

he Ag Rho team was comprised of seven players, four from Tina-Avalon High School (McClure, R. Condron, Grozinger, and D. Condron) and one each from Breckenridge High School (Scanlon), Schulyer County High School (Weaver), and Ursa Illinois High School (Frazier).

The Ag Rhos breezed through the divisional play with a 4-0 record. Ken McClure '72 and Jim Scanlon '70 were the player-coaches and starters, along with Robert Condron '73, Rocke Weaver '74, and Greg Frazier '74. The team played a fast break offense and 1-2-1-1 full-court press defense, and then a manto-man defense in the front court. Both offense and defense were modeled after the UCLA basketball program.

In the eight-team playoffs, AGR defeated Lamda Chi Alpha, Alpha Tau Omega, and Sigma Alpha Epsilon for the championship. AGR was basically an underdog throughout the

playoffs. In the semi-final game, Ken McClure was undercut late in the game on a fast break and suffered a fractured left hand. In the championship game before a packed crowd in Rothwell Gymnasium, Dan Condron became a starter, and AGR maintained a lead through the entire game until SAE staged a late rally and tied the game with 10 seconds remaining. AGR broke the press, and Robert Condron swished a 35-foot shot at the buzzer to give AGR the championship.

The team had a very balanced offensive attack, tenacious full-court press defense, and excellent team chemistry, with everyone contributing to both offense and defense. The fast-break offense was unstoppable by opponents, and the full-court defense created numerous turnovers in each game. In 1975, there was no threepoint shot available. The games had 20-minute halves, with the clock stopping only for fouls and free throws. A large celebration was enjoyed at the house following the game.



## TROY WILSON '87 NAMED ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR

A ccording to **Troy Wilson '87**, his journey with Theta Chapter began with encouragement from some high school friends. "They were legacies in the fraternity and persuaded me to attend rush events," he recalled. "Upon visiting, I could see the brotherhood at work and wanted to be part of it." That sense of camaraderie continues to hold a special place in his life.



Reflecting on his time at the chapter house, Troy noted several favorite memories. "Building a large deck during spring finals week was a great deal of fun," he said. "Thanks for leading that project, **Tim Minson '86!** We likely should have been studying, but I think it all turned out okay." Another cherished memory was spending time with the chapter's cook. "Myrtle had seen it all at least twice and generally had a wise comment for every occasion," he said. "She didn't know how to fry an egg but made the best turkey and mashed potatoes I have ever eaten."

Troy earned a bachelor's degree in food science and nutrition. "Graduating high school in 1985, we faced a terrible economy, with agriculture among the worst-hit sectors," he explained. "The food science and nutrition program offered me a scholarship, and I liked the flexibility of taking both science and business classes."

His career took him through various roles in the food and agriculture industries, starting as a dairy applications technologist with Grindsted Products in 1990. In a small company, he gained experience in research, sales, marketing, and engineering. As the company expanded, he transitioned into leadership roles, including overseeing the global Grain Processing Enzyme business. "Timing is everything," he said. "New Renewable Fuel Standards led to a boom in ethanol production, which required the enzymes we supplied, resulting in significant business growth." After DuPont acquired the company, Troy took on leadership roles, including expanding business in Central and South America. He retired in April 2022 after a 32-year career and over 2.7 million air miles. "My passion was building teams and empowering people to lead. AGR's principles supported my career in both good and bad times."

Although Troy's career had limited his involvement as an alumnus, he reengaged when his son, **Grey '19**, joined. "The chapter was facing some issues and I thought I could help," he said. This led to the formation of the Theta Advisement Committee, designed to support the active chapter and the Board of Alumni without financial responsibilities. He also joined the finance committee to modernize the fraternity's fiscal structure. "Through visiting the house and talking with the BA and on-campus members, it was clear an update was needed to stay competitive with other student housing options."

Being named AGR's Alumnus of the Year is an honor Troy deeply appreciates. "I appreciate the opportunity to give back and support an organization that has done so much for me and my family."

Today, Troy and his wife, Robyn, live near Amana, Iowa. Their sons, Grey and Matt '24, both joined AGR at Mizzou. The family enjoys tailgating at Mizzou football games, kayaking, and traveling. They also take on woodworking projects and have restored a couple of old cars, with their current project being a 1967 International Scout.
