

Favorite Halloween Movies



At some point I became fascinated with Pop-Up design. In an effort to better understand the craft and skill involved, I decided to create one for myself. Even the most basic and simple ones are a challenge for me as I try to wrap my head around how to unfold the solutions to such unique design skills. My Halloween Cards became a traditional event to create a new one each year for family and friends.



Inspired by Robert Sabuda and Matthew Reinhart with their pop-up design illustrations, I began watching tutorials online to understand the variety of techniques in which folded cards would open to display a 3-dimensional scene. As with any craft, I began with simple designs to build upon basic principles. Having since collected many pop-up books and other resources, it amazes me how unique and popular these have become in recent years.

As a 3D Computer animation artist, one would think it would be an easy skill to learn, but it has become a challenge in which I struggle as the process is both inspiring and frustrating to bring simple flat surface illustrations to life through complex designs that unfold into some spacial arrangement. The struggle is the discovery, as with any artform because you search for solutions to bring an idea to realization. Ultimately, that becomes a source of confidence in knowing how to acheive goals in which turning corners or unfolding a card design brings about a sense of accomplishment.



Those Halloween cards I've created through the years began to inspire me in other areas as well. The creative solutions I found had an impact on my 3D computer animation with designing through spacial relationships. One craft unfolds into another as ideas soon begin to flow with new creative solutions. That becomes the magic when the mind discovers new possibilities and the imagination has no boundaries to what can be created. At least, that is how I see the creative process in an ongoing search for new discoveries and solutions.

I was creating pop-up designs in my 3D animation work as if it were something subliminal in my mind without fully understanding what I was creating. The results were an extension of self-discovery and the cornerstone foundation of building new ideas leading to more possibilities and solutions...which continue to encourage growth.

For me, it's really not all that psychological nor introspective as much as it is just fun to create a Halloween card! I can't wait to share...as soon as I can create a new one! Happy Halloween!



"Scavenger Haunt" was my ambitious effort to put my writing skills in context to a theatrical production. Having seen numerous plays over the years, I had become inspired with live perfromance theatre. By coincidence, I came across a very old English Literature book that contained a manuscript for a play. That became my incentive to break free of having to rely upon descriptive storytelling and begin to think about how actors could tell a story through actions and spoken narrative.

My synopsis was rather simple...two teenage kids with very little in common go into a haunted house to find the prize treasure from various clues. During their search, they gain more respect for each other as they work together to discover the most valuable aspect of the game is their collaboration to work through their differences.

As I began to write, the story began to flow as I added more details in searching within myself to resolve solutions to complex storytelling ideas. The process seemed more intimate as an insight into human interaction. I was having fun with the basic script as the story seemed to be writing itself throughout. The creative mode often flows when ideas are as much a surprise to the writer as to the reader.

I was also considering realistic production costs for set design, the number of actors and effects. Those elements from plays I had seen would help drive the fundamental limitations of a theatrical performance. Not only was I writing the story, I would visualize how it could be simplified for theatre. I considered stage sets needed for the scenes as that forced a new discipline to limit story ideas and keep production costs to a minimum.

The play was written in just over a week as I made time and was having a blast with the results. I think it was a story I was begging myself to write for many years, yet had never put forth the effort. Each day brought something new as I would consider options for solutions to intertwine those progressive details. In the end, it was a Scavenger Haunt within my own search through creativity.

The play was more monumental than I would realize at the time. All I wanted to do was write a story that could become a dramatic theatrical production. As Shakespeare would say, "The Play is The Thing," and that means so much more to me as I took myself through the process and began to understand how "The Thing" is working through creative solutions to resolve problems.

As an only child, I often fantasized about others' reactions in simulated circumstances. In other words, I would pretend to be in realistic situations in which I could control the actions and words of others. My fantasies never worked out in reality and that became my incentive to write stories to compensate through the creative control of imagination. Live and learn from a world that perceives you so differently than you see yourself. That was an element of the story that I wanted to illustrate to an audience. Strip away the labels and the surface structures of others to discover something unique and amazing within.

