Help Needed!

We are currently without a President and a Secretary. The job descriptions for these positions are listed in the association's by-laws and are listed below-

From Article V, Section 2-

The President shall preside at all meetings of GCBA and of the Board. The President shall be subject to the direction of the Board and GCBA and direct the activities of the association. The President shall not have a vote on any proposal brought before any meeting except in the event of a tie vote by the Board at a Board Meeting or by the membership at a General Membership Meeting. The President shall have the power to establish and appoint committees for both the Board and the association. The President shall implement decisions of the Board and of the association via committees or otherwise.

The Secretary shall record minutes of all the meetings, including General Membership Meetings and Board Meetings, which shall include the financial statements reported by the Treasurer and the names of all attendees at monthly meetings. The Secretary shall receive and forward mail to the Board for action and respond to such mail at the direction of the Board. The Secretary shall give all notices required by law or provided for by the By-Laws. The Secretary shall provide written minutes to the membership. The Secretary shall prepare election ballots and distribute ballots to members in good standing at the annual meeting in December. The Secretary shall have custody of the official records of GCBA.

Around the Bee Yard

This January was one that we haven't had for a few years. Snow and sub-zero temperatures have made it difficult to have a day when we could pop the top off our hives to give them a quick check and add any supplemental feed as necessary. Hopefully everyone took advantage of the couple of mild days back at the end of December.

In addition to checking on the need to add some sugar or fondant, you should also check the bottom entrances to make sure that they are open and not clogged with dead bees. Remove any mouse guards and sweep out the dead bees with a long stick or a hook made from a coat hanger. It's also helpful to have an upper entrance that won't get covered by snow for the bees to do cleansing flights on warmer days.

Keep an eye on the weather and be ready to take advantage of any warmer days (50+) to do an oxalic acid treatment for varroa.

Email Scams

From time to time, internet scammers impersonate someone you know. They ask you to do the 'quick favor' of buying 'gift cards' for them, and they provide a brief, feasible scenario that will entice you to 'help' them. Beekeepers are kind people! We love to help! So we are easy targets!

You can easily tell this is a scam if the thief is asking for gift cards and is pretending to be from GCBA.

Bee club officers and members will NEVER ask you to send them gift cards, or money of any kind. Ever. Simply delete such emails and don't give it a second thought.

There are two situations where a real email from GCBA may mention money: Renewing your annual membership and donating to one of our bee causes. You can tell these emails are legitimate because:

- 1) Legitimate emails will never ask you to send gift cards.
- 2) Legitimate emails will never ask you to send money/gift cards to a person.
- 3) Legitimate emails will never ask you to give credit card info to a person. Not via email, not on the phone, never.


The GCBA website uses secure, encrypted portals that link you directly to the credit card processing company. Our website never sees your credit card number - even the club treasurers cannot see your credit card number. Only the credit card processor's computer. No person is involved.

Just today, a scammer impersonated GCBA Vice President Adam Price, asking for a little help. (Oooh! A familiar name! A plausible scenario! Gift cards! I'm always up for helping a good cause!)

Some members received the trick email, but recognized it was a scam because 1) Gift Cards! 2) We never ask members to send cards/cash directly to a person. Bonus: They noticed that while the text claimed to be from Adam, the return email address didn't belong to Adam.
