# Honeybee Drinking Fountain

Hitokotonushi Shrine – Joso, Japan

Bees and wasps drinking water to cool themselves down isn't an unusual sight on a sweltering summer day, but a tiny drinking fountain tailor-made for their kind may be rather rare.

Hitokotonushi Shrine in the city of Joso, Ibaraki Prefecture, is known for such a drinking fountain catering to the thirsty little bees, which has been set up every summer since 2020. This small act of kindness has been appreciated by hundreds of bees—and warmed the hearts of thousands

The honeybee drinking fountain was first created in 2016, but it did not reappear for the next four years due to the lack of apian visitors during that time. Attached to the ablution pavilion, the fountain's platform is made from bamboo and stuffed with moss, which provides a footing for the bees and creates the feeling of a serene fairytale scene.

# **Top Five Tips For Supporting Pollinators This Summer**

Mother Nature's messengers need consideration year-round. Here's what you can do to give them a helping hand.

When we see the first bit of green finally break through the earth or bud form on a tree outside our window, we know spring has indeed sprung. That's when many of us start to think of our pollinator friends and what we can do to help them as our plants begin to grow and bloom.

Some popular garden plants like roses are usually self-pollinated or pollinated by the wind, but most of the flowers you can buy at a nursery are going to attract and need pollinators. Around



Pollinators have preferences when it comes to the plants they choose to pollinate, so splashing different colors is important to supporting them.

80% of flowering plants need pollinators to reproduce, and over three-quarter of the staple crops that feed people and livestock do too.

Thinking locally is a great way to help pollinators. Using plants native to your region can add some extra help to support both native and other pollinators, and native plants will be better suited for the soil and climate. With any plant, planting a cluster of several of the same type will make it easier for pollinators to find them. A bonus to attracting pollinators is that your local wildflower populations may also increase.

- Overlap blooms. Pollinators need flowers that bloom at different times of the year. Be intentional and plant flowers that bloom as others start to fade.
- **Get Colorful!** Plant flowers of all different colors since different pollinators are attracted to different colors.
- Choose different shapes and sizes of flowers. Different pollinators are attracted to different-sized flowers--so get creative!
- Easy on the pesticides! Your flowers will bloom without all the chemicals--they have been doing it for thousands of years.
- **Give your pollinators shelter.** Whether that is your honeybee hive, or bee house.

## Honey Garlic Chicken Stir Fry

Recipe courtesy of Gayle Bartosh

#### **Ingredients:**

2 tablespoons olive oil

1 pound skinless, boneless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch pieces

5 cloves garlic, sliced, to taste or minced garlic in water salt and ground black pepper to taste

Red pepper flakes (optional)

2 (16 ounce) packages frozen Asian vegetables

1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms or canned mushrooms - drained

1/4 cup honey to taste

4 tablespoons low sodium soy sauce,

3 cups water or low sodium chicken broth

2 Tablespoons of cornstarch, diluted with broth (It was cute so cute optional to thicken sauce if needed.)

3 cups instant white rice (such as Minute® cooked)

#### **Procedure:**

- Toss chicken pieces with salt, black pepper and pepper flakes ( if desired)
- Place 1 Tablespoon oil in wok or sautée pan and preheat to smoke point.
- Add chicken to hot oil in two batches, stir fry quickly without overcooking.
- Remove from pan and reserve.
- Add remaining tablespoon of oil to wok or sauté pan and preheat to smoke point.
- Sauté vegetables and mushrooms in hot oil in 2 to 3 batches, remove and reserve.
- Add chicken broth/water, light soy sauce and honey to walk/ sauté pan bring to a simmer.
- Add sautéed chicken to simmering sauce, add vegetables to simmering chicken/sauce mixture. Thicken with cornstarch slurry as needed.
- Serve with rice.



# NATIONAL HONEY BEE SURVEYS

Last Modified: March 03, 2024

Since 2009, APHIS has funded an annual national survey of honey bee pests and diseases. The national survey documents which bee diseases, parasites, or honey bee pests are present or likely absent in the United States. Specifically, we have verified the absence of the parasitic mite Tropilaelaps spp. and other exotic threats to honey bee populations (e.g., Apis cerana).

#### Bee Practical Award American Beekeeping Federation

**Request for Applications** 

The American Beekeeping Federation (ABF) is offering an award for **up to \$2,000** to a beekeeper with a practical beekeeping idea that is relevant to other beekeepers. The \$2,000 will be split in the case more than one awardee is chosen. We are looking to fund one or more individuals that have developed a practical beekeeping practice *OR* have a practical beekeeping idea that needs funding to be developed. Examples of practical ideas include, but are not limited to: a novel way of utilizing old bee boxes, an air conditioned bee suit, a more accurate method of sampling for varroa mites, a method of collecting colony information, or a hive design for people with disabilities. Novel ideas will receive a higher rating.

Awardee(s) will be asked to share their idea with ABF membership in two ways. One, present their idea at the ABF annual conference in January 2025 hosted in Reno, Nevada. Free registration will be included. Two, the awardee(s) must write an article about their idea for the ABF's Quarterly magazine.

#### Applications will be accepted through October 1, 2024 Awardee(s) will be notified by October 15, 2024

#### **Application Submission:**

Submit their applications to Garett.slater@ag.tamu.edu. Each application must include:

- Applicant's name, mailing address, email address, and phone number
- Summary of idea (1-2 sentences)
- If the idea has been completed or if it is an idea that will be developed with the award money
- One-page description of the idea for a practical beekeeping practice
- One or more images that describe the idea and does not include the applicant

#### Qualifications:

- <u>Must</u> be a member of the American Beekeeping Federation. Go to <u>abfnet.org</u> to become a member.
- <u>Must</u> be a beekeeper. Researchers, including students, may apply if you are also a beekeeper.

Applications will be reviewed by a panel of distinguished ABF Research Committee members and the funds awarded based on the originality, practicality, and feasibility of the idea. One application per person is allowed. Teams, like a beekeeping club, may apply if at least one person is an ABF member. Prior to submission, anyone interested in seeking a patent for their idea should apply for the patent before applying to avoid invalidating the patent application.
