EN MEMORIUM: DR. ROGER SMITH



CFAS is saddened to announce the passing of famed archaeologist Dr. Roger Smith.

Florida's Division of Historical Resources shared the following details on Dr. Smith's life: We at the Division of Historical Resources wish to express our sadness over the recent loss of Dr. Roger Smith, retired State Underwater Archaeologist. An esteemed colleague, Roger served DHR for more than three decades and greatly contributed to our understanding and appreciation of historic shipwrecks in Florida waters. During the height of shipwreck salvage, Roger redirected the State's efforts to the scientific investigation of shipwrecks. One of his most notable projects was the Emanuel Point Shipwreck in collaboration with the University of West Florida's archaeologists. He also fostered Florida's Historic Shipwreck

Preserves, a series of submerged sites in Florida that were identified, recorded, and promoted in partnership with local coastal communities. We will always be grateful to Roger for his unwavering support and advocacy of Florida's underwater archaeological sites. Most of all, we will miss him as a friend and member of Florida's archaeological family.

Our thoughts and prayers are with the Smith family at this difficult time.

CALL FOR PAPERS & POSTERS

The Florida Anthropological Society invites the submission of abstracts for paper and poster presentations at the 72nd annual meeting in Naples. We encourage submissions on a broad range of topics pertaining to Florida anthropology, archaeology, history, and other related disciplines. Presentations will occur on Saturday, May 9, 2020, at the conference venue.

Please note the following abstract submission guidelines:

- An abstract of no more than 100 words is required from each presenter
- Individuals may submit only one paper or poster as first author for consideration
- A 20-minute time limit for each paper will be strictly enforced
- All presenters must register and pay the appropriate registration fee at the time they submit their abstract.

Co-presenters in attendance at the conference may register up to and including the day of the conference. Advance registration rates are available through April 7, 2020 at \$50 for FAS members, \$60 for non-members. Students enjoy a fifty percent reduction in registration rate. After April 7, 2020, a late registration fee of \$15 applies to all categories. We encourage all attendees to consider becoming FAS members. FAS Membership, as well as FAS 2020 Conference registration and abstract submission access is available through the FAS website. Abstract submission deadline is Friday, March 20, 2020.

The deadline for proposing an Organized Session, panel discussions, or other special programs associated with the conference is Friday, February 21, 2010. Email questions and organized session submissions to Theresa Schober at tmschober@earthlink.net.

Overturning the Turnbull Settlement of New Smyrna Beach: Artifact Analysis of the Old Stone Wharf



The Turnbull Settlement of New Smyrna Beach, Florida, was one of many short-lived attempts at British dominance in the new colony taken over from Spain. Dr. Turnbull of Scotland established the settlement as a plantation in 1766, which subsequently failed in 1777. A wharf located in the center of the town served as the primary point for trade. This presentation provides a snapshot analysis of the ceramic artifacts analyzed from this wharf site and a tenta-

tive interpretation of the results.

Ms. Lovingood is a navy veteran and UCF alumna that is currently working on finishing her Master's at the University of South Florida in Applied Anthropology on the Archaeology track. She studiesunder Dr. Diane Wallman and hope to be graduating in May 2020. Her focus has been on the Turnbull Settlement of New Smyrna Beach, Florida, during the short-lived British Colonial period. Her goal is to continue doing work in Historical Archaeology and ceramics of the British Period, including trade networks during that same time. She is a Florida native, and would like to continue research on the state's forgotten histories and to strengthen a case for more prominent position of Florida in the British Colonial trade networks and roles and influences in the history of the United States.


