
Fall 2025 - This Year at Lakewood

From the Secretary

When I tell people I volunteer at a cemetery, they give me... a weird look. And they probably picture a typical cemetery on level ground with neat rows of modest small gravestones. But then I tell them about Lakewood - its history as part of the "rural cemetery movement" of the 1800's, the beautiful location overlooking Otsego Lake, the many striking monuments from the 19th century, and the life stories of the people buried here. And then they get interested! It is a special place. One moment you can stand under towering pine trees admiring the view of the lake, the next you can read this moving inscription on a monument: "Jared C., Only Son of Wm. A and Mercy A. Fuller, Killed in Battle at Spotsylvania, May 10, 1864, age 22 years." It's important to honor that soldier's grave, and the graves of everyone buried or memorialized here.

New Bylaws, and New Rules & Regulations

The lot owners approved new bylaws at a special meeting in October. We announced the meeting via our website, emails, and legal notices in the *Daily Star*. This was a necessary update of old bylaws that, as far as we know, had not been officially updated for decades. Separately, the Board of Trustees approved new Rules and Regulations in October. This, too, was long overdue.

The new Bylaws, Rules, and Regulations will take effect when they are approved by the NY State Division of Cemeteries. Please be prepared for changes, particularly regarding decorations and new plantings in family lots. We have tried to balance the desire to honor loved ones with the goals of safety, aesthetics, and maintenance. We understand that decorations are very personal, and we appreciate your cooperation as we transition to the new rules.

Monument Repairs - 2025

Humphrey Memorials of Herkimer restored 44 hazardous monuments and gravestones this summer. The monuments were given new 42-inch foundations and cleaned. This work was totally funded by the New York State Division of Cemeteries' Fund for Vandalism Restoration and Monument Repair. This Fund is largely financed by a \$5 fee that cemeteries are required to pay for each burial or cremation, and it is overseen by the state Cemetery Board. This Board, in turn, awards money to pay for vandalism claims and the repair of dangerous monuments. It takes considerable work on the part of our volunteers to apply for these funds each year. Since 2021, we have had 174 monuments repaired, mainly due to the work of Trustee Merrilyn O'Connell. We plan to apply for another round of repairs next year.

A Bit of History...

The first person ever buried at Lakewood was Winfred E. "Winnie" Beadle of Cooperstown, who died of croup at age 4 on November 16, 1856. His family's monument was among those restored this year.
