President's Corner

I said it in the last President's Corner that our neighborhood is full of caring neighbors who work hard to make their community continue be one of Knoxville's best places to live.

Here's the proof.

Whether it is decking the gazebo with holiday lights or challenging land development that harms our neighbors and our neighborhood, you have stepped up to lend a hand.

As many of you may know, a Nashville developer who has owned the 4-acre lot with the two-story, 100-year-old farmhouse at the corner of Gallaher

View and Middlebrook has plans to build 32 townhouses on the property.

Since plans were first introduced, neighbors and this association have challenged the plans for a number of reasons including extreme density, traffic at Gallaher View entrance, and loss of privacy for adjacent neighbors.

We have worked together to challenge the project before the Planning Commission, City Council, and on January 20 will be appealing the lot width variance.

WHCA and neighbors have met with the developer on several occasions to discuss reduc-

ing the number of units or even an alternative plan and find a reasonable compromise that works for both parties.

We will continue to do so until all options are exhausted.

This isn't the only thing happening in West Hills. Before we know it spring will be here and with it comes the West Hills/Dogwood Arts Spring Celebration on April 18th. Plans have been underway since this past fall.

WHCA has teams focused on several points of interest impacting our daily life in West Hills: beautification, communications, code awareness, events/park, finance, health, traffic, and zoning.



Snow & Ice Removal

When inclement weather hits the Knoxville area, the city's Public Service Department responds by following a priority-based plan. Upon receiving a firm prediction of 2 or more inches of snow, the Snow Coordinator will alert all managers to mount plows. The decision to begin using the plows will be made based on the temperature, the rate of snow accumulation, street conditions and a discussion among managers in the field.

Traffic Sign / Signal Problem

Call 3-1-1 or 865-215-4311 to report traffic sign /signal issues. The City's Transportation Engineering Division handles the installation of traffic signals within the City.

Its Traffic Operations group also takes requests from the public concerning traffic safety. Typical issues are run-off-road vehicles, recent traffic accidents, concerns about certain roadway hazards, and visibility concerns.

DIY Hot Cocoa Mix

Ingredients

1 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
 2 cups powdered sugar
 2 ½ cups powdered milk*, dairy or non-dairy milk
 1 teaspoon salt
 2 teaspoons cornstarch, optional

Instructions

Make the mix:

Combine all the ingredients in a large bowl or food processor and mix well.

Store in an airtight container or single-serving zip bags (placing ½ cup per serving).

For serving:

Put ½ cup of the mix into a mug and fill to 1 cup with hot water. Mix well.

Notes

If you prefer using fresh milk, leave the powdered milk out of the mix. Add 3 tablespoons of the powdered mixture to the mug and fill to 1 cup with hot milk.

Recipe for Hot Meal on a Cold Day Crockpot Chili for Chilly Weather

INGREDIENTS

1 lb of ground beef
Salt, pepper, garlic powder
1 chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped jalapeños or green chili
1 TBSP minced garlic
2 TBSP chili powder
1 TBSP paprika
1/2 tsp each of salt and pepper
1 tsp onion powder
1/2 tsp cumin

2 15.5 oz cans of chili beans (You can use regular or hot chili beans)
1 14.5 oz can of diced tomatoes
1 6 oz can of tomato paste
1 can of water (I like filling up one of the empty chili bean cans)

INSTRUCTIONS

Brown ground beef and onion in a skillet over medium high heat. Season with a little bit of salt, pepper, and garlic powder. I don't use exact measurements for this part.

Drain any grease from the ground beef.

Add ground beef, minced garlic, jalapenos, both cans of chili beans, diced tomatoes, and tomato paste.

Add 2 TBSP chili powder, 1 TBSP paprika, 1/2 tsp each of salt and pepper, 1 tsp onion powder, 1/2 tsp cumin.

Fill up one of the empty cans from the chili beans with water and add that to the crockpot.

Stir well and let cook on low for 6-8 hours.

Enjoy with cornbread, tortilla chips or crackers.

West Hills History: 1973

In the fall of 1973, the West Hills Plan was completed and printed for distribution to City Council members. New WHCA officers were elected as well — Bob Smith as president, and Harry Avery, Barbara Pelot, and Eileen Klebenow as vice president, secretary, and treasurer, respectively.

Also that year, zoning issues were omnipresent. The association successfully opposed a planned rezoning of land along Middlebrook Pike at Broome Road, which was inconsistent with the West Hills Plan.

Another hot-button issue for the community at that time was traffic, particularly cut-through traffic. The association believed that this could be reduced by creating effective alternate routes. As a result, community leaders

pressed for a connector to be built from Weisgarber to Merchants Roads; which, unfortunately was never built. However, after many years, renewed efforts to establish a connector between Middlebrook and Kingston Pikes near Walker Springs were successful, and reduced cut-through traffic as originally predicted.

And traffic concerns rivaled zoning issues for the "warmth" they engendered among residents. Vanosdale Road was seen by residents as the link between communities to the north, and I-40/75 and West Town Mall to the south, and most accepted that the widening of Vanosdale was becoming necessary due to the increasing volume of traffic. Unfortunately, no acceptable design plan was forthcoming, and the discussion continued for the next 35 years. An alternate plan to continue

Wesley Road to Middlebrook Pike was never fully supported, and the very discussion of such a possibility divided the community, benefiting no one. A viable route from Kingston Pike to Middlebrook remains a goal. However, West Hills is no closer to an answer, despite the fact that traffic volume between these areas has increased significantly.

West Hills History: 1974

In 1974, a West Hills resident proposed a novel concept for that time — a plan for the creation of a bike trail. Joe Prochaska proposed a route that would stretch from Concord to Third Creek. No action was immediately forthcoming, but West Hills likes to think that the seed was planted then for what would eventually

ally be the Greenway.

The boundaries of West Hills were also defined at this time, and Caesar Stair was retained as counsel to represent the community, and to support Council action on the West Hills Plan.

The eastern boundary was set at the new Weisgarber Road because the community was concerned about development in the land between new and old Weisgarber Roads.

The hope was to support development, which would limit the number of curb cuts along Middlebrook Pike. The community was committed to doing everything it could to prevent the creation of another Kingston Pike on Middlebrook.

The widening of Middlebrook was already in MPC's plans, and multiple driveways and entrance points were seen as defeating the purpose of a widened Middlebrook,

which could become a viable alternative route for travel east and west.

In April 1974, a newly accepted plan closed West Hills Road just south of Gainesborough. In this manner, cut-through traffic from the apartments on Traditional was eliminated.

At the April General Meeting, Charles Burchett reported that the community might have to become involved again in the construction of the new Bearden Junior High, since a problem had developed in acquiring the necessary land. This would turn out to be

just the first of a series of problems concerning construction of this needed school.


