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A Message from Our President

Hello fellow beekeepers,

Over the next few newsletters, I would like to speak about products or ideas that I have used, or considered using, and my related experiences. First on my list is winter hive wraps.

There are different schools of thought on whether or not to insulate hives over winter. Certainly, the winter we had without many severe cold snaps might have allowed the same results with or without insulation but, in retrospect, I am glad I purchased winter wraps last year. Over the winter, I had no problems with the wraps tearing or coming off. Even through the recent high winds of last week, there are no problems to date. These winter covers have done a great job and will be re-used next year.

The benefits include easy installation, and they fold away for compact storage. They also provide a great wind barrier. The disadvantages include the initial cost, and they don't allow the sun to warm the front of the hive.

President's Message continued...

In comparison, for my first wintered hive, I chose to make an insulated cover from 2-inch-thick Owens Corning insulation. I am handy. Plus, it's easy to cut and glue together with spray foam. I chose to make the front panel detachable. I felt it important that, if I wanted the sun to warm the front of the hive when the weather allowed, it could be easily removed. It worked well but it was, in my opinion, unsightly. I chose not to paint it. I could have, but winter snuck up on me and I was not sure I was sold on the idea of the large non-collapsible insulators. Painting would have also driven the initial expense higher.

In the end, it was more expensive to buy the materials vs buying a winter hive wrap, and the biggest disadvantage was that I did not like its size for summer storage. The completed cover was the size of my winter hive. Storing it in my storage shed was convenient, BUT it was always seemingly in the way. Bulky and big. In addition, the Owens Corning and hive wrap offered about the same insulation factor of R value 8.

The good news is that winter is in our rear-view mirror. Spring is on the horizon and our days are getting warmer and longer. We are a long way away from the fall of 2023, but planning for the year end is as important as is the start of the season.

I was in the apiary last week doing a spring check on the bees and I took the wraps off for part of my inspection. They came off and went back on quick and easy. Part of me wanted to hurry spring along and leave the wraps off but, as I write this edition for the newsletter, my weather station is reporting 32 degrees outside.

I would like to hear from the members if they have any comments, ideas, or thoughts on these winter wraps. What are your experiences of insulating vs. not, and are there any other handy tricks that you would recommend? That is one thing I love about our GCBA community, that we share our stories and learn from each other, with the ultimate goal of getting better every year.

Honey Simple Syrup

Yield

Variable amount as needed

Ingredients

honey hot water

Directions

Heat 2 parts honey to 1 part hot water in a saucepan over medium-low heat until the mixture reaches a simmer.
Remove from heat and cool.
Store at room temperature or refrigerate as desired.
Lasts 4 weeks in the refrigerator.

TIP

While the mixture is simmering, infuse the syrup with herbs, spices, citrus peels, or other aromatics. (Rosemary, grapefruit peel, peppercorn, pomegranate seeds, and vanilla bean are just some of the possibilities.) Cool and strain the infused syrups before using.

ENTRY RULES

- Only one entry will be permitted by an exhibitor for any one premium and no two exhibits in the same class shall be made by the same person or any member of his/her family from the same apiaries, or apiary.
- Honey judged on quality, cleanliness, color, aroma and moisture content.
- Bees and Queen judged for evenness in color and form, general appearance and educational value to the public. Queen and her bees shown on a frame of brood in observation hive.
- Sweetening used in baked goods and canned fruit must contain 50% honey. Recipe must be attached. Bring entry in zip-lock bag on disposable plate.
- Sweetening used in Honey Candy must contain a minimum of one-sixth honey. Candy and baked goods must be displayed in plastic bags or well-covered with clean film.
- Honey and honey products must be produced by the exhibitor within the past year - from fair year to fair year.
- The judge(s) may award a lower class prize or no prize for entries that are substandard.
- 8. Honey may be purchased for products in Section 300.
- Set up Saturday, Noon 4:00 P.M. or Sunday 9:00 A.M. Noon.
- 10. All exhibits/entries can be picked up on Sunday, the last day of the Fair, from 8:30 P.M. - 10:00 P.M. Exhibitor Tag required for pickup. Any exhibits not claimed will be disposed of at the discretion of the Director-At-Large or the Superintendent. Award ribbons not claimed will be available at the Fair Office the week following the Fair.
