CFAS SHIFTING TO VIRTUAL PRESENTATIONS VIA ZOOM FOR FALL GUEST LECTURE SERIES

One of the issues that CFAS faced this past spring is that our normal meeting space at the Winter Park Public Library was closed due to the covid-19 global pandemic. We have had trouble ensuring that our meeting space there will be open for public use this fall. After much reflection, we have decided to temporarily transition to a virtual format for our CFAS meetings and Guest Lecture Series speakers. This has necessitated a bit of juggling, rearranging, and substituting previously announced speakers. Please refer to our updated speaker list which, as ever, is subject to further change. Our zoom presentations should last about 1 hour and 15 minutes. The business portion of our meeting will be held as usual at the beginning of our time together at 7:00pm. Usually no later than five to ten minutes after we convene, the platform will be turned over to our guest speaker so they can make their presentation. The public will still be able to ask questions at the end of the presentation. As ever, our meetings and the talks will remain free and open to the public. But you must register via the link provided on Zoom to join the meeting. Registration is easy as it only requires you to submit your first and last name and an email address to get the meeting link. We are going to also experiment with posting edited versions of the presentations on CFAS's YouTube channel within a couple of weeks of when the talk was given. We appreciate everyone's time and patience through this transition. And we hope to resume in-person meetings some time in early 2021.



"From the National Level to the Municipal Level, Women's Suffrage" by Brigitte Stephenson, Museum Curator, City of Sanford, FL

This lecture will be focused on women's suffrage in the United States, looking at people, political and cultural movement, from the national level to the municipal level. It will also take look how Florida history the 1920's election was an election marked with hope after the ratification of the 19th amendment, and then horror with voter suppression, and brutality against black voters

Brigitte Stephenson currently serves at the Museum Curator for the Sanford Museum in Sanford, Florida. She has been in that position since April 2020 when she was promoted from her former position as Museum Assistant. She previously worked at the museum for more than five years before attaining her current position. In her current role as curator, she oversees the museum staff, along with major projects, including the electronic accession of items and leading the efforts to extend the outreach of the museum. She has an extensive knowledge of Henry B. Sanford and is known for her great attention to detail in public presentations. Rumor has it, she may even give this lecture in period dress, so please don't forget to join us for what we know will be a great talk!

Mr. Wunderlich will be speaking about the Civil War in Florida, specifically how Confederate gold managed to travel all the way from the Confederate capital in Richmond, Virginia to Florida in 1865.

Wunderlich is a local historian and resident of Longwood. He recently published a fiction novel entitled Drummer Boy on the Run. It is a story centered around the life of young James Beverley. His legendary 2nd Florida Regiment, a part of Lee's Army, has just given up at Appomattox. For the Rebel soldiers, though, everything begins and ends with pride in their land. In James' long march home, he meets Sally Stanard, a displaced nurse from Virginia. "Pappy" Tuttle is an aged soldier likewise now trying to find his place in a devastated South. They, along with James' younger brother Henry, unwittingly become part of an elaborate scheme to hide Richmond's gold and silver. To this day, uncertainty remains about the treasure's final whereabouts as it crossed into Florida in May of 1865. Can the group outfox Union search parties, bandits, spies, and Confederate double-crossers? If so, they will become part of arguably the greatest wagon train exploit ever.

Mesmerized as a child by elder's stories of the Civil War, award-winning author and fifth-generation Floridian Erwin Wunderlich pens yet another novel about this tragic conflict. Authentic locales and settings, and relentless action and suspense, set the stage for treasure and treachery in his new thriller!


Presented by Dr. Paul Ortiz. The state of Florida has recently mandated a law requiring that public schools and state institutions teach the history of the Ocoee Massacre. What happened in Ocoee, Florida in 1920? How do the tragic events that transpired in Orange County intersect with the broader histories of the African American freedom struggle as well as today's efforts at historical truth and reconciliation in the age of Black Lives Matter? Paul Ortiz will draw from his book

Emancipation Betrayed as well as more than 20 years of involvement in local history initiatives in Ocoee. This event is free and is funded by the Florida Humanities Florida Talks: At Home! program.

Paul Ortiz is an American historian and professor of history at the University of Florida. He is also the Director of the Samuel Proctor Oral History Program and has published numerous works, including Jim Crow: African Americans Tell About Life in the Jim Crow South and Emancipation Betrayed.


