Public Education Provided by Shannon

Back in 2012 I was Public Educator for GCBA and thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to educate the public about honeybees. Wide eyes and dropped jaws were common and frequent as I would give my presentation. Questions seemed to be endless, and we also went past our scheduled time. No matter what the age, people just could not seem to get enough information about honeybees once I would warm them up to our favorite fuzzy critters!

About a decade passed before I volunteered for the GCBA Public Education Committee again. It seemed the executive board immediately received requests for presentations. I was worried I was rusty, that maybe I would not appear as enthusiastic as I was back when I was a "Newbie" and all bright-eyed about everything bees. In the past few months, I have given four presentations and I no longer have those worries. Talking about bees and sharing their amazing habits with an audience never gets old! I have presented at an elderly luncheon in Reminderville, to 4–5-year-old students at the Music Settlement in East Cleveland, to a Lakewood church group ranging in age from 2-90 years old, and most recently to three STEM classrooms of 4th graders in Parma. Each group was delightful and engaging and the curiosity and awe were evident on each face in the audience.

The non-beekeeper, on average, does not know a lot about honeybees. Every member of GCBA knows enough information to give a meaningful and engaging presentation to any age group. Passing along the incredible news of our beloved bees is so satisfying and an important mission. "The More You Know" saying really applies to honeybees. The more people know, the less fear they may have, and the more support they may give to the "Save the Bees" movement.





Dear Buzz the Beekeeper, I have a question.

Since my hive is pretty much dormant the next few months what can I do in the off season?

What to do with down time depends on the kind of beekeeper you are. The commercial and sideliner never sees spare time, or time off, it's just running through the gears possibly at a different speed but never in park. So, this leaves the hobbyist, and as a hobbyist, depending on the years in beekeeping, you will need to set different goals for yourself, and these goals will vary greatly from the newest members of possibly just getting your bees through winter, to the most experienced of increasing production while cutting cost, as well as many other ideas and goals. So, I will take the simplistic approach for beekeepers having 1 to 6 years' experience thinking those with more experience already know what to do with down time!

Having a plan (a written plan) is a must for all beekeepers. If it is not in writing you will never knowingly accomplish your goals or knowingly advance to the next step in any kind of measured, successful way. Put it in writing (exactly) what you hope to accomplish and have a plan for the immediate future with (dates and times) all the while you are in this beekeeping hobby, such as winter survivability, try a new race of bee, new market for honey, flavored or creamed honey - make goals realistic. For the more advanced, 3-to-6-year beekeeper with wintering success and not just marginal success, this is what separates the novice from a superior beekeeper. Your written goals can include some of the following, increased honey production, grafting your own queens, producing nucs, expanding market size, etc.

Having a plan of what you want to accomplish then becomes an action plan for the immediate future and any downtime you may have going forward. Have you ever stopped and ask anyone at a store, vegetable stand, etc., if they would be willing to sell your honey/products, how do you think products get on the shelves of local markets? I began this article with a car simile let me finish with another one. While driving a vehicle you are always looking ahead, far beyond the edge of your hood to avoid accidents. In beekeeping, we should do the same keep looking ahead and occasionally glimpse at the rear-view mirror just to see how far you have advanced and if progress is being made.

Honey Spice Gingerbread Cookies

Ingredients

5 1/2 cups all-purpose flour, plus more for surface and parchment1

1/2 teaspoons salt

1 teaspoon baking soda

4 teaspoons ground ginger

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg

1/2 teaspoon ground cloves

2 sticks unsalted butter, softened

1 cup granulated sugar

2 large eggs

1 cup honey

1/2 cup unsulfured molasses

Royal icing

Fine sanding sugar
