#### GROTON'S MAIN STREET: BRIDGING THE GENERATIONS By Lee Shurtleff '83, Village Historian

As alumni traverse Main Street this August, they will notice signs of rejuvenation to this iconic thoroughfare.

After many years of planning, a new municipal building and fire station opened last August at the site of the former Dates and Walters Chevrolet-Oldsmobile dealerships. Late last summer, Chris Clare Brennan (Class of 1970) assumed ownership of the Groton Hotel, embarking on a bottom-to-top renovation of the landmark structure. Others have begun to rehabilitate and enhance various homes, business sites, and pathways at points both in between and nearby.

Further supporting these local efforts is a \$4.5 million 2024 "New York Forward" grant to the Village, which has been designed to assist and enhance such downtown revitalization.

Various generations will remember our downtown in differing ways. Commerce, industry, education, and community have influenced and defined these places throughout Groton's 230 years of post-Revolutionary history. Our first settler, John Perrin, built a cabin and tavern on the Hotel site in 1797, leading to the current structure's rise in 1858. Also in 1858, the (now) American Legion home was built to house a village school, where the institution remained until 1872 when it was moved to the former Groton Academy on the hill bordering Church Street.

Throughout the 1860s and 1870s, the Perrigo brothers expanded their iron works and foundries on the very grounds where the municipal building now resides. They laid the physical and inspirational foundations of the Groton Bridge Company, whose iron truss bridges were manufactured thereon and sent for assembly throughout the Western Hemisphere.

Construction of the South Central Railroad through the very center of the community in 1870 provided Groton's enterprises and agricultural endeavors with a gateway to worldwide markets, spurring enormous growth and nurturing local innovation.

Although the railroad was essentially conceived to move coal from the Lehigh Valley to awaiting barges at Fair Haven, for further shipment across the Great Lakes, the emptied cars returned to the Groton railroad station to reload with lumber, eggs & farm commodities, bridge components, iron agriculture implements, horse drawn carriages & buggies, steam engines & road rollers, and, most substantially, typewriters.

While those who inhabit the old brick blocks, wood frame buildings and grand old homes that line our main corridors are ever changing, the histories encompassed within these structures will perpetually testify to the pride and industriousness of those whose own beginnings linger here. We hope you will return to these foundations to see the community as we progress.


#### **Red Hawk Happenings**
















The Groton Historical Association will be open on Friday afternoon, 8/1, from 3 pm to 6 pm and Saturday, 8/2, from 9 to 11 am.