The story takes you through character development between Kate and Chip as they are on a scavenger hunt through a haunted house to find clues that is an annual event sponsored by their high school. As they make their way through the evening, they both discover more about themselves and understand more about each other. That becomes the true treasure in the end in my opinion.

The story is one of my favorites as it was written from such an inspirational point in my life as I was searching within my own self. I gained confidence in my abilities and discovered a new passion for writing. It led to more writings as I continued to challenge myself to utilize as much with written words as much as my artistic exploration. The next thing I knew...I was writing a full novel!

"Scavenger Haunt" was a search within the story as much as a search within the self. The scene when Kate and Chip discover the mummy in the sarcophagus gives me chills when I go back and read it again. The dialogue between them seemed to come from another dimension through the portal gate of my own mind. I was probably craving Fried Chicken as well, but you will need to read the script to understand how the creative mind works within realistic circumstances. Meanwhile, Happy Hunting for your inner soul!

The truth is that I knew so little about Halloween traditions going into this project as it was more of a curiosity rather than anything else. What do they say about curiosity? Superstitions have much to do with Halloween traditions as Celts in ancient history marked October 31st or "Samhain" as the death of the old year and the beginning of a new one. They celebrated their harvests to the Sun God, Baal and also performed charms and spells to appease the Lord of the Dead.

Cultures changed and religion became an influence upon old traditions as new ones began to develop. "All Hallows Eve" became shortened to "Halloween" through the years as those European cultures made their way to America. The melting pot of the many differences turned ignorance into one of our nation's greatest gifts after mass hysteria resulted in political rhetoric during the Salem Witch Trials.

"Religious extremism and an unjustified process of authority from a society that was ignorant of the discovery of truth led to a more solid procedure of legal actions giving way to the thought process that one shall be innocent until proven guilty."

The Spirits have much to do with history, culture and traditions as the annual observance of Halloween has become the second most commercial holiday with businesses in that it is estimated Americans spend about \$6 billion dollars each year in costumes, decorations, and candy sales. It truly is the Nightmare before Christmas!



Do you know the difference between a 'Gargoyle' and a 'Grotesque?' Neither did I before beginning my research to include the many aspects that have become woven into our social fabric of Halloween traditions. A Grotesque is simply a horrific beast-like statue to ward off evil. A Gargoyle is the same, yet designed for the soul purpose of draining water from rooftops and other structures. Both types can be traced back to ancient Egypt, but there is a popular legend from the Middle Ages to suggest the gargoyle's intention is to drain the blessings of rainwater upon the mystical dragon whose fiery breath continues even after death.



As the most iconic symbol of Halloween, the Jack 'O Lantern is given credit to an old Irish myth in which Jack made a deal with the Devil as to not take his soul. Jack was turned away from Heaven and the Devil kept his promise not to take his soul, so Jack was given a 'turnip' and coals to forever light his way upon the earth. Pumpkins became a more popular fall harvesting 'fruit' that worked it's way into the traditional flavor of the story's origin as the pumkin production value has risen to \$193 million in US dollars as of 2020.

My research became overwhelming and there simply isn't enough space to write an article about Bats, their history, and the many wonders and misconceptions they have been given in our culture. Without doubt, they have an impact as mammals that have taken flight through evolution and now mystify scientists with so many unique qualities that are debated and yet to be explained.

Bats defy much that seems normal for mammals...as they are not birds, nor rodents or insects, but of the only mammal species that can fly. More than 1400 species exist in the world and have scientists baffled with how unique they are with respect to age and immunity to disease. Much research has gone into discovering how well bats have evolved and adapted to their longevity of life, immunization to many diseases, and flight.

The fact many species spend most of their life upside down is even a question that many debate. Some believe it is to help them to fly from falling while others think it has more to do with blood rushing to their membranes. Either way, it's just weird.

Bats are remarkable and extraordinary creatures with nocturnal senses that can only capture the imagination as a shadow of pulp fiction that scares society into thinking they are a force of evil-flying entities with a taste for human blood.

