

The Four Seasons of Beekeeping Calendar

The Dead Season: December, January, February

By Queen Right Colonies, Ltd.

DECEMBER:

1. Mite treatment if needed, with Oxalic - 50 plus degrees. Clean bottom board of dead bees with hook of sorts - like a cloths hanger, watch entrances for blockage of snow and ice as well.

JANUARY:

1. Mite treatment if needed, with Oxalic - 50 degrees plus. Clean bottom board of dead bees. Look at bottom board five days after each treatment during winter to determine if mites are still falling, if not skip a month's treatment.

FEBRUARY:

- 1. Mite treatment, if needed, possible feeding, if needed of pollen substitute or sugar syrup.
- 2. Spring management starts here with checking honey reserves and possibly moving frames of honey from periphery of hive close to cluster as weather permits.
- 3. Late February, feed pollen substitute and stimulus feeding of syrup. Clean bottom board as needed. Watch entrances for blockage. Open colonies as needed weather permitting.

The January meeting will focus on rendering the wax cappings you have tucked away in a bucket or maybe in the freezer, from start to finish. We also want to discuss many of the things we use our beeswax for and the all-natural products we can make. Bring your ideas and or products.

Honey-Butter Skillet Corn

INGREDIENTS

2 tablespoons butter

2 tablespoons honey

1 bag (16 oz.) frozen corn

2 ounces cream cheese cut into chunks

½ teaspoon salt

¼ teaspoon black pepper

INSTRUCTIONS

In a skillet pan, over mediumhigh heat, melt the butter and honey. Once melted add the frozen corn and cook for 5-8 minutes, stirring occasionally, until cooked through.

Add cream cheese, salt, and pepper. Stir together and let it cook, about 3-5 minutes, while stirring occasionally.

Serve immediately. Leftovers keep well, covered in a container, and stored in the fridge.

Beeswax Comes From Special Glands on a Bee's Abdomen

The youngest worker bees make the beeswax, from which workers construct the honeycomb. There are 4 pairs of glands (for a total of 8) on the underside of the abdomen that can secrete wax. Using their legs with knee-like structures and mouth parts, workers shape the soft wax flakes into what we know as honeycomb.

ENTRY RULES

- Only one entry will be permitted by an exhibitor for any one premium and no two exhibits in the same class shall be made by the same person or any member of his/her family from the same apiaries, or apiary.
- Honey judged on quality, cleanliness, color, aroma and moisture content.
- Bees and Queen judged for evenness in color and form, general appearance and educational value to the public. Queen and her bees shown on a frame of brood in observation hive.
- Sweetening used in baked goods and canned fruit must contain 50% honey. Recipe must be attached. Bring entry in zip-lock bag on disposable plate.
- Sweetening used in Honey Candy must contain a minimum of one-sixth honey. Candy and baked goods must be displayed in plastic bags or well-covered with clean film.
- Honey and honey products must be produced by the exhibitor within the past year - from fair year to fair year.
- The judge(s) may award a lower class prize or no prize for entries that are substandard.
- 8. Honey may be purchased for products in Section 300.
- 9. Set up Saturday, Noon 4:00 P.M. or Sunday 9:00 A.M. Noon.
- 10. All exhibits/entries can be picked up on Sunday, the last day of the Fair, from 8:30 P.M. 10:00 P.M. Exhibitor Tag required for pickup. Any exhibits not claimed will be disposed of at the discretion of the Director-At-Large or the Superintendent. Award ribbons not claimed will be available at the Fair Office the week following the Fair.


