Meet. Hear. Vote.

For the first time in WHCA's long history, we will host a special event to bring the two candidates for the 2nd District City Council seat to meet West Hills neighbors. We've also invited our neighbors who live in other parts of the same city council district.

Both Melody Watts and Nathan Honeycutt are looking forward to having a conversation with their potential constituents.

We are hosting this event to give you and our neighbors a chance to question the candidates on topics that matter to you. We want you and the candidates to have an honest, civil conversation about the issues. Candidates are asked to avoid stump speeches. Neighbors are asked to have focused questions related to local issues.

A one-hour conversation with the candidates

The format is simple. This is a one-hour conversation with the candidates. Following a brief welcome by WHCA, our moderator,—Newstalk 98.7 on-air personality, Bob

Thomas—will start the evening by introducing each candidate.

The candidates will each be given 5 minutes for opening remarks. Then Bob will ask both candidates the top three questions submitted earlier by neighborhoods across the 2nd District. Each candidate will have up to 2 minutes to respond to the questions.

Following the three neighborhood questions, the audience is invited to ask the candidates to respond to their questions. The same time limit will be up to two minutes for each candidate's response.

A follow-up question to clarify a candidate's earlier response will be allowed. Each candidate's response will be limited to 1 minute.

Bring an open mind, your curiosity, and your questions on any of the many challenges and issues of concern to you and other Knoxvillians.

Some things to think about

This is the first election since new legislation changed the way city council representatives are elected. Gone are (continued next page)



the days when voters across the city cast votes for every district rep. Now voters may only vote for a single candidate in the district where they live. So in this election, we can only vote for either Watts or Honeycutt.

In this new reality and with the city on the verge of irreversible change brought on by unbridled growth spurred by short-sighted political decisions, knowing who may be our next district representative and understanding their perspective on critical issues, it is more important than ever to become well informed before committing to one candidate or the other.

Is this representational government?!

- The population of the city of Knoxville is just under **200,000 people**.
- Only 1 in 5 of just under 100,000 eligible Knoxville voters voted
- There were **3,000 fewer votes** in 2023 than there are registered voters in **our district**.
- Mayor Kincannon was elected in 2023's primary with only 9,429 votes—less than 10% of eligible voters! She was elected because according to city law, if a candidate for mayor receives more than 50% of the votes cast in the primary election that candidate is declared the winner of the mayor's office.
- A total of **16,394** voted in the 2023 primary—**16.8%** of all eligible voters.
- Prior to the 2023 election another example of low voter turnout is our current rep on city council. Andrew
 Roberto, was elected in 2021 with 7,142 votes out of a city-wide base of almost 100,000 eligible voters.

2025 2nd District Primary Vote—only 10% of eligible voters voted!

- As of July 17, 2025 there are **97,382** active registered voters in Knoxville.
- There are **20,060** registered voters in our district.
- 20.6% of Knoxville's registered voters live in our district.
- Only 1,954 people voted in the 2nd District.
- 20,060 of us are eligible to vote.
- Only 10% of us voted in the primary.

Please Do Your Part for Our Local Governance.

Meet the candidates on September 29th. Vote early (October 15-30) or vote on election day (November 4th). Whatever works, just vote.

For the good of our neighborhood and our city, thanks in advance for doing your part of **our local governance**.

Developer Plans 32 Townhouses on Gallaher View Property

Mainland, a Nashvillebased development company and owner of the old Walker family home at the corner of Gallaher View Road and Middlebrook Pike, is petitioning three local agencies to get approval to build 32 townhouses at that location.

Neighbors close to the site and the WHCA oppose the plan's scale, the traffic hazard created with sole access located at Gallaher View, and the inconsistency with existing single-family homes surrounding the site.

Local government agencies involved in the review process are Planning Commission, Board of Zoning Appeals, and City Council.

WHCA and neighbors have expressed our opposition to both the developer and the above agencies.

At the time of this publication the developer has requested postponement of scheduled hearings and is planning to meet with neighbors and WHCA to exchange of ideas, hear concerns, and seek a positive resolution.

KUB Trimming Trees in Power Line Easement

To prevent damage to power lines, especially in storms and heavy weather, KUB is doing normal maintenance of tree growth within the utility's easement.

