
A Message from Our President

Inspector's Corner

Hi everyone,

Its swarm season, and most of us are Urban Beekeepers with neighbors within 50-100ft of us. It's important to check your hive(s) every 7 to 10 days. I know GCBA stresses this... why you ask? Queen cells hatch in 16 days so if you're in your hives every 7 to 10 days you can seek and destroy queen cells before they are capped. This does help greatly in stopping swarming. Losing half your bees to swarming also cuts your honey production.

The beekeeping community has fought hard to get beekeeping legalized.

Swarming scares the heck out of the non beekeeper.

Remember, it takes a stroke of a pen to make beekeeping legal in your community, but

legal in your community, but that same pen can also make it illegal to keep bees.

Celebrate World Bee Day - May 17-18th!


Have you heard that GCBA and CCF are hosting their fourth annual World Bee Day?

Pollinator Fun Facts!

- When you remove gardening materials or prune too early in the spring season, you risk disrupting or potentially destroying eggs or pollinators who may not have left hibernation yet.
- Participate in "No Mow May." Studies have shown that mowing less frequently promotes pollinator-friendly food like weeds, clovers, dandelions, and more native plants to grow more robust.
- Opt for native plants in your garden. This can be a great addition to any garden, and reduce environmental impact by ensuring you aren't planting invasive species. Since pollinators have evolved over time with native plants in a specified area, they've developed a mutually beneficial relationship.

Recipe of the Month



Slovenian Honey and Spice Biscuits

Recipe by Chef Charles Heaton

Ingredients:

Biscuit Dough

- 4 cups (500g) All-purpose Flour
- 1 1/4 cup (120g) powdered sugar
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp salt
- 4tsp spice blend (sifted)
- 1/2 cup (180g) Slovenian Honey
- 1 egg
- 11 Tbsp (150g) butter, room temperature
- Zest of 1 lemon

Spice blend

- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp ground cardamom
- 1 tsp ground cloves
- 1 tsp ground star anise

Procedure

- Combine dry ingredients, mix thoroughly.
- Combine liquid ingredients and softened butter in a mixing bowl, mix thoroughly.
- Add blended dry ingredients to wet ingredients in two to three additions.
- Mix all of the ingredients into a smooth dough.
- Scoop approximately 1 oz. biscuits and place them on a baking sheet.
- Bake at 300F (150 Celsius) for approximately 15 minutes, until brown on the bottom and lightly brown on the top edges.
- Allow to cool and dust lightly with powdered sugar.
- And... dober tek! (Bon appétit!)
- Yield: approximately 25, 1oz biscuits
