### **Conference Artwork**

'Connecting Land, Sky and Water', created by contemporary Aboriginal artist Dennis Golding expresses Aboriginal peoples connection to land, sky and water since time immemorial. Our history shows how our people have cared for Country including the waterways and land that provides us sources for life and culture. This artwork recognises how the First Nations Eye Health Alliance aim to provide pathways, support and care into our community for better outcomes in health and wellbeing. It acknowledges how communities who come from all parts of country including salter water, freshwater regions, to connect and work together as one. The artwork allows people to see the roots of Country, the cultural practices on land, the tracks we mark, the waters we live off and around, and the stories we reflect and connect to from sky Country.

### **About the Conference**

Hosted by The First Nations Eye Health Alliance Limited (FNEHA), the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Eye Health Conference (NATSIEHC) is the only national event dedicated to improving eye health outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

The First Nations Eye Health Alliance (FNEHA) is the principal voice and Australia's first Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander eye care peak body. NATSIEHC is a culturally grounded, action-focused gathering that brings together Elders, community leaders, eye health workers, researchers, policymakers, and allies from across the country.

Held over three days, the conference features keynote sessions, community-led yarning circles, practical workshops, cultural programming, and deep knowledge-sharing. It's a space that doesn't just reflect on what needs to change — it drives it.

## **Our Purpose**

- Heal and Honour: Reflect on ten years of work and honour those who walked this path before us.
- Strengthen Community Control: Centre Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices in systems reform.
- Shift the System: Create a shared plan for action that embeds cultural ways of working across eye care.
- Build National Momentum: Advance our collective voice at the national policy level and strengthen partnerships with purpose.

## **What Makes This Conference Different**

- Led by Mob: The only eye health conference created, run, and led by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.
- Rooted in Culture: Programs are grounded in cultural ways of being, doing, and knowing.

### **Melbourne Cricket Ground**

The National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Eye Health Conference 2026 will be convened at the iconic **Melbourne Cricket Ground** (MCG) from Monday, 11 May – Wednesday, 13 May 2026.

The MCG, also known locally as the 'G, is a sports stadium located in Yarra Park, Melbourne, Victoria. Founded and managed by the Melbourne Cricket Club (MCC), it is the largest stadium in the Southern Hemisphere, the eleventh-largest stadium globally and the second-largest cricket stadium by capacity.

This provides us with a unique platform to position Melbourne as not only a global sporting capital, but also a place of cultural exchange, innovation, and connection — aligning with our vision of strong, healthy futures for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

The traditional owners of the land on which the <u>MCG</u> is situated are the <u>Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung</u> people, a part of the <u>Kulin Nation</u>. This area, including the Yarra Park precinct, holds deep cultural and historical significance as a meeting place for the Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung for countless generations.

The MCC has formalised its commitment to reconciliation by launching a Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP), an initiative by Reconciliation Australia. The MCC and the Australian Sports Museum highlight the history and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander athletes and people connected to the MCG.

### **Melbourne Cricket Ground - Gala Dinner**

As part of the program, delegates will come together for the Gala Dinner, hosted in the historic Members' Dining Room at the MCG. This special evening will be catered by Native by Dylan, led by Executive Chef Dylan Sanding, celebrating First Nations food traditions and the deep connection to Country through native ingredients.

"We celebrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture. We acknowledge the deep connection with land, sea and sky and the importance of caring for the environment around us. The spirit of the land shares a bounty of native ingredients with us and when we share food, we share a common story and culture that has been part of this land for thousands of years.

Sharing a meal creates a connection between all of us, creating friends of strangers, bringing us closer and connecting us to the spirit of Naarm and mobs throughout the land. We hope you enjoy the Indigenous, and uniquely Australian, flavours we bring to you."