If you are concerned about how your trees may be affected, please call **KUB Vegetation Management** at **865-558-6658** as soon as you can after receiving notice of the pruning work on your property.

Early conversations between you and KUB can avoid problems down the road.

If KUB does not hear from customers, crews will proceed with standard pruning.

RECIPE FALL FAVORITE! Easy Pumpkin Bread for Fall

PREPARATION

Preheat your oven to 350' F and grease a 9×5 inch loaf pan with non-stick cooking spray or line it with parchment paper.

MIX INGREDIENTS

Combine the spice cake mix and pumpkin puree (not pie filling) in a large mixing bowl. Stir until smooth and well combined. Fold in the chocolate chips.

POUR AND BAKE

Pour the batter into your prepared loaf pan, spread-

ing it evenly. Bake for 45-50 minutes or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean.

COOL AND ENJOY!

Let the bread cool in the pan for about 10 minutes before transferring it to a wire rack to cool completely. Slice and enjoy.

West Hills Ten O'Clock Garden Club History

When West Hills Subdivision was very young it boasted TEN garden clubs. According to **Martha Phillips** who moved here in 1958, "Everyone wanted to be in a garden club."

The area had been farming terrain, trees were relatively few, and the residents wanted to beautify the community. A beautification council was formed, and plant sales were held at the brand new West Hills Elementary School on various Saturdays to share plantings and gardening experiences.

Over the years, people's interests changed, some moved away, others returned to work. Clubs lost membership, and the Council no longer functioned.

By 1971 only four garden clubs remained: Garden Lovers, Belle Fleur, Gateway, and West Hills Ten O'Clock. These four sent representatives, Mary Harper, Flo Thomas, Evelyn Bondurant, and Katherine Luton to reestablish a new council.

The Object of said Council--to coordinate the interests of all Garden Clubs and the West Hills Community Association, to foster civic improvements and landscape beautification, to encourage beautification of business establishments in the area, and to promote pride in maintaining our own community.


There was zero money, so each club contributed a small sum, and the projects began, interspersed with money- raising projects.

Early residents may remember the "Christmas Cards," 4' by 8' wooden slabs, painted by Bearden High School Art Classes, installed on Winston, Wesley, and Buckingham entrances.

A smaller need was for framed plaques to recognize businesses on Kingston Pike (between Papermill and Walker Springs) who beautified their areas. The eventual "Yard of the Month" selections required signs--

which were stolen occasionally and had to be replaced. Other projects have included planting an Arbor Day tree at West Hills School and assisting with their plantings financially at times, also the Gazebo fund. In recent years the Mailbox Decorating Contest was added and signs made for that.

The BIGGIE was the purchase of five entrance signs in 1996. This took years of sales of Dogwood trees, pansies, geraniums, red bows, Dogwood mints, and of course, bake sales and garage sales. Total cost of the original group of signs was \$9385, with an assist at the end by **Jean Teague** and City Council. The last two signs, financed by a combination of

As a follow-up to the history of the beautification of West Hills written in 2007, now only one garden club remains, the West Hills Ten O'Clock Garden **Club** The club was founded in 1955 and celebrated its 40th anniversary in 1995. The Tennessee General Assembly Senator from District 7, Richard Briggs, attended as well as the Knoxville City Council member for the West Hills district. In addition, Governor Don Sundquist's wife Martha sent a message to congratulate the club.


At the time of the 40th anniversary all members of the club were residents


of West Hills. However, it is no longer a requirement for club members to live in the West Hills Subdivision. Today the club continues to support the beautification of West Hills by partnering with the West Hills Community Association to plant seasonal flowers at the West Hills neighborhood signs, attach large red bows on the neighborhood signs at Christmas, and identify and post signs for "Yard of the Month" and "Best Decorated Mailbox."

In addition to the club's continued relationship with the West Hills Community Association, it has been an active participant in the Racheff House Board of Governors and the Knox

County Council of Garden Clubs Ilza Wood has been the RHBOG Chairman for the Book of Recognition and Remembrance for the last 12 years, replacing June Zachary who held that position for many years. Members have also been active with the Knox County Council of Garden Clubs. Club member Judy Fenton has won prizes for her table arrangements at the last three District IV Membership meetings.
