A Message from Our President

Hello All, and happy May! By now, if you purchased a colony of bees, they should have been picked up and installed. Now is the highly anxious time of waiting for that colony to grow!

Remember to keep feeding those new colonies and keep a close eye on your feeders, as the food can be consumed rather quickly. Proper proportions for your feed are 8 lbs of sugar to 1 gallon of water at this time of year. Be sure to have a couple of clean empty jugs as the yield for this amount is around 2 gallons of feed. You will go through it!

For those who were lucky enough to have their bees overwinter, if you haven't yet, treatment for mites should be a high priority to get your colony(ies) a good head start into the season.

May is also the month of World Bee Day! We will be celebrating on May 19th (Friday) and and May 20th (Saturday) at the GCBA Bee Yard and Barn.

Inspector's Corner

Hi everyone,

It's the start of the inspection season and the first inspections on my list are the people requesting Queen Certificates.

Please remember that we have over 350 apiaries in Cuyahoga County, so it is hard getting all of them done. According to the inspector's handbook, inspection temperatures have to be above 60 degrees.

Of the inspections done this month, I have found mites in drone cells, so remember to check your mite loads! As soon as the weather breaks it's going to be the start of early swarm season. If you ordered new packages, remember to treat early because one mite is one to many!

Everyone have a safe season, and hopefully we will see you at World Bee Day in May!

ENTRY RULES

- Only one entry will be permitted by an exhibitor for any one premium and no two exhibits in the same class shall be made by the same person or any member of his/her family from the same aplaries, or aplary.
- Honey judged on quality, cleanliness, color, aroma and moisture content.
- Bees and Queen judged for evenness in color and form, general appearance and educational value to the public. Queen and her bees shown on a frame of brood in observation hive.
- Sweetening used in baked goods and canned fruit must contain 50% honey. Recipe must be attached. Bring entry in zip-lock bag on disposable plate.
- Sweetening used in Honey Candy must contain a minimum of one-sixth honey. Candy and baked goods must be displayed in plastic bags or well-covered with clean film.
- Honey and honey products must be produced by the exhibitor within the past year - from fair year to fair year.
- The judge(s) may award a lower class prize or no prize for entries that are substandard.
- 8. Honey may be purchased for products in Section 300.
- 9. Set up Saturday, Noon 4:00 P.M. or Sunday 9:00 A.M. Noon.
- 10. All exhibits/entries can be picked up on Sunday, the last day of the Fair, from 8:30 P.M. - 10:00 P.M. Exhibitor Tag required for pickup. Any exhibits not claimed will be disposed of at the discretion of the Director-At-Large or the Superintendent. Award ribbons not claimed will be available at the Fair Office the week following the Fair.

Recipe of the Month



May 2023

Ingredients

Shortbread Base

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup powdered sugar
- 1/2 cup unsalted butter, room temp

Filling

- 6 Tbsp unsalted butter
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1 cup walnuts, coarsely chopped
- 1/4 cup whipping cream
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1/2 tsp lemon zest
- pinch of salt

For the Shortbread Base

Preheat oven to 350F. Spray an 8-in square pan and line with a wide strip of parchment paper. In a large bowl, mix soft butter with powdered sugar. It should be creamy. Add flour and patiently incorporate it all using a spatula until you have a soft dough. Press the dough into the bottom of the pan. Prick with a fork and bake for 15-20 minutes, until starting to dry and barely color. Reserve on wire rack while making the filling.

For the Filling

Put butter, honey, and brown sugar in a medium saucepan. Cook on medium heat until it breaks a boil. Continue cooking for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and immediately add the walnuts, cream, salt, vanilla, and lemon. Pour into the pre-baked crust and return to the oven for 20 minutes. Remove from the oven and let stand 5-10 minutes on wire rack. The filling hardens a lot when it cools down, so do not over bake. Carefully run a knife around the edges of the pan so that it doesn't stick. Once fully cooled, cut into squares and serve.


