

Church Etiquette tip for this week:

One must fast for at least 1 hour before receiving the Holy Eucharist. The only exception are medicine, water or unless someone is ill and need to eat. Adhering to this practice helps us prepare spiritually and physically for this sacred sacrament.

SUNDAY REFLECTION / REFLEXIÓN DOMINICAL

In today's Gospel, Jesus is in the synagogue of Nazareth, his hometown. After reading a passage from Isaiah chapter 61, he affirms that the passage is now fulfilled in him and in his kingdom. He claims that he is the servant of God that Isaiah spoke of, who would deliver God's people by preaching, freeing the oppressed, and healing the sick. Jesus had to act out this sermon throughout his public life. He had to demonstrate to them in practice that He was the awaited Messiah by healing the sick, giving sight to the blind, freeing from sin, comforting, raising some from the dead, and preaching the kingdom of God.

But his listeners had critical problems with such a deliverer or messiah. Above all, they could not accept that this passage referred to Jesus himself, because he was one of their neighbors; he grew up with them; he lived many years in Nazareth with them. He seemed to them the wrong person to pretend to be such a messiah. It was all too familiar to them; He was a prophet without honor in his hometown.

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In the second reading, Paul affirms that "all the parts of the body, though many, are one body." That is, the Church, the assembly of the baptized, is the extension of the body of Christ in this world. Now, the members are diverse and their gifts are diverse, but the gifts are meant to benefit the whole body, the Church. The implication is that the Church must carry out the work of Christ, the Messiah. That is, all of us who are baptized in Christ are called to carry out these words of Isaiah in our day; we must follow in the footsteps of Jesus, the deliverer and messiah. Each of us has our own gifts and abilities; each of us must use our gifts, whatever they may be, to build up the body of Christ.

A common attitude in the Church years ago was that lay people were the wrong people for the job, because the Church was made up of the Pope, bishops, priests and religious. Their job was to preach, teach, administer and carry out the work of the Church. Now it is asserted that all the baptized form the body of Christ and should contribute to building up his body, including with lay ministries of their own. This view of the Church is still new and not fully accepted by everyone. In other words, lay people are not the right people to form the Church.

The other problem with all of this is that for many people today, Jesus is the wrong kind of messiah. They don't want to commit to following a messiah who won't overcome the constant suffering and injustice around the world or who can't free humanity from hunger, hatred, violence, and war. They won't follow a messiah who doesn't change our suffering, unjust, and evil world into a world of justice, peace, and love. If Jesus can't make our world a world free of suffering and injustice, then they will never be satisfied with him and they will certainly never commit their lives to him.

But we are still called to follow Christ, who is this kind of messiah. We acclaim him as Savior in the midst of human suffering, injustice, and evil. We do not expect him to magically change our own nature and that of all humans into something other than human. We will always be free, so our world will never be perfect. But it is also our individual calling to follow the way of Jesus, our model, and to build up this body of Christ in our own limited way. All workers minister to the needs of people in some way; and lay ministers of the Church can help people in their faith. Paul reminds us today of our motive for following this kind of Messiah: "You are the body of Christ, and individual parts of it."

En el Evangelio de hoy, Jesús está en la sinagoga de Nazaret, su ciudad natal. Tras leer un pasaje del capítulo 61 de Isaías, afirma que el pasaje se cumple ahora en él y en su reino. Afirma que él es el siervo de Dios del que habló Isaías, que liberaría al pueblo de Dios predicando, liberando a los oprimidos y curando a los enfermos. Jesús tuvo que representar este sermón a lo largo de su vida pública. Tuvo que demostrarles en la práctica que Él era el Mesías esperado curando a los enfermos, dando vista a los ciegos, liberando del pecado, consolando, resucitando a algunos de la muerte y predicando el reino de Dios. Pero sus oyentes tenían problemas críticos con tal libertador o mesías. Sobre todo, no podían aceptar que este pasaje se refiriera al propio Jesús. Porque era uno de sus vecinos; creció con ellos; vivió muchos años en Nazaret con ellos. Les parecía la persona equivocada para pretender ser tal mesías. Les resultaba demasiado familiar; era un profeta sin honor en su ciudad natal. El otro problema que tenían con el sermón de Jesús era un problema común para la mayoría de los judíos de la época de Jesús. Él era el tipo equivocado de Mesías. No buscaban un Mesías que predicara, sanara y ayudara. Querían un libertador político; querían volver a ser un pueblo libre, libre del dominio romano. Querían un rey que los convirtiera de nuevo en una nación con sus propias leyes, autoridad y gobierno. Este era el tipo de mesías que esperaban según la propia palabra de Dios en el Antiguo Testamento. Pero Jesús no eliminó la injusticia; no destruyó el dominio romano; no les devolvió la libertad; no los convirtió en una nación fuerte, elegida por Dios. En la segunda lectura, Pablo afirma que «todas las partes del cuerpo, aunque son muchas, son un solo cuerpo». Es decir, la Iglesia, la asamblea de los bautizados, es la prolongación del cuerpo de Cristo en este mundo. Ahora bien, los miembros son diversos y sus dones son diversos, pero los dones están destinados a beneficiar a todo el cuerpo, la Iglesia. La implicación es que la Iglesia debe llevar a cabo la obra de Cristo, el Mesías. Es decir, todos los bautizados en Cristo estamos llamados a llevar a cabo estas palabras de Isaías en nuestros días; debemos seguir los pasos de Jesús, el libertador y mesías. Cada uno de nosotros tiene sus propios dones y capacidades; cada uno de nosotros debe utilizar sus dones, cualesquiera que sean, para edificar el cuerpo de Cristo.

Una actitud común en la Iglesia hace años era que los laicos eran las personas equivocadas para el trabajo, porque la Iglesia estaba constituida por el Papa, los obispos, los sacerdotes y los religiosos. Su trabajo era predicar, enseñar, administrar y llevar a cabo la labor de la Iglesia. Ahora se afirma que todos los bautizados forman el cuerpo de Cristo y deben contribuir a edificar su cuerpo, incluso con ministerios laicos propios. Esta visión de la Iglesia es todavía novedosa y no todos la aceptan plenamente. En otras palabras, los laicos no son las personas adecuadas para formar la Iglesia. El otro problema de todo esto es que, para muchas personas hoy en día, Jesús es el tipo equivocado de mesías. No quieren comprometerse a seguir a un mesías que no superará el sufrimiento y la injusticia constantes en todo el mundo o que no puede liberar a la humanidad del hambre, el odio, la violencia y la guerra. No seguirán a un mesías que no cambie nuestro mundo sufriente, injusto y malvado en un mundo de justicia, paz y amor. Si Jesús no puede hacer de nuestro mundo un mundo libre de sufrimiento e injusticia, entonces nunca estarán satisfechos con él y ciertamente nunca comprometerán sus vidas con él.

Pero aún así estamos llamados a seguir a Cristo, que es este tipo de mesías. Lo aclamamos como Salvador en medio del sufrimiento, la injusticia y la maldad humana. No esperamos que cambie por arte de magia nuestra propia naturaleza y la de todos los humanos en algo que no sea humano. Siempre seremos libres, por lo que nuestro mundo nunca será perfecto. Pero también es nuestro llamado individual seguir el camino de Jesús, nuestro modelo, y construir este cuerpo de Cristo a nuestra manera limitada. Todos los trabajadores atienden las necesidades de la gente de alguna manera; y los ministros laicos de la Iglesia pueden ayudar a la gente en su fe. Pablo nos recuerda hoy nuestro motivo para seguir a este tipo de Mesías: "Ustedes son el cuerpo de Cristo, y partes individuales de él"