Bats just may contain the answers to many questions as we are faced with a worldwide pandemic. Although it has not been confirmed, it is presumed bats were carriers of the Covid-19 virus that found it's way into humans. Scientists have been researching bats to understand their immunization to disease.

Telemirs are long-term cell cycles that have something to do with a feverish defense against viral activity. Bats have a high defense system to fight virus while human-based


infections are simply reactive to the internal system. In other words, humans react to a viral condition whereas bats have the ability to stop disease before it takes root in it's system. Virus do not affect the health of bats and scientists are researching to discover the secret to their immunization.

Another question to be answered is their longevity of life. Bats are reported to live 30-40 years, which is extensive due to most mammals their size live only a few short years. Scientific research has shown bats telemir cell construction differ little from youth to adult aging. A bats heartrate can be 1006 beats per minute as their body temperature is constantly fighting viral activity. Although bats carry viral diseases, they are immune through a working-defense against infection, which helps to sustain their life longevity.


Vampire bats exist only in Central and South America and are the only species of bats in which their food source is blood from cattle and livestock. After returning to their den to feed their young, those who were successful share their blood regurgitations with those that were not as fortunate. It is an expectation to reciprocate the favor and those who become selfish never receive favors again.

Bats are amazing and we have much to learn from them. Call them demonic creatures or miracles of evolution as they are part of our lives whether we are aware or not.

1 large avocado

2 Tbsp fresh lemon juice

Kosher salt and pepper

4 medium pimiento-stuffed olives, sliced

Place the eggs in a large saucepan, add enough cold water to a level 2 inches avove submerged eggs and bring to a boil. Remove from heat, cover the saucepan and let stand 12 minutes.

In a small bowl, whisk together the sour cream, taco sauce and chili powder. Place in a pastry bag fitted with a fine writing tip. In another bowl, mash the avocado with the lemon juice and 1/4 tsp each salt and pepper.

Transfer to a resealable plastic bag and cut off the tip to create a 1/2 inch opening.

Drain the eggs and return them to the saucepan. Gently shake the saucepan to crack the eggs all over.

Run under cold water to cool, then peel the eggs. Cut the eggs in half lengthwise. Remove yolks and save for another use. Using the sour cream mixture, pipe thin squiggly lines on each egg white half so they resemble bloodshot eyes.

Pipe the avocado mixture into each white and place a slide of olive on tip.

PLIMPKIN BREAD

1 1/2 cups sugar

1 cup canned pumpkin

1/2 cup vegetable oil

1/2 cup water

2 eggs

1 2/3 cups all-purpose flour

1 tsp baking soda

1 tsp ground cinnamon

3/4 tsp salt

1/2 tsp baking powder

1/2 tsp ground nutmeg

1/4 tsp ground cloves

Optional:

1/2 cup chopped walnuts



In a large mixing bowl, combine the sugar, pumpkin, oil, water and eggs. Combine the dry ingredients; gradually add to pumpkin mixture and mix well. Stir in nuts and raisins (optional)

Pour into a greased 9 x 5 x 3 loaf pan. Bake at 350° for 65-70 minutes or until a toothpic inserted in the middle comes out clean.

Cool in pan for 10 minutes before removing to a wire rack.


Sleepy Hollow

is one of my seasonal favorites and sets the mood through music and literature together that is a collaboration of Poe's written works and Parsons gift for music production. The Alan Parsons Project was born from his need to create music from a Producer's viewpoint that would be based upon a theme.

I often go back and read much of Edgar Allan Poe's works as a result. I found it interesting that he was the first writer to earn a living solely as an author and is given credit for his innovations with suspence

and mystery with a new genre of detective novels.

Neil Gaiman's "The Graveyard Book" is just one of many of my favorites he has written. Both he and artist Dave McKean have created so much incredible works throughout their careers that inspire me. Gaiman has made his mark upon the silver screen as well with "Stardust" and "Coraline."

Those are two

must-see movies if you haven't already. In addition, Dave McKeen made his film director debut with "MirrorMask," which is another one of my seasonal favorites.
