Key to Walks Grading System

Distance

S = short – under 5km M = medium – 5-10km L = long – over 10km

Terrain

1-3 = Graded or open terrain, no scrub
4-7 = Bush, minor scrub, rainforest
8-10 = Rocks, creeks, rockhopping, scrambling, thick scrub, major rock scrambling using hands, technical

Difficulty

1-3 = Easy, suitable for beginners
4-7 = Medium, reasonable fitness required
8-10 = Hard, strenuous, fit walkers only

Estimated walking time: 5 Hours Total of all uphill sections: 60m

Pace: Slow

Terrain: Creek walk **Vegetation:** Rain Forest

Expect: This walk is in the Cathu State Forest

Reserve.

This is an easy walk with small cool off holes along the creek. The creek has running water and there will be lots of creek crossings, so wet weather footwear is required. We can split into two groups to cater for all fitness and rock hopping abilities.

You will need to carry water and food for the whole day.

A change of clothes to travel home is a must.

The Rock Arch – Cape Hillsborough Sunday 4th February

Depart : 7:00am from Mackay **Journey:** 100km \$10.00

Grade: S45

Estimated walking time: 4 Hours
Total of all uphill sections: Almost Nil

Pace: Average

Terrain: Initially National Park track, beach, Some rocky foreshore sections, boulders,

some sharp rocks - Gloves advisable.

Vegetation: Long grass, open sunny sections,

coastal scrub

Expect: Some rockhopping, some sharp rocks. Possibly hot with not much shade in some sections. Bring plenty of water as there is none available along the walk. Great views.

We will commence the walk along the National Park track at Hidden Valley. Then make our way to the "beach" (rocky foreshore) The tide should be low enough for us to get around the headland without wet feet. We will inspect an impressive sea cavern which affords great views. We then continue along the foreshore, and around some more headlands to another impressive feature - The Rock Arch. We will climb through the Rock Arch to a ridge on the other side for lunch and great views (Unfortunately there is not much shade). So, if it is too hot, we will stay in the shade at the Rock Arch.

There will be time to beachcomb along the way and who knows what treasures we might find

Please, Slip, Slop, Slap and bring plenty of water.

St Lawrence Weekend

Expect: This will be a leisurely social camp, suitable for beginners. We will commence the day observing the incoming tidal surge in St Lawrence ck, as there is a tidal range of over 8 metres and the water funnels in from the bay. This is quite impressive.

Following this we will set up camp at the rodeo grounds where there is ample space and good facilities. Bring some \$1 coins if you wish to avail yourself to a hot shower. Bring your own drinking water and food for the weekend. You could come along just for the Saturday or byo car, caravan or then and camp for the night.

A suggested programme for Saturday could include checking out the historical township and cemetery and inspecting the old mine site, before doing an afternoon walk to the bund wall before visiting the old wharf site and Waverly creek.

Koalas frequent the area and have been spotted in the township or at the golf course.

The camp site is a good spot for viewing the sunset over the wetlands. As it will be new moon conditions could be favourable for anyone interested in star gazing.

An early morning walk on Sunday along the short track to the wetlands bird viewing structure (through an area usually frequented by a number of kangaroos) is recommended. To stretch the legs, one can walk further along the dirt road past the goat farm and fish ladders on the way home, visiting Carmila beach and having lunch at Flaggy Rock are options.

This should be a relatively easy day, suitable for beginners. There'll be some beach walking (sand and rocks), some rough tracks, and a section along the side of the road.

If there has been rain, the tracks could be muddy. Bring sun protection, enough water for the day, smoko and lunch. There is a very short but steep climb up to a lookout with views south to Mt Funnel and this is well worth the effort.

meandering through rain forest.

Although this is a reasonably easy walk, it is only suitable for walkers who are confident rock hoppers. We are sure to encounter some wait-a-while, so come prepared. If numbers permit, we may split into two groups, a faster group who rock hop up to the swimming holes and another group who explore the flatter, less rocky part of the creek nearer to where we park the cars.

Eungella tracks – Crediton creek walk.


21 January 2024
