

DECEMBER 2019 PRESENTATION



Dr. Zack Gilmore, Anthropology Department Professor at Rollins College, gave a presentation on “The Baker Museum at Rollins College: Relics and Tales from a Forgotten Collection”. Dr. Gilmore provided a brief history of Rollins College, the oldest college in Florida, and focused especially on the Thomas R. Baker museum, which was begun mainly as a natural history museum in the late nineteenth century in Knowles Hall.

At 2:30 am, December 1, 1909, Knowles Hall burned down and all artifacts and specimens were destroyed. After some thought and discussion, it was decided to rebuild the museum, and Thomas R. Baker, Professor of Natural History at Rollins College (1890-1911) initiated the effort to rebuild the museum collection. To do this, Baker sent out letters and flyers asking for donations of relics that were “museum quality specimens”.



Individuals and institutions across the country responded generously, and by 1920 more than 10,000 samples and artifacts had been received, forming the nucleus of the Thomas R. Baker Museum of Natural History. Dr. Gilmore related the story of the eclectic Baker Museum collection by highlighting a selection of its remaining artifacts, which collectively span five continents and more than 5,000 years of human history. Over time, many of the artifacts and associated documentation of their histories and how they came into the possession of the Baker Museum were sold or lost. The collection eventually became part of the Rollins Cornell Fine Arts Museum, where the collections reside today. Dr. Gilmore described how the college has been working to recover these histories through expert analyses of artifacts and speaking with family members of donors who are now gone.

Dr. Gilmore also presented some of the collections of artifacts along with their donation histories. Some of these collections encompassed origin areas of Bismya (Mesopotamia), Egypt, Pompeii, South America, Mesoamerica and North America.

The Museum is planning an exhibition in Fall 2020 to display the best artifact collections which represent the disparate origins and trajectories of these individual works help to illuminate a remarkable entanglement of historical events, characters, and objects whose paths intersected at Rollins in the early 20th century.

Overturing the Turnbull Settlement of New Smyrna Beach: Artifact Analysis of the Old Stone Wharf



The Turnbull Settlement of New Smyrna Beach, Florida, was one of many short-lived attempts at British dominance in the new colony taken over from Spain. Dr. Turnbull of Scotland established the settlement as a plantation in 1766, which subsequently failed in 1777. A wharf located in the center of the town served as the primary point for trade. This presentation provides a snapshot analysis of the ceramic artifacts analyzed from this wharf site and a tentative interpretation of the results.

Ms. Lovingood is a navy veteran and UCF alumna that is currently working on finishing her Master's at the University of South Florida in Applied Anthropology on the Archaeology track. She studies under Dr. Diane Wallman and hopes to be graduating in May 2020. Her focus has been on the Turnbull Settlement of New Smyrna Beach, Florida, during the short-lived British Colonial period. Her goal is to continue doing work in Historical Archaeology and ceramics of the British Period, including trade networks during that same time. She is a Florida native, and would like to continue research on the state's forgotten histories and to strengthen a case for more prominent position of Florida in the British Colonial trade networks and roles and influences in the history of the United States.

THE FLORIDA ANTHROPOLOGICAL SOCIETY DOROTHY MOORE STUDENT GRANT


The Florida Anthropological Society (FAS) is making available \$500.00 to be awarded annually to archaeology students (B.A., M.A., or Ph.D.) who are currently enrolled in a Florida university. The grant money will assist students conducting archaeological research in Florida. Grant funds can be used to cover the costs associated with archaeological fieldwork, special analyses (e.g., radiocarbon dates, faunal or botanical analyses, soils analysis, etc.), and, in some cases, travel expenses associated with presenting a paper based on the student's research at a professional meeting.

Students interested in applying for the grant should submit a letter not to exceed two pages that describes the project for which the funds are being requested; what research question(s) or problem(s) are being addressed; how the funds will be applied to these problems; what, if any, additional funds will be used to accomplish the research; and how the research will contribute to Florida archaeology. The applicant should include a budget indicating the amount requested and describing how the money will be spent along with a letter(s) of support from faculty.
