EXPLORE OUR COLLECTIONS

The Southern Aroostook Agricultural Museum is about much more than tractors, diggers, and agriculture. It is comprised of several buildings filled with thousands of items that were part of rural life in Aroostook County, Maine's largest and northernmost county. Anchored by a former school that has been transformed into the original museum, the property also houses two large barns, a one-room schoolhouse, a general store, a filling station and a blacksmith/barrel shop. There is so much history to see here, we hope you will come and make a day of it!

Main Building



Formerly an elementary school, the main building now houses an extensive collection of tools, toys, household items, small farm implements, a model potato house and much, much more.

Hagan Barn



This barn houses many old pieces, from one-row, horse drawn diggers to wooden wheeled bicycles. There is so much to see and explore.

Cole Building



Dedicated to AJ "Allie" Cole and Galen Cole, this barn houses a highway truck and plow where visitors can climb up and experience how big of a machine it was to drive and operate on snowy highways.

Barrel Shop and Blacksmith



Built by Colby Shaw and family, the Blacksmith Shop contains forges, anvils and tools used to handle hot irons. the Barrel Shop features tools used to make barrels.

Ross Schoolhouse



The Ross Ridge School was the last remaining one room schoolhouse in Littleton. It was donated to the museum and moved to our site in 2004. It holds many items and memories of learning.

General Store & Filling Station



The general store was a place where you might get mail, settle by the wood stove to play a game of checkers with a friend or buy something you couldn't provide for yourself.
