Dear Christian Friends at Saint Mark's Church.



One of the advantages that come with age is the ability to view life through a longer lens.

I have witnessed this in grandparents and other seniors who have played influential roles in my life. Without their model, I don't know where I would have learned to believe that a prodigal child can be restored; that marriage is a gift of God's grace, even in hard seasons; that hope for calmer waters in difficult times is no trivial posture, but a strong act of faith. Yes, I believe that we who are older and seasoned by life have a big role to play now in these difficult, uncivil and deadly times. I believe it is up to us, the mature Christians, to be the model of hope, love, kindness, civility, and patience for younger generations in the church and especially outside the church.

As public life gets more polarized and impatient, as racism rebounds, as vaccine envy and income inequality generate discord; we who are considered "older Christians" need to model the gifts of the Holy Spirit and especially the gift of love and patience. Speaking of the most important spiritual gift, Saint Paul says, "love is patient and love is kind." So, perhaps as we approach Saint Valentine's Day, I have to ask myself, is love more than a box of chocolate and a dozen roses? Perhaps, I need to model more patience and love with people around me, with whom I passionately disagree, and take the long view, that others will come to know the truth. Perhaps, I with my longer lens can believe that our next generation of citizens will become more civil, more kind, more, hopeful and loving. Yes, I believe it is our role as older Christians to model hope when it looks darkest, when there is not enough vaccine, not enough money, not enough jobs, not enough unity or peace. This is a strong act of faith, exactly what is needed now from those who have had a long walk with Jesus.



Ash Wednesday February 17th 7:00 PM live or YouTube and Facebook

The first of the forty days of Lent, named for the custom of placing blessed ashes on the foreheads of worshipers at Ash Wednesday services. The ashes are a sign of penitence and a reminder of mortality, and may be imposed with the sign of the cross. Ash Wednesday is observed as a fast in the church year of the Episcopal Church. The Ash Wednesday service is one of the Proper Liturgies for Special Days in the BCP (p. 264). Imposition of ashes at the Ash Wednesday service is optional.

Imposition of Ashes

Ashes may be imposed on the heads of participants in the Ash Wednesday service as a sign of mortality and penitence. The ashes are imposed with the words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" (BCP, p. 265). Ashes are typically imposed by inscribing a cross on the forehead. The imposition of ashes has been practiced on Ash Wednesday since the ninth century.

As Lent approaches this year, we lament.

We lament all those whose lives were lost during the COVID-19 pandemic. Our hearts break for all of the people who are no longer with us. We also lament other losses that include jobs and livelihoods, the opportunity to travel to visit loved ones and the ability to worship together in our church buildings. So much was lost, with little or no time to lament that which was lost. Because of the magnitude of these collective losses, I decided to focus on lament as the theme for the 2021 Lenten Meditations.

"Four Steps of Lament," by resting, reflecting, repenting and ultimately being restored to God and to one another. This Lent, may God restore your soul by bringing you into the bright new life that is our Easter promise. And may you continue to know that you are loved now and always.


