Expect: Mostly rockhopping, scrambles, waita-while, swimming holes, difficult creek crossings.

This is an ever-popular walk in the Mt Charlton area. This Creek runs all year and comes out from the rainforest areas of Eungella National Park. The walk culminates in one of the best swimming holes in the district. The hole sits between two waterfalls. This walk consists of constant rockhopping all the way. Make sure you bring your swimmers.

This will be a hard walk, so be prepared.

Ring to nominate for this walk no later than 12.00 midday before the walk or sooner.

Bring a change of clothes to travel home.






Mt Blackwood 16th November










50th Anniversary Dinner 20th November
