of oil to continually increase in the world market until the end of the year)," Gatchalian said.

a conduit in the sale of a fake court decision for PHP10 million. The SC found retired CA Records Officer II Imelda Posadas guilty of multiple counts of conduct prejudicial to the best interest of the service and of violating graft laws, according to a decision published online on Thurs-

The case started in 2013 when lawyer Ramel Aguinaldo sought the assistance of Dr. Virgilio Rodil for a "contact" in the SC who could help in the pending drugs case of his client, Marco Ale-

Rodil, a physician at St. Michael Medical Hospital in Bacoor, Cavite, sought the aid of Posadas who was his

Posadas' 45 years of service "cannot mitigate the effects of her reprehensible conduct", the SC said.

"On the contrary, her long years of service should be considered as an aggravating circumstance since it facilitated the commission of the offense, i.e., use of her connections in the Supreme Court due to her familiarity with the system and other

employees in the judiciary," the court said in its resolu-

Posadas' dealing began when she contacted her fellow records officer, Samuel Ancheta, who informed them that the case has been raffled off to then-Associate Justice Martin VIllarama Jr. and that Andrew Corro, one of the court lawyers, agreed to review the case.

Ancheta and Posadas acted as conduits for Rodil and Corro, with the PHP10 million handed in four tranches starting on April 22,

The first two payments of PHP800,000 for the initial reading and PHP700,000 for review of the case were handed by Rodil to Posadas and Ancheta in April and August

Corro received the final two payments, also from Rodil -- PHP5 million on Dec. 13, 2013 for the advanced copy of the draft decision of the acquittal and PHP3.5 million on Feb. 21, 2014 for a copy of the acquittal decision bearing the SC

After some time, Rodil

called Posadas to notify her that the advanced copy of the decision, which Corro released, was fake and they could no longer locate the lawyer. Rodil then initiated administrative cases against Corro, Posadas, and Ancheta. Corro has been disbarred, Ancheta was dismissed from service in February 2020, and Posadas was forced to retire in 2019.

The court dismissed Posadas' claim that she was merely motivated by a sincere desire to help Rodil and that she did not receive any amount or consideration during the transactions.

"The circumstances clearly showed that she had an indispensable involvement in the dealings. If only Posadas did not entertain Dr. Rodil's request to look for a contact in the first place, the transactions could not have materialized," the SC said. "Without her participation, Dr. Rodil could not have easily formed a linkage with Ancheta and Atty. Corro, which in turn could have prevented the case-fixing from happening." (PNA)

al St. in Sampaloc, Manila. Maynilad said realignment activities for the seven-foot water pipeline are expected to take about 85 hours or nearly four days to finish.

"[We] will also take the opportunity to conduct other smaller, parallel activities, including leak repairs in other areas and maintenance works in several pumping stations, which would otherwise require the implementation of separate service disruptions," it added. Affected households are advised to store water for the duration of the interruption, although Maynilad assured it is ready to deliver supply to those af-

For this year's festival, Natividad joined a panel discussion with other senior management of Asian companies, where she discussed the challenges of diversity and inclusion in the Philippines and the steps the Aboitiz Group has been taking to actively embed practices that support diversity and inclusion in the work-

Natividad highlighted the progress of the Philippines in terms of workplace gender equality, citing the Philippine Business Coalition for Women Empowerment (PBCWE)'s notes on the country being consistently ranked as among the top 10 countries in the world for gender equality and inclusivity. However, Natividad cautions against complacency brought about by rankings without adequate practical application. But the reality is, more companies need to be encouraged to really embed workplace gender equality and diversity and inclusion into their corporate sustainability and business strategies, as this will yield quantifiable and positive results in terms of attracting and sustaining the best talent in the market," Natividad explained.

To support its employees as an ally in diversity and inclusion, the Aboitiz Group has rolled out changes and improvements in employee engagement programs, working schedules, compensation and benefits; shifting to virtual means for, and investing heavily in learning and development programs; and understanding multi-generational diversity and workplace gender equality through the Group's RE-MIX program.

He said the project sites ipalities in Region IV-A" is are located in General Trias, Cavite and in Angono, Rizal.



"May bagong gamot po sa Covid, baka makakuha na kayo - Molnupiravir, life-saving. Um-order na kayo, maganda po ito," sabi ni Ong sa One Batangas-IM Pilipinas convention sa Lipa, Batangas. Ang antiviral pill na Molnupiravir na ginawa ng pharmaceutical giant na Merck ang tinutukoy ni Ong. Batay sa interim analysis ng kumpanya, pinababa ng Molnupiravir ang risk ng hospitalization at pagkamatay sa ilang pasyente nang 50%.

Nag-hain na ng Emergency Use Authorization sa United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) ang kumpanya. Dagdag pa ni Ong na isa ring cardiologist at internist, bahagi ang pagkuha ng pinakamagandang klase ng bakuna para maka-bangon ang ekonomiya ng bansa. "Papaano tayo magta-trabaho, kulang ang bakuna natin. Papaano papasok sa school ang mga anak natin, hindi pa bakunado, 12-17 years old. Hindi po aandar ang economy pag hindi po natin pipiliin yang pinakamagandang bakuna, pinakamagandang gamot," giit nya.

PCOO regularizes long time casual employees



In line with the celebration of the 11th Anniversary of the Presidential Communications Operations Office (PCOO), the agency hired additional 32 regular employees and regularized 15 personnel, who have been working as casual and contractual workers in the PCOO for over 10 years.

Since the start of the leadership of PCOO Secretary Jose Ruperto Martin Andanar in 2016, the PCOO has started regularizing employees who had been with the PCOO for five years or longer, and have been in short-term renewable contracts that denied them the security, opportunities and benefits of full-time regular employees. PCOO Secretary Andanar led the oath taking ceremony and signing of the appointment papers of the newly regularized personnel on Monday, 18 October 2021, at the Times Plaza Building, Manila, the new office of the PCOO.

Among the 15 employees regularized were drivers who have been hired as contractuals for years. Aside from the security of tenure, the said personnel will receive benefits, a year-end bonus, a performance-based bonus, incentives, and allowances.

As part of PCOO's ongoing efforts in regularizing its contract of service (COS) personnel, the agency has requested additional plantilla positions from the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) for its employees. The COS employees have also undergone Civil Service Examination (CSE) last July to qualify for the plantilla

The PCOO urged the regularization of its deserving and hardworking employees, in order to ensure job security especially now that the country is being challenged by the global health crisis, as well as to motivate its employees to become more productive civil servants. This year, the DBM has granted the PCOO around 27 plantilla positions but the agency is working on increasing this number in order to regularize more of its employees.
