Key to Walks Grading System

Distance Terrain Difficulty

S = short - under 5km M = medium - 5-10kmL = long - over 10km

1-3 = Graded or open terrain, no scrub 4-7 = Bush, minor scrub, rainforest,

8-10 = Rocks, creeks, rockhopping, scrambling, 8-10 = Hard, strenuous, fit walkers only thick scrub, major rock scrambling using hands, technical

1-3 = Easy, suitable for beginners

4-7 = Medium, reasonable fitness required

Eungella Tracks - Crediton Loop Rd to Broken River Picnic Ground and return Sunday 1st October

Depart: 7 am

Journey: 200kms \$20

Grade: L15

Estimated walking time: 5 hrs. Total of all uphill sections: 100 m.

Pace: Average. Terrain: track walking. **Vegetation:** rainforest. **Expect:** platypus sightings, leeches, variety of flora and fauna, a good amount of exercise, and possibly a walk to the kiosk at lunch time. We will leave the cars at the Crediton Loop Rd end and walk back to the Broken River bridge area, and after lunch in the picnic grounds we will retrace our steps. Or wait at Broken River, if 15 km is too much for you. It is all track walking, and much of it is along the river, and the length about 15 kms in total. It is a suitable outing for those of us who enjoy easy walks but don't mind a bit of distance. Bring insect repellent and plenty of water.

The Diggings - Broken River- Buck Ck. Sunday 8th October

Walking Time: 4 to 5 hours.

Total Uphill: 70 m. **Pace:** Average

Terrain: Creek banks, rocky sections, minor

Lantana, small hill.

Expect: fairly easy creek bank walking, some minor rock hopping, short cross country bush traverse, and swimming opportunity. Probably

leeches. Bring insect repellent.

A relatively easy walk that should be suitable for all. We drive down the Diggings Road to the Camp Ground. Our main objectives of the day will be the waterfall and the washtub about 1.4 km downstream. An opportunity to explore and relax in this area. From there we can return by detouring up Buck Creek to another small waterfall, then by a short climb back up to Diggings Road. An opportunity may arise to explore some of the old mine sites in this area. Otherwise from the river we would retrace our path upstream to the vehicles. 4WD vehicles are recommended and numbers may have to be limited to available transport on the day.

Grade: M55

Estimated walking time: 5 hours, Total of all

uphill sections - 200m

Pace: Average to slow.

Terrain: uneven.

Vegetation: open forest.

Expect some steep slopes, scrambles, great views. From the Cape Hillsborough car parking area, we will walk back along the road a short distance, before heading up a reasonably steep

slope to the base of the cliffs. We will then continue around the base of the cliff before reaching the fern overhang. We then continue on towards Cathedral cave, continue around the cliff base and up to the track before reaching the lookout. Heading back to the cars we will follow the taped track to Cape Hillsborough. Bring water and food for the day, there will be plenty of time to complete this walk and therefore there is no need to hurry.

This is a section of the Whitsunday Great Walk. We will leave the cars at the Brandy Creek entrance, and will be aiming to reach the Repulse Creek campsite (16.5km return) for lunch and an exploration of the creek, and then return to the cars.

A shorter option of the Wompoo Way (7km return) might be possible, if there are enough people, and someone volunteers to lead the group.

Previous Activities

Progressive Mystery Walk Sunday 10th September

First, the mysteries. Who left her backpack at home and had to make a quick trip back to her place to collect it? Luckily there was plenty of time for her to do this as she had arrived early the first time, and also we were trying to solve the mystery of the lost man so that the walk could commence with all six participants present.

Secondly, the progressive element. The term was originally used as the afternoon was planned to incorporate three walks which progressively became longer, and which involved short car trips to relocate from the end of one to the start of the next one. However, we also progressively reduced our numbers, as some bush walkers had other commitments. All six of us completed the first two walks, but only three of us went the full distance for the final lap, although another two did most of it. The stayers covered almost 10 kms by the end of the day.

Luckily the weather was favourable - no rain, a pleasant breeze, and not as hot as the day before. The places visited were the Rosewood Reserve, Black's Beach Cove Constructed Wetlands, Black's Beach Spit, and of course the beach itself. As well as following paths, easements, bush tracks and sand, some litter was collected and bird life was observed, including eight black swans in one of the Rosewood ponds.

Thank you to Carmel, Penny, Laurinda, Len and Edie for making the afternoon an enjoyable one, and to Edie for her co-leadership on the day and beforehand at the planning stage.

Pretty Creek - Lineel Falls Loop. Sunday 17th September

We were driving through fog on Dalrymple Rd on the way to the start of the Mt Dalrymple West track. It was lifting as we started walking along the track. We turned off the track at the high point on the ridge above Pretty Creek, before the crossing, and we followed the ridge, more or less, to the junction of Pretty Creek and an upper tributary of Cattle Creek. The creeks here are especially beautiful, and the rainforest lush and green. We went downstream a bit to enjoy the views, then turned around and continued past the Pretty Creek junction, to Lineel falls, on the Cattle Creek tributary, where we had lunch. It was a mild day, and only Michelle was brave enough to have a swim here. Then we backtracked again to Pretty Creek and followed it upstream to the crossing of the Mt Dalrymple track. Pretty Creek is spectacular in this area.
