## THE STORY

#### Logline

When a closeted, religious teenager finds a love letter from before the Holocaust written to his grandfather by another man, he discovers that he might not be alone. With the help of his high-school crush, he sets out to find the mysterious author of the letter and uncover both his grandfather's identity as well as his own.

#### Synopsis

NOAM STEIN is a senior in high school, who is a bit out of place in his Modern Orthodox Jewish community in Cleveland. All his family wants is for him to find a nice girl to date, but Noam finds himself more aware of a particular boy in his class. Raised in a deeply conservative and religious community, he can barely say the word "gay" to himself. So he is especially shocked when he discovers a love letter written to his grandfather from before the Holocaust, by a man named 'M.'

Noam doesn't know where to turn first. He's scared to ask his mother MICHELLE, who knows more than she's willing to share and forbids Noam from delving into his grandfather's past. Even if Noam dared to tell his sister TALI, her upcoming wedding has everyone preoccupied. He knows one openly gay kid in his community choir, but Noam doesn't even know how to approach the boy.

Noam soon finds someone unexpected to confide in. His high school crush, JONAH, has decided to research gay persecution in the Holocaust for a class project. Noam shares his grandfather's letter with Jonah, and the two set out to learn more about Noam's Opa and the mysterious man named 'M.' It isn't long before they discover his name is Meyer and, shortly after, that Meyer is still alive.

Noam and Jonah's search brings them closer together as they spend more and more time alone, but it also begins to attract attention. His best friend ZACH catches him sneaking off with Jonah and suddenly becomes uncomfortable around Noam. His mother finds his research and freaks out, destroying all the progress he and Jonah have made. Noam begins to date MIRIAM, a close family friend and classmate, after learning about another boy in the community who came out as gay and was rejected by his family.

As the pieces fall into place, Noam and Jonah discover the whereabouts of the mysterious man. They drive through the night on the eve of Noam's sister's wedding and find him, but the man is completely confused by their story. Noam learns that all of his expectations were misled, and realizes he must finish this journey of self-discovery on his own.

#### Jeremy Borison | Writer, Director, Producer

Jeremy Borison is a queer, Modern Orthodox filmmaker whose work explores the intersection of religion and sexuality and aims to create discourse through nuanced storytelling. His films have received grants from organizations including Micah Philanthropies, Aviv Foundation, and the Steven Spielberg supported Jewish Story Partners, for their efforts in creating discourse around LGBTQ inclusion in religious communities. Jeremy has been selected for various initiatives that explore art and religion, as an Asylum Arts Fellow, a writer for Imagination Productions, a fellow of the Start South art therapy program, and a Filmmaker in Residence for the Jewish Film Institute. He recently completed his debut feature film, 'Unspoken,' and is currently working on a documentary feature about the Supreme Court lawsuit between Yeshiva University and its Pride Alliance, regarding the Orthodox institution's rejection of an LGTBQ club on campus.

#### Benji Dell | Director of Photography

Benji Dell is a cinematographer working in Los Angeles and Detroit. He is a graduate of the University of Michigan Screen Arts program and earned his M.F.A. in cinematography from the American Film Institute. 
#### Hannah Borison | Casting

## DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

I was raised in the Modern Orthodox Jewish community in Cleveland, Ohio, where coming out as gay was impossible. Homosexuality is taboo in the Orthodox world, and LGBTQ individuals are often ostracized from their communities. As a teenager, I feared that being gay meant losing everyone I loved. And though I ultimately came to terms with my sexuality, I did not feel safe enough to come out until I had left my hometown.

Most individuals who come out in the Modern Orthodox community leave religion altogether, but I didn't want homophobia to steal my identity. Instead, I became active in Jewish LGBTQ organizations and advocated for change within the Orthodox Jewish world. I spoke in Orthodox communities about the struggles of being gay, and partnered with organizations to create social programs and support groups for queer individuals from Orthodox backgrounds.

It soon became clear to me that the best way to create social change was to integrate my work in the Orthodox LGBTQ world with my work in film. 'Boxes' was the first project to emerge from that realization. It is a short film that follows a Holocaust survivor and her gay granddaughter, each of whom is hiding her own secrets. I wrote and directed the project as a way to help Modern Orthodox viewers identify with LGBTQ people, through the shared experience of oppression and hiding.

While screening 'Boxes' at various events and festivals, however, it became apparent that there is a resistance to acknowledging gay persecution in the Holocaust that goes above and beyond the Modern Orthodox community's present-day homophobia. I started to see a parallel between the way queer stories are forcibly hidden in the Orthodox world today and the way they were systematically hidden during and after World War II.

This realization is what sparked the story of 'Unspoken,' a film about a boy who is forced to hide in his religious community and discovers that his grandfather had a parallel hidden identity during the Holocaust. My goal in telling this story is to welcome audiences into a place of compassion and understanding, and help a community that has long identified with its own persecution recognize its role in the persecution of others.

While I hope this film will enlighten religious communities and validate LGBTQ experiences, I also believe it will resonate with any audience that understands the fear of being alone. 'Unspoken' is not just a queer film, nor is it just a religious film. It's a coming-of-age story about a young adult who is struggling to find his own identity and where he fits into the world. The details of Noam's journey are specific to my own experiences, but his search for love and understanding – the heart of this film – is universal.
