Dear All:

A belated Happy Spring, Happy Passover, and Happy Easter to one and all alike!

It appears that the old saying... "March comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb" wasn't really true this year. I'd say it was more like "March comes in like a lion, became a bigger lion, and resentfully left as an even more ticked off lion." Perhaps we will have better luck with April showers bringing us May flowers.

Like many of you, CFAS has been trying to maintain our flexibility as we deal as best we can with the difficulties presented by the current global health pandemic. The bad news was that the current situation necessitated the postponement of both our March and April Guest Lectures Series. The good news is that Ms. Shana Boyer of USF (our March speaker) and Dr. Lee Newsom (our April speaker) have already graciously rescheduled and will be a part of the CFAS 2020-2021 Guest Lectures series when it starts in the fall. Dr. Newsom will be presenting in October 2020, and Ms. Boyer will be speaking in December 2020. So, nothing lost there as we were able to do some juggling with our presentation topics to make sure everyone doesn't miss out on what we know will be great topics.

No decision has yet been made about our May or June presentations. Tentatively, we do have speakers scheduled to speak to us in both months before we recess for our normally scheduled summer break during the months of July and August. We were recently informed that the City of Winter Park, which maintains governance over our meeting space at the Winter Park Public Library, has extended closure of their facilities through May (definitively) and possibly June as well.

At this point in time, we have NOT cancelled our May meeting. We are going to wait and see where we are in a few weeks, as our May meeting is not scheduled until just before Memorial Day. We may have to make alternative meeting location plans if the current pandemic has abated to allow us to meet safely. And if it has not, we will announce any postponements/cancellations closer to the end of April. Thank you for your patience and stay tuned for more details!

Last, please do take a look at the article provided in this newsletter regarding the postponement of the Florida Anthropological Society annual meeting for 2020. The board had intense discussions on what the best course of action was when it began clear that we would not be able to meet in May in Naples as we had originally planned. Eventually, two choices were presented to the board...an attempt to reschedule the meeting for later in the fall or outright postponement. I personally advocated for postponement as opposed to outright cancellation. It is true that we may not know where we will be in a few months' time. It is possible we will be in the same exact position and cancellation of our alternative meeting plans for fall may be necessary. However, I think it equally possible that hopefully the current crisis will have abated to a level that will allow us to resume some semblance of a normal life by fall. The majority of the board seemed to agree with my personal feelings and so the decision was made to move the conference to the first weekend in October. We will still be meeting in Naples. The host hotel remains the same (Ritz Carleton Naples), and we still will have the chance to view the stunning collection of items on loan from the Smithsonian, including the famous Key Marco Cat. I strongly encourage you to take a look at the meeting details. The board is in the process of switching over the registration and Call for Papers to the fall date. Please consider joining us in Naples if you haven't already. I know that the meeting will be well worth the wait!


