FRADITIONAL SLOVENIAN HONEY BREAKFAST

ace 2010, every third Friday in November, Slovenia, a tiny Central European country, holds a "Traditional Slovenian Honey Breakfast", when children and youth in all Slovenian schools and kindergartens get a free breakfast, consisting of an apple, honey, milk, butter, and bread from local farms or producers.

We connect this project with two other Slovenian projects - "World Bee Day" and "We plant honey-bee friendly plants" - and share it with the help and support of partners, sponsors and Ohio beekeepers with American students and youth.

The aim of the project is to provide healthy breakfast and educate about the importance of morning meal/breakfast and healthy eating, use of home-grown or local produced food, the impact of bees and other pollinators on food production and food supply chain, as well as their connection to the environmental changes.

This year marks the 4th time that a "Traditional Slovenian Honey Breakfast" is served in Ohio to approximately 450 children and youth of the following American local schools: Slovenian schools at St. Mary of the Assumption in Collinwood and Slovenian school at St. Vitus, Cleveland, Euclid Middle School and St. Jerome School in Euclid, Thoreau Park and Pleasant Valley Schools in Parma, Beachwood Middle School in Beachwood, Slovenian School for Adults and, for the first time, the veterans at the VFW Post in Wellington.

Honey-Spice Ginger Cookies By Martha Stewart

5 1/2 cups all-purpose flour, plus more for surface and parchment

1 1/2 teaspoons salt

1 teaspoon baking soda

4 teaspoons ground ginger

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg

1/2 teaspoon ground cloves

2 sticks unsalted butter, softened

1 cup granulated sugar

2 large eggs

1 cup honey

1/2 cup unsulfured molasses

Royal Icing

Fine sanding sugar

Step 1: Whisk together flour, salt, baking soda, and spices in a large bowl. Beat together butter and granulated sugar with a mixer until pale and fluffy. Beat in eggs, 1 at a time, then honey and molasses. Reduce speed to low, and gradually add flour mixture until well combined. Divide dough into thirds, and wrap each in plastic wrap. Refrigerate until firm but still pliable, about 1 hour.

Step 2: Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Working with a third of dough at a time, roll dough out to 1/4-inch thickness on generously floured parchment. Brush off excess flour, transfer dough on parchment

to a baking sheet, and freeze until firm, about 15 minutes. Cut into shapes with cookie cutters, rerolling scraps as needed. Transfer cookies to parchment-lined baking sheets, and freeze until firm, about 15 minutes. Bake until edges turn golden, about 15 minutes, rotating once and firmly rapping baking sheet halfway through baking to flatten any bubbles in cookies. Let cookies cool completely on baking sheets set on wire racks. Step 3: Place icing in a pastry bag fitted with a small plain round tip (Ateco #0, 1, or 2). Pipe outlines and details on cookies. *Immediately sprinkle with sanding sugar,* and tap off excess. Let set completely, uncovered, at room temperature, at least 4 hours or (ideally) overnight.
