
### Jeff continues...

This total number is around \$90,000 per year. We pay our Secretary/Treasurer \$12,000 a year for all her work year-round and Josh \$1,200 a year for all the website updates and maintenance. Then there are fees with the website and stickers, membership cards, postage, D/O insurance reimbursement for the branches, National Show \$1000 and Regional Shows \$500 to go toward expenses, travel expenses for the Directors to go to the National Show and Meeting and other miscellaneous expenses. Our dues cover a lot of different expenses. It is also time to make sure your officers are current.



# From Travis Brown, Eastern Region Director

My grandfather was responsible for introducing me to the world of steam engines (steam tractors). He worked with these massive contraptions in his youth; indeed, we have pictures of him sawing wood with one from 1938.

Later in life he decided to build one, a process that would take him 10 years to complete. He finished it when I was four, and we took it to many shows and events when I was growing up. He patterned it after an engine his neighbors used to thresh with and bought new, he recalled watching them unload it, it had to be quite the day to get one delivered new by rail back then.



I cannot recall a time before steam, without exaggeration, I have been around it all my life. One of the highlights used to be when we would go to the **Central States Thresherman's Reunion** every Labor Day weekend at **Pontiac IL**. We would miss school Thursday and Friday and go to the old grounds at the 4H park and have a wonderful time sawing wood with our half scale engine and half scale sawmill as well as going through the parade and getting thoroughly covered in soot and coal dust.

Grampa and myself or my brother would go all over to several shows and events around his small town in IL.

I have been blessed enough that I could raise my children the same way, taking them to shows and events and helping them to operate the steam engine. My wife soon realized that it was a losing battle, and that steam engine grease rarely comes out of any clothes it claims.

Later, when he passed, I moved the steam engine down to Tennessee as I had moved there to go to college and never left.

I was surprised to learn that they would not let me operate my prized steam engine at the shows in Tennessee. After a few years I started working on finding out how I could fix this injustice. Many told me it was impossible, others had tried and failed. I reasoned that if my grandfather could spend ten years laboring building this, I could spend ten years fighting the system.

In fact, after only five years, we had gotten the "powers that be" to sit down and negotiate a series of

rewrites to the Tennessee law that would not only benefit our steam engine but also every other historic boiler in the State of Tennessee. In other words, I fought the law, and I won.

Most of the changes were made by studying what other states have done and adopting the best practices that we could all agree on. After the committee signed off, the **Boiler Board of Appeals** approved the changes, then the State Legislature voted on the changes and then after the Governor signed off the changes became law on **July 1, 2006**. This change would quickly lead to great increases in the number of steam engines operating in Tennessee, the average number of historic boilers at shows all across the state went from around 2 to an average number of 20.

#### Travis continues...

After we won that issue, I was at a show a few years later and saw something that concerned me. A steam engine owner had left his machine in the hands of a friend to go run an errand. During that time, it had a hand hole gasket fail, and the friend did not know what to do. He called me over and I took action to fix the situation before it got out of hand. Afterwards I realized that we could benefit from increased training for historic boiler operators, and we started doing so in what we call Steam School.

We patterned ours after the popular traveling steam school put on for many years by the folks from the **Pawnee Oklahoma Steam Show**. We have done this for nearly ten years in many different locations and in different configurations.

This year I have done two so far, one in **Tennessee** and one in **southern Indiana**. The one in Tennessee was an event sponsored by **Branch 202** along with assistance from the **City of Murfreesboro TN** who let us use a building at the historic **Cannonsburg Village** for our school. Then I traveled to **Evansville** to do a school hosted by the Southern Indiana Antique Machinery group at the **Vanderbugh County Fairgrounds**. We also attempted to saw with steam there and instruct people on the finer arts of circular sawmills but that was cut short when the steam engine had a flue to fail. That flue failure led to a very teachable moment on how to react when things are not going right.





Our focus on these schools is safe operation. We cover a lot of the basics like types and constructions of historic boilers steam oilers, steam injectors, fusible plugs, safety valves and event how to calculate the maximum safe operating pressure by checking thickness and using algebraic formulas. But the overall theme is to learn how to safely operate these engines and have a plan on what to do if that hand hole gasket fails or when the flue fails. Also keep two people on that engine because it will happen every show that someone is not paying attention to your 12-ton piece of machinery while you drive around and will walk in front or stop in your path. Steam engines don't typically have brakes, be ready.

\*Steam is one of the items I specialize in as a director of **EDGETA**. I also have Tractor pulling as another area. Each director takes a few of these areas to divide up the workload so they do not just have the branches in their region, they also have other concerns as well. Luckily, we are able to communicate with each other quite often when anything arises.

**And continues Travis!** 

On our schedule this year is a small show at the **Tennessee Ag Museum in Nashville April 26**, a trip to **Oklahoma for the National Show June 20-21** the **Tennessee Kentucky Thresherman's Show in Adams in July 18-19**, a trip to **Rushville Indiana** for their show featuring our brand of steam engines (Keck Gonnerman) in **August 1-3**, our local show at **Eagleville in September 5-6** and then a trip to the East Region show in **Foley Alabama** 



**October 4** followed by a show in **Boonville Indiana** where we will celebrate 50 years of our family steaming **October 10-11**. It is going to be a busy year with all the things going on, hopefully we will see you at one or many of these events!


