### The Inspector's Corner

Hi everyone, May has been swarm month, during inspections in May I have found 30 to 40 swarms cells, found hives that appear to be queen less most likely because the hive swarmed, All the local clubs, stress inspections every 7 to 10 days. If you inspect every 21 days a queen can be hatched in 16 days and the hive swarms without you knowing it. Remember in Cuyahoga County we are basically urban beekeepers and swarms are a threat to local beekeeping. We have had two communities pass bee laws allowing beekeeping in the last 2 years. Unwanted swarms in a neighborhood can results in laws that can end or reverse beekeeping with a stroke of a pen. Please remember just adding deeps or supers do not stop a hive from swarming, adding 2 or 3 boxes to a hive to try to prevent swarming also give hive beetles a place to hide. 

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# Dear Buzz the Beekeeper, I have a question.

I just added a second deep super and intend to use medium supers for the rest of the season. Some of my beekeeping friends say they are only using a single deep this year; they have heard beekeepers in northern states, even Canada, have been successful overwintering hives in just one deep. What are your thoughts on that for beekeepers here in NEO? \*\*\*\*\*\*

It has been my experience that individuals espousing non-conventional ideas never bother to speak about negative aspects of an idea they embrace. I have to make some assumptions here, the question, overwintering with only one deep box (no supers) and during the summer months a queen excluder is used with supering done above the single deep! This is the traditional method used when referring to this type of beekeeping. Every move on a chess board has both positive and negative consequences if the player is honest with full disclosure.

In order to keep the queen in one box a queen excluder is a must and the obvious consequences of this is swarming. If the average beekeeper cannot keep bees from swarming in a colony with unlimited space, how is it to be avoided with this kind of restriction - it cannot! What these beekeepers do not say is that they desire this condition in order to build apiary size or to sell nucs.

I once taught a class on the subject showing videos of an individual racing through his single box configuration and never stopping to discuss all the swarm cells along the bottoms of each frame and obviously hoping no one would see them. The worst thing a beekeeper in a residential setting can face is endless swarms, whereas a rural beekeeper may not care at all. Swarms do not increase honey production but rather reduce it.

If queen confinement produces more honey, why don't we just keep bees in five frame nucs?

Lastly, overwintering, nothing is ever mentioned about the necessity of feeding bees in a one box configuration or how often it is required. I routinely overwinter mini nucs which consist of a total of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  frames, so it is doable, but they always need special attention. The bottom line is, this is not for the novice, but rather for the experienced beekeeper and never for a beekeeper living in a residential area where swarms are a threat to beekeeping.

#### Honeycomb and Brie English Muffin Pizzas

This recipe calls for just a touch of heat under the broiler. It's just enough to soften the Brie and honeycomb, one of the most splendid food combinations.

Start to finish: 15 minutes Servings: 4 1 tablespoon olive oil 1 medium red onion, thinly sliced 1 clove garlic, minced ½ teaspoon dried thyme Salt and ground black pepper 4 large whole-wheat English muffins 6 ounces Brie, thinly sliced Honeycomb

Heat the oven to broil.

In a medium skillet over medium-high heat, heat the olive oil. Add the onion, garlic and thyme, then sauté for 5 minutes, or until the onion starts to get tender. Season with salt and pepper, then set aside.

Split each English muffin in half and arrange cut side up on a baking sheet. Set under the broiler just long enough to lightly toast, about 1 minute.

Top each muffin half with a bit of Brie, then spoon a bit of the onion mixture over each. Place under the broiler for another minute.

Transfer the halves to serving plates, then top each with a spoonful of honeycomb. Serve immediately.
